→ **SEMAT White Paper**

At the end of 2009, Ivar Jacobson, Bertrand Meyer and Richard Soley started a new initiative called Semat (Software Engineering Method and Theory) with the aim of refounding software engineering as a rigorous discipline.

A January 15 [white paper](#) recaps the progress to date, how it relates to the Object Management Group's RFP for a "set of kernel elements and a language" allowing people to describe software methods in a formal and rigorous way, and the work that will need to be done after the OMG's adoption process completes.

→ **In Search of the Swiss Army Knife**

Responding to the discussion with Stéphane Dumothier, in The Kit No. 63, about "a single corporate social platform," Max Cacheux of AgreeYa Mobility pointed out that MS Office 365 (the cloud-based version of Office) provides unified access to documents, workflows, calendars, contacts, the Lync instant communication capability (instant messaging, voice and video) and Sharepoint collaboration in a single environment. Yet it may still be a stretch to call this unified platform a *social* one, at least in comparison to Cisco Quad, but the evolution of Sharepoint may get us there within a few years.

The next step is to provide native access to this environment from tablets and other mobile devices. That's precisely what AgreeYa, a Microsoft strategic partner, is piloting.

→ **What Is the World Coming To?**

The [announcement](#) that Target's experiment with "stores within a store" would include Apple mini-shops elicited a chorus of comments (uncoordinated) from a number of colleagues: "oh, now we really know that Steve Jobs is dead." It is remarkable that people quickly identify certain developments as unworthy of the Apple we knew and loved, *and* put it in personal terms about the late leader.

→ **Splitting an Application Over Many Screens**

Paul Hunkin, a student at the University of Waikato in New Zealand, developed ClusterGL, which allows an application to control a display wall of multiple screens to form one big picture, for example for an immersive Google Earth experience. Beside Google, NASA also uses the software.
