Seattle is one of America's most scenic cruise gateway cities — a waterfront destination surrounded by mountains, islands, evergreen forests, coffee culture, seafood, glass art, markets, music history, and easy access to Alaska cruise departures. For cruise guests, Seattle works beautifully as a pre- or post-cruise stay because many top attractions are close to the waterfront, especially for guests sailing from Pier 66, while Pier 91 is only a short ride from downtown. The Port of Seattle operates two main cruise terminals: Bell Street Cruise Terminal at Pier 66 on the downtown waterfront and Smith Cove Cruise Terminal at Pier 91 near Magnolia/Queen Anne.

Cruise Port Tips

Seattle's two main cruise terminals serve different cruise lines and locations. Pier 66 / Bell Street Cruise Terminal is on the downtown waterfront and is home to Norwegian Cruise Line and Oceania Cruises, with Pike Place Market, the Seattle Aquarium, and the Great Wheel nearby. Pier 91 / Smith Cove Cruise Terminal serves Carnival, Celebrity, Cunard, Holland America, Princess, and Royal Caribbean, and is located near the north end of the waterfront, about 10 minutes from the Space Needle and retail core under normal conditions.

Tips:

Confirm whether your ship sails from Pier 66 or Pier 91.

Stay near Pike Place/Downtown Waterfront for the easiest Pier 66 access.

Stay near Seattle Center/Lower Queen Anne or Downtown for easier Pier 91 access.

Use rideshare, taxi, or cruise transfers if traveling with luggage.

Seattle traffic can be heavy on cruise mornings, especially during peak Alaska season.

Build in extra time for airport transfers.

If flying in the same day, keep your arrival time conservative.

For Alaska cruises, arrive at least one day early when possible.

Farine Bakery — Woodinville Hidden Gem

A stop at **Farine Bakery & Café** is a must when visiting Woodinville on a day trip from Seattle. This **Belgian-inspired bakery and café** brings a European bakery experience to the Eastside, with fresh breads, pastries, desserts, breakfast items, and café favorites made daily. Farine describes itself as a Belgian-inspired café offering house-made fresh breads, pastries, desserts, and bistro fare, with “farine” meaning flour — the heart of what they do.

What makes Farine special is the focus on **fresh, scratch-made baking**. Their team notes that they start from scratch every day to bring authentic French and Belgian breads, pastries, and other baked goods to the neighborhood. For visitors, that means this is not just a quick coffee stop — it is a true bakery experience with European-style pastries, buttery croissants, Belgian waffles, breads, breakfast plates, sandwiches, and beautiful desserts.

Reviewers frequently highlight Farine for its pastries, breakfast items, waffles, tarts, coffee, and welcoming café atmosphere. Review summaries mention favorites such as the **Brussels waffle, truffle croque madame, veggie breakfast sandwich, pistachio Paris-Brest**, and chocolate tarts, while another reviewer called the pastries “worth the stop,” specifically mentioning croissants and pain au chocolat. The Woodinville location is also noted as being new and already “buzzing,” with early reviews from visitors excited to have Farine in the area.

Recommended Items to Try

- **Belgian waffle or waffle dippers** — a great nod to Farine’s Belgian roots
- **Butter croissant** — simple, classic, and ideal with coffee
- **Pain au chocolat / chocolate croissant** — made with Belgian chocolate batons
- **Almond croissant** — a rich pastry option for croissant lovers
- **Farine basket** — perfect for sharing, with breads, croissant, pain au chocolat, house-made jams, and whipped butter
- **Eggs Benedict croissant** — a heartier brunch choice using Farine’s flaky croissant
- **French toast / pain perdu** — custard-soaked brioche with berries and whipped cream

- **Belgian hot chocolate** — a cozy choice made with Belgian dark chocolate syrup
- **Belgian white chocolate mocha** — ideal for a sweet coffee treat
- **Seasonal tarts or chocolate desserts** — especially good for an afternoon pastry stop

Why It Works on a Woodinville Day Trip

Farine is a perfect first stop before wine tasting or a relaxing mid-day break between tasting rooms. It gives guests a softer, slower start to the day with coffee, pastries, brunch, and fresh-baked comfort before exploring Woodinville’s wineries. For travelers who enjoy hidden gems, local cafés, and European-style bakeries, Farine adds a memorable and delicious touch to the Woodinville experience.
