AIIM has published its [annual report on the state of the Electronic Content Management industry](#). It "shows a much more mature user base, integrating existing and new ECM and Records Management suites, SharePoint portals and vertical market add-ons into genuinely universal information access and content management infrastructures."

→ Projecting Images onto Objects

Research done by Prof. Bruce Thomas at the University of South Australia in Adelaide has obvious potential for advertising and other media applications, but Intel is looking into the technology because it would allow alerts and instructions to be projected onto 3D objects to make them easier to use. This makes the technology (which requires "bending" the image so that it will look right once projected onto the object) an additional form of "augmented reality" with significant industrial applications including training and safety.
