Process and Information Integration in the Oil & Gas Industry

Niklaus Wirth's Birthday Symposium Videos

Alright, we understand that most of you did not make it to Zurich to celebrate Niklaus Wirth's 80th birthday at the ETH on Feb. 20. Shame on you! But at least, you can now view video recordings of the talks, including one by Vint Cerf of Google, several talks on programming methods and languages, and a closing keynote by the honoree himself on "Reviving a computer system of 25 years ago." The title refers to the Oberon object-oriented programming system and the associated but now-defunct hardware. In the course of his lecture, Wirth also gives an overview of the history of programming languages and computer systems in the 1960s and 1970s.
