
Your October Otter River is still on and I would hope you have put this NAFCA event on your list of must camping weekend.

NAFCAREE On the Go in Ontario

As I write this update to the NAF-CAREE information, we are in the middle of quarantine. Many activities and vacation plans are being cancelled (including mine to Florida in April) but we are busy at work planning a fabulous NAFCARee for everyone. We are optimistic that we will be able to travel in July and we look forward to a much needed vacation from all of this quarantine worry.

Since this is the May Issue, the reservation deadline has passed and the trip reservation deadline has also passed but we will entertain further reservations for trips because the virus has forced us to make those purchases of tickets later than we might have. Please send them to me ASAP.

There are a few items I want to highlight:

NAFCA Day Dinner is a Pig Roast – The menu is:

Roasted Pig, Stuffed Chicken Supreme with spinach feta and red pesto, Rice Pilaf, Garlic Mashed Potato, Baked Beans, Corn on the Cob, Green Beans with Rosemary and Garlic in Steamed white wine, Caesar Salad, Greek Pasta Salad, Buns and Butter, Coffee and Tea

The bar will be open, and we have reserved the nice hall for this event. We are offering this at a savings. We are hoping that all of the people who attend the NAFCARee will join us for this evening meal. The final count is due before we arrive at the NAFCARee so please sign up through the sign up form.

NAFCAree Trips

TROLLEY TOUR - Sunday - Trolley Tour - We have commandeered our own Kingston Trolley Tour. Explore the history of Canada's first capital aboard our own thirty-two passenger trolley. The trolley will pick up right at the campground and take us to Fort Henry and the Penitentiary Museum, along the way we will hear about the history of Kingston as we make our way from one location to the other. Included in this trip are a guided tour of Fort Henry and a guided tour of the Penitentiary. Explore what Kingston has to offer! (There is a possibility that the Penitentiary will not open this summer – If that is the case we have other stops planned along this historic route)

OTTAWA - Monday - Ottawa "Changing of the Guards" - Please join us for a very full day of activities in the beautiful city of Ottawa. We plan to leave the campground early in a coach bus to travel to Ottawa in time to see the changing of the guards at 10:00 am. There are sooo many things to do in the area of the capital building including restaurants and shops. Our plan is to arrive at Ottawa by 9:00 to see the changing of the guards at 10:00 - this lasts 30 minutes. After that, you will have options. We will plan a walking tour of the area which ends at the restaurant area. A brief lunch stops before heading to a tour of congress then down to the river for a boat ride on the Ottawa River before heading back to the campground. If you would like, you can choose to get go off on your own and meet us later at the boat to see what you would like to see. There are free museums and activities in Ottawa. This tour does have a 30 person minimum for the cost of the bus, so please reserve early. If we do not have 30 people, we make other transportation arrangements.

MUSIC MAN - Thursday – Thursday we are planning a trip to Gananoque which is a city slightly north east of Kingston along the St. Lawrence Seaway. We are offering several options for that day, #1 We will be going to a matinee "Music Man" at the Thousand Islands Playhouse – Canada's Dockside Theatre, a waterfront performing arts venue. Again, please reserve early as this will sell out. #2 Join us for the bus ride and enjoy the afternoon at the Thousand Islands Shorelines Casino

where you can enjoy slots and games as well as a buffet. The bus will pick you up for the return trip home. #3. Join us for the bus ride and enjoy the afternoon in Gananoque on your own, (There are many things to do including taking in a boat ride on the Thousand Islands Seaway, which leaves every half hour, or have lunch at the Gananoque Brewing Company.) Just meet us back at the bus at the theater for the bus ride home.

UPPER CANADA VILLAGE – Friday – On Friday we will be going to the Upper Canada Village, a heritage park near Morrisburg Ontario which depicts a 19th century village as it was in Canada. Learn the history and heritage of the first settlers of the area. There are many activities and interesting homesteads to explore, learn to milk the cows and walk a calf, you can visit the bakery and flour mill while you tour the village and learn about life in the 1860's. We will return at a reasonable time to allow for rest and relaxation before your trip home.

Upper Canada Village Tour

With our tour to Upper Canada Village, you'll get to learn how the people of Kingston lived during the 1860's. The village was founded in 1961 and serves to depict life in a rural English Canadian setting during the year 1866. The site includes over 40 historical buildings including some that are still in operation today. Staff dressed in the clothing of this time period discuss aspects of the daily life including social life, music, religion, and politics.

An attraction the entire family can enjoy is the Loucks Farm. Named after the family that owned the original farmhouse along the banks of the St. Lawrence River, you'll be able to visit a large collection of farm buildings, including several bars, a hired man's house, animal pens, as well as touring the main home and gardens. Costumed interpreters will be involved in the typical farming tasks of the era. Children are encouraged to assist with the daily tasks, including milking cows and leading new-born calves around the barnyard.

The Loucks were a very affluent family, and it shows here at the village. They developed a co-op cheese factory to turn their excess milk production into cheese for domestic and international export. Back in the 1860's, cheese was an important revenue source in the local economy. They make the cheese

the same way and with the same equipment that they did in the 1860s. The Loucks affluence is also shown inside the main farmhouse with an impressive square piano in the parlour, dining room furniture, and luxurious fabrics and wallpapers.

On the other side of the agricultural life, was tenant farming. This was a popular option for those who wanted to farm but did not want to leave their home territory. On the surface, these farms appeared to be run on a poorer level than their neighbors who owned their farms, but that was not truly the case. Most tenant farmers dreamed of owning their own farms and tried saving their money to do so. They only spent what they had to on maintenance equipment and general improvements. The farmers here ran smaller and much less sophisticated operations than the Loucks family. They used ox as they were cheaper than horses, had fewer cows, and did most of their work by hand instead of machine.

To remember your trip, you can also dress up in the historical costumes of the time at the Photography Studio, and be taken in an authentic 1860's photograph. In addition to that, the village also offers Canadian crafts such as tinware, yarn and blankets. They also sell historical books, teas, spices, jams and marinades. You can also purchase village bread baked fresh daily, and cheese made from the factory.

We hope you will join us for this adventure back in time.

Four Ingredient Macaroons

- 1 (14 oz) bag shredded sweetened Coconut
- 1 (14 oz) can sweetened condense milk
- 2 cups chocolate chips 2/3 cup almonds, chopped

Preheat oven to 325° Line a large baking sheet/cookie sheet with parchment. Mix all ingredients together well in a large bowl. Drop by Tablespoons on a prepared sheet-about the size of large marbles. Wet your hands and press down on each "ball" to form a small disk. Bake 14 to 17 minutes or until coconut is brown at the edges and starts to get golden on the top. Cool for 1 minute on the sheets, then remove to a rack to cool completely.

Creamy Ham & Potato Soup

- 4 tbsp butter
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 cup celery, diced
- ½ tsp dried basil
- 3 cups water
- 2 medium potatoes with skin on, scrubbed well and cut in chunks
- 1 cup thickly diced ham'1/4 tsp black pepper
- ½ cup cornstarch
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 cup heavy cream, light cream or half and half
- Salt, to taste.

In a deep, heavy saucepan, melt butter over medium heat; add the onions, celery and basil.

Saute until the celery and onions are just beginning to get tender.. Add the water, potatoes, ham and pepper. Cook until potatoes are tender.

Mix the cornstarch with the water. Slowly add the cornstarch/water mixture to the soup. You may no have to add it all; do it in small steps. The final

consistency should be that of a very thick pudding-a spoon should almost stand straight up in it. Stir constantly until the mixture bubbles. Gradually add cream, stirring constantly, to thin the soup out to the desired consistency. You may have to use more cream, depending on the desired thickness. Add salt, if desired to taste. Heat through (do not boil) and serve with a salad or crusty roll. 4 servings

Banana Butter Nut Pancakes

1 Tbsp unsalted butter 1/4 cup pecans, chopped 2 medium bananas, mashed 1 1/2 cup baking mix 2 tbsp sugar 3/4 cup milk

Melt the butter over medium-high heat in a heavy skillet. When butter starts to sizzle, add the pecaans. Stir constantly until nicely toasted and you get that "buttered pecan" aroma. The butter will brown-just don't let it burn. Remove from heat and let the pecans cool to room temperatures.

In a large bowl, mix remaining ingredients and add the cooled pecans (and whatever butter remains in the skillet). Stir until combined. Grease your griddle by rubbing about ½ tsp butter around on it with a paper towel. Pour batter on griddle using a scant 14 cup of batter. When bubbles appear on top of the pancake, flip it and cook for another 3-5 minutes or until the underneath is golden brown. Keep warm in a 200° oven while you make the entire batch.

You ay need to add less or more milk depending on how much liquid is in the bananas. Start with a little less that ¾ cup and add enough to get a good thick pancake batter. Serve 4

Sausage & Rice Skillet

- 1 Tbsp butter
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 lb cooked bratwurst, sliced
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 small red bell pepper, seeded and chopped
- 2 cups broccoli florets
- 1 ½ cups cooked rice
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp onion salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1 cup extra-sharp cheddar cheese, shredded

Heat a large skillet over mediumhigh heat. Add butter and olive oil till butter sizzles. Add the sliced bratwurst and onions. Cook for about 5 minutes until onion is tender and sausage begins to brown.

Add the red bell pepper and broccoli. Cover, reduce heat, and cook about 5 minutes. Add the cooked rice, garlic powder, onion salt, and pepper. Combine well, cover, and heat until rice is hot. Add the shredded cheese and remove from heat. Stir until cheese is melted.
