Ocean Cruise Guests

Most ocean ships dock at the Passenger Terminal Amsterdam, just east of Central Station. From here, icons like Dam Square and canal cruise departures are within walking distance or a quick tram ride.

River Cruise Guests

River ships often dock even closer—sometimes right along the canals or near Central Station—placing you steps away from neighborhoods like Jordaan. You'll feel immersed immediately, often skipping the need for transport altogether.

Glide Through the Canals

No matter how you arrive, a canal cruise is essential. Even river cruisers benefit from a dedicated guided experience with operators like Blue Boat Company or Lovers Canal Cruises, which provide historical narration and unique routes.

Dive Into Dutch Masters

Amsterdam's compact Museum Quarter makes it easy to explore:

Rijksmuseum — Rembrandt, Vermeer, and Dutch Golden Age treasures

Van Gogh Museum — a must for art lovers

Anne Frank House — deeply moving; reserve ahead

Tip: Ocean cruise guests with limited time should pick one museum; river guests often have more flexibility to visit two.

Easy Day Trips from Amsterdam

Tulips, Windmills & Dutch Heritage

Keukenhof Gardens (Seasonal: Spring)

A must if you're visiting during tulip season, Keukenhof is one of the world's most spectacular flower parks, with millions of blooming tulips and vibrant displays.

Best for: Both ocean and river cruise guests (half-day trip)

Travel time: ~40 minutes

Zaanse Schans

Step into a postcard-perfect Dutch village at Zaanse Schans, where working windmills, wooden houses, and artisan workshops bring traditional Holland to life.

Best for: Short visits, great for ocean cruise guests

Travel time: ~20 minutes

Charming Dutch Cities

Haarlem

Just west of Amsterdam, Haarlem offers cobblestone streets, boutique shopping, and the impressive Grote Kerk.

Best for: Relaxed half-day exploration

Travel time: ~15 minutes by train

Utrecht

Often compared to Amsterdam—but quieter—Utrecht features unique canals with waterside cafés and the towering Dom Tower.

Best for: River cruise guests or longer stays

Travel time: ~25 minutes

The Hague (Den Haag)

Home to the Dutch government, The Hague blends culture and coastline. Visit the famous Mauritshuis to see Vermeer's *Girl with a Pearl Earring*.

Best for: Full-day trip

Travel time: ~50 minutes

Coastal Escape

Zandvoort

Need fresh sea air? Zandvoort is Amsterdam's go-to beach destination, perfect for a relaxing break from city sightseeing.

Best for: Summer visits
Travel time: ~30 minutes

Classic Dutch Experiences

Volendam & Marken

These traditional fishing villages—Volendam and Marken—offer colorful houses, harbor views, and a glimpse of old Dutch life.

Best for: Cultural immersion and photos
Travel time: ~30–40 minutes

Stick to closer options like Zaanse Schans, Haarlem, or Volendam—easy to fit into a half-day without stress.

River Cruise Guests (More Flexibility)

Take advantage of overnight stays with longer trips to Utrecht or The Hague, or combine multiple nearby villages in one day.

A two-star Michelin and Green Star restaurant focused on sustainable, locally sourced ingredients with creative presentation.

RIJKS

Located inside the Rijksmuseum, this Michelin-starred restaurant offers elevated Dutch cuisine tied to local ingredients and history.

💡 *Best for:* Pairing culture + cuisine in one stop

💡 *Cruise tip:* Ideal lunch stop after museum visit

Restaurant Bougainville

Overlooking Dam Square, this Michelin-starred spot blends creative European flavors with a central location.

💡 *Best for:* Ocean cruise guests wanting fine dining near the port

🍷 Elevated but Approachable Dining

Great for both cruise types—high quality without a full fine-dining time commitment.

Ron Gastrobar

A Michelin-star experience that's notably relaxed and accessible, with smaller plates and creative flavors.

Restaurant Sinne

Blends French and Mediterranean cuisine with global influences in a cozy setting.

Foodhallen

A trendy indoor food market with multiple vendors—perfect for sampling Dutch and international bites.

💡 *Best for:* Groups or indecisive eaters

The Pancake Bakery

A classic stop for Dutch pancakes (sweet or savory) in a canal-side setting.

💡 *Best for:* Quick lunch near major attractions

Cafe de Jaren

A spacious café with canal views serving light meals, coffee, and drinks.

💡 *Best for:* Relaxed break between sightseeing

Stroopwafels (fresh and warm from street vendors)

Herring stands for a true Dutch bite

Bitterballen (crispy meat snacks) often served with mustard
