

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

All service hours, or projects for service hours, <u>must be approved</u> prior to the start of the project of volunteering of the hours. The Troop sometimes conducts unit service projects on an ad hoc basis; these projects do not need prior approval.

All Scouts must participate in service projects approved by his Scoutmaster (or Service Committee) and may be done as an individual project, as a member of a patrol or as a troop project. These service projects prepare a Scout as they move up the ranks for the more involved service projects they must perform for the Star, Life, and Eagle Scout Ranks.

4.2.3.3 Service Projects

"Basic to the lessons in Scouting, especially regarding citizenship, service projects are a key element in council, district and unit programs. They should be a regular and critical part of the program in every pack, troop, crew, and ship.

Service projects required for ranks other than Eagle must be approved according to what is written in the requirements and may be conducted individually or through participation in patrol or troop efforts. They also may be approved for those assisting on Eagle Scout service projects. Service project work for ranks other than Eagle clearly calls for participation only. Planning, development, or leadership must not be required.

Time that Scouts spend assisting on Eagle service projects should be allowed in meeting these requirements. Note that Eagle projects do not have a minimum time requirement, but call for planning and development, and leadership of others, and must be pre approved by the council or district. Service Hours Requirement by Rank

- Tenderfoot Class Rank (1 Hour)
- Second Class Rank (2 Hours)
- First Class Rank (3 Hours)
- Star Rank (6 Hours)
- Life Rank (6 Hours including 3 conservation-related hours)

Eagle Rank

While a Life Scout, plan, develop, and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to any religious institution, any school, or your community. (The project must benefit an organization other than the Boy Scouts of America.) A project proposal must be approved by the organization benefiting from the effort, your Scoutmaster and unit committee, and the council or district before you start. You must use the Eagle Scout Service Project Workbook, BSA publication No. 512-927, in meeting this requirement. (To learn more about the Eagle Scout service project, see the Guide to Advancement, topics 9.0.2.0 through 9.0.2.16.)

- Submit this Community Service Hour form, complete with all signatures to your Scoutmaster for final approval and credit.
