Fall Treats for your "Sweets"

Oatmeal Caramel Apple Cookies

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 package (3.4 ounces)
 instant caramel pudding mix
- 2 large eggs, room temperature
- 1/2 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 1-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3-1/2 cups old-fashioned
 oats
- 1 medium apple, peeled and chopped

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°. In a large bowl, cream butter, sugars and pudding mix until light and fluffy, 5-7 minutes. Add eggs; mix well. Beat in applesauce. In another bowl, whisk flour and baking soda; gradually beat into creamed mixture. Stir in oats and apple.

Drop dough by tablespoonfuls 2 in. apart onto greased baking sheets. Bake until golden brown, 15-18 minutes. Cool on pans 3 minutes. Serve warm or remove to wire racks to cool completely. Store in an airtight container. Freeze option: Freeze cookies in freezer containers, separating layers with waxed paper. To use, thaw before serving.

Pumpkin Pie Oatmeal with Graham Cracker Crumble

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 c. milk
- 1 c. old-fashioned rolled oats kosher salt
- 1/4 c. canned pumpkin
- 2 tbsp. brown sugar, divided
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 tbsp. cold butter
- 1 graham cracker, crushed

DIRECTIONS

In a medium saucepan over high heat, bring milk to a boil. Stir in oats and salt, reduce heat to low, and simmer until oats are tender and creamy, 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, mix together canned pumpkin, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, and pumpkin pie spice.

Stir pumpkin mixture into the oatmeal and sprinkle with cinnamon.

In a small bowl, mix together butter, crushed graham cracker, and remaining 1 tablespoon brown sugar.

Serve oatmeal in a bowl topped with graham cracker topping.

It's time to get NAFCAree proposals for the 2023 NAFCAree!

HOW TO GET A NAFCAree PROPOSAL

NAFCAree Proposal Guidelines:

Proposals for NAFCAree 2023 are due to the NAFCA Board by March 1 of the year prior to the rally. Please send to President Linda Ostiguy, **linandjimo@verizon.net**

Why so early? We need to review and publish them in the April Chatter for the vote at the Council of Chapters meeting.

Anyone can get a proposal. The person submitting it does <u>not</u> have to chair the event.

Choose a location that has a good number of area attractions for trips. Once you know where to go, look for a campground nearby that can accommodate at least 50 rigs for the week, traditionally the 3rd week in July.

What questions do I ask the campground to get started for a NAFCAree proposal:

- What is the weekly group rate for W/E/S/C campsites including taxes and fees?
- What is the rate for tent sites?
- What is the availability and fee of rental units or cabins?
- What is the campsite electrical amperage?
- What is the cost to guests for an extra night?
- What is the cost for extra adults/children per rig?
- Would we be able to have all sites together in one area?
- When would the deposit be due and what is the cancellation policy?
- What do you have for campground amenities such as pool, game room, dog park, etc?
- Is there access to a hall or pavilion?
- Is the hall and bathroom handicap accessible?
- Will a golf cart be available to rally committee?
- What are some suggestions for local attractions and group discounts?

NAFCA NATIONAL ELECTIONS

All National positions are open for election. A slate of candidates will be presented at the Council of Chapters meeting in October. Elections will be held in January for a two-year term starting April 1, 2022.

Board of Directors meetings are held four times annually following the close of each fiscal quarter. January, April, July/August, October. The April meeting is usually held the same day as the Annual Meeting and the October meeting is held the same day as the Council of Chapters meeting. There is also a Council of Chapters meeting at Spring Safari.

If interested in any of the Board positions, please inform your State Director or any NAFCA officer listed in the Chatter.

QUALIFICATIONS:

To be eligible for these offices, candidates must have served as a state or chapter elected officer.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF NAFCA OFFICERS

PRESIDENT: To preside at NAFCA Board and Executive Committee meetings, to appoint standing and special committees, to present an annual budget and to perform such other duties as pertain to the office.

VICE PRESIDENT: To familiarize themselves with the duties of the president.

To preside at NAFCA Board of Director meetings in the absence of the president.

The 1st and 2nd Vice Presidents must be prepared to assist and support the president in the performance of duties at all times and to perform the duties of the president in the absence of the president.

SECRETARY:

To keep accurate, written records of all NAFCA Board and Executive Committee meetings and distribute these reports to members of these bodies. To perform the duties of clerk in recording and documenting votes of the Board of Directors as they pertain to written contracts and/or agreements of the association.

TREASURER:

Keep accurate written records of all monies and make all authorized disbursements. Distribute quarterly financial reports to the NAFCA Board of Directors.

To annually publish in the official publication of NAFCA, notice on annual billing for dues, that an annual financial report of the Corporation is available to all members upon request.

Have you sent in, to hold your campsite, a reservation deposit of \$100? This deposit will hold the site whether your choice would be for a water and electric site (\$380) or a water, electric and sewer site (\$405). This price for the site includes all taxes and your \$50.00 administration fee to NAFCA.

Some things planned in the campground may include: brown bag auction; potty game; card bingo; boat ride; fishing outing; campfires; cardboard boat races (human cargo); pig roast evening meal; door prizes and more!

If you have an extra adult in your rig is priced at \$95; second family in your rig will cost \$190. How much will it cost you you ask for extra nights. Well a w/e site is \$54 and w/e/s is \$59. The extra day or days could be to come on Friday or depart on Sunday.

At the time of This writing our trip vendors have not issued their rates for 2022. We, as a committee, will have these rates sometime in the December/ January time frame. Trips in the works are; Ghost Tour, Play House, Upper Canada Village, Luncheon Cruise, Ottawa. All trips are subject to change and additions.

Aside from what has been written. the campground has a lifeguarded swimming pool, river beach for swimming, boat rentals, walking trails, camp-store, video game room, large campsites with table and fireplace: free hot showers with clean and well maintained restroom buildings, WiFi; enclosed hall pavilion; 9 hole disc golf; playground; dump station; laundry; duck pond; mini-golf; and horseshoe pits. How's that list? Lots to see and do within the campground. Also, downtown Kingston is only a short drive from your site where there are stores, sightseeing, Lake Ontario and all things that go along with the lake.

Please remember we are going to Canada and everyone will need a Passport or a Passport Card to cross the border. You should contact your auto insurance company to ensure you have the required coverage. Also, you want to check your health coverage while in Canada.

Where do hummingbirds go in the winter?

Hummingbirds are migratory creatures. We are starting to see fewer and fewer hummingbirds in the north, and more and more in southern regions as the fall migration takes place. Many hummingbirds spend the winter in Central America or Mexico, and migrate north to their breeding grounds in the southern U.S. and western states as early as February, and to areas further north into Canada later in the spring. The first arrivals in spring are usually males.

Some, however, do not migrate, in areas like California and the upper Pacific coast.

By late summer and early fall, breeding is completed and the southward migration back to Mexico and Central America is underway.

The Fall Migration Triggers

Although there are differing views in the birding community as to what triggers the start of fall migration, it is generally thought that hummingbirds sense changes in daylight duration, and declining numbers of flowers, nectar and insects. Instinct, their internal biological calendar, and cooling weather conditions also play a role in making the decision to migrate.

Making the Trip South

During migration, a hummingbird's heart beats up to 1,260 times a minute, and its wings flap 15 to 80 times a second. To support this high energy level, a hummingbird will typically gain 25-40% of their body weight before they start migration in order to make the long trek over land, and water.

They fly alone, often on the same path they have flown earlier in their life, and fly low, just above tree tops or water. Young hummingbirds must navigate without parental guidance, or previous flight experience. Hummingbirds fly by day when nectar sources such as flowers are more abundant. Flying low allows the birds to see, and stop at, food supplies along the way. They are also experts at using tail winds to help reach their destination faster and by consuming less energy and body fat.

Research indicates a hummingbird normally can travel as many as 23 miles in one day. At that rate it can take several weeks to reach their wintering grounds from summer breeding grounds in the northern U.S. or southern Canada. But in certain circumstances, like the journey over the Gulf of Mexico, they can fly for more extended lengths of time, like 22 hours, nonstop!

While some hummingbirds begin their fall migration as early as late July, most don't start their journey south till August or September, some end their Fall migration in the U.S.

Hummingbirds are overwintering on the Gulf Coast

in greater numbers than in the past, and many can be found at feeders in South Texas and South Louisiana during mild winters. For

example, in South Louisiana, several species are often spotted during the winter months, including the Ruby-throated, Rufous, Black-chinned, Buff-bellied, Calliope, Allen's, Broad-tailed, and Broadbilled.

A few hummingbird species are yearround residents in the warmer Pacific coastal and southern desert regions of the United States. Among these are Anna's hummingbird, a common resident from California inland to Arizona and north to British Columbia.

How Long to Leave Up Hummingbird Feeders?

During the fall migration, it is recommended that hummingbird lovers leave up their feeders for about two weeks after they sight their final bird. Just to feed those latemigrating hummers! Fall Migration Patterns of Common Hummingbird Species

Of the Pacific Northwest hummingbirds, Anna's is the only one that doesn't always migrate south to warmer areas in winter. The Continental Divide is host to the greatest number and diversity of western migrating hummingbirds. A nearly constant high pressure dome called the "**Great Basin High**" features winds that rotate clockwise and that are followed by the hummingbirds. This provides consistent tail winds to support migration.

> Rufous, Calliope, and Black-chinned Hummingbirds migrate north up the valleys and along the foothills of the Pacific slopes of the western United States, sipping nectar from spring flowers. This route is often called the "**Pacific Flyway**" or "floral

highway." They reach the Northwest in early summer.

As the lowland flowers begin to die off, the birds move up in elevation to the alpine meadows of the Rocky Mountains and Sierra Nevada where the flowers are in full bloom. Then they follow the mountains of the Continental Divide south to Mexico in late summer and fall.
