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## Oops... U.S. Petascale Project Cancelled

In the KIT No. 51 we mentioned a U.S. supercomputing project, Blue Waters, that was meant to challenge Japan's and China's current supremacy in petascale computing. However, the alliance between IBM and the National Center for Supercomputing Applications (NCSA) has foundered over unexpected complexities and the resulting cost increases. In an August 8 joint statement, the partners announced the cancellation of their agreement.

Officially, NCSA expresses confidence that "its goal of building a sustained-petascale supercomputer remains achievable in a timely manner." Nonetheless, this is a serious setback. Currently, Japan holds the 1st and 5th spots in the TOP500 ranking, China has the 2nd and 4th spots, and the U.S. is No. 3 with the Jaguar system at Oak Ridge National Laboratory.
