First Presbyterian Church of Alma



"Hear, O women, the word of the Lord, and let your ears receive the word of his mouth; teach to your daughters a dirge and each to her neighbor a lament." - Jeremiah 9.20

Author Cole Arthur Riley used this scripture passage to talk about how humans must be taught the art of lament. As she spoke at the Necessary Risks conference at Montreat in January she told us about the importance of developing emotional expression. Churches can be really good at telling people to smile and praise God for all the blessings we have (and we should!) but we aren't so good at lamenting. We don't show our anger or frustration or sadness well, perhaps partially because society teaches us to keep that inside. But, as bell hooks wrote, "Rarely, if ever, are any of us healed in isolation." The church should be a place in which we can share our joys and sorrows in community. It is a place where we can be ourselves and support one another.

Or, it should be.

Riley told us that we have to learn how to lament, because it isn't something that comes naturally to us. We have to know that we can cry. We can scream into the void. She told of a sacred practice she and her friends do once a year, going to a barn in the middle of the woods and just screaming their laments into the world. Sometimes we even just have to name it.

Lent is an excellent time to practice lament. Ash Wednesday begins on February 14. Some people find Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday at odds with each other, but I believe it makes sense. When we have a deep love for ourselves and other humans and for God, we acknowledge it not only through joy, but through grief, for we grieve that which we have deeply been attached. Cole Arthur Riley said, "True lament is a deep conviction the world can be better." We lament because we love the world, and right now the world is a mess.

So, this Lent, let's practice lament. Maybe that looks like writing down your sorrows, journaling it, and turning those laments on their head. I think when we look at the other side of laments, we can find a deep love and joy that is connected to the lament. Maybe you create a small group in which you can share one joy and one lament every time you gather. Maybe you pick up a book about lament, and you learn what it means to throw your hands in the air and ask "why?"

Join me as we lament this month. This year our goal as a congregation is to focus on the resources and gifts we have - something we looked at during the month of January. As we find new ways to use our gifts and resources, there might be times we remember or miss something or someone - a program we used to do, a mission, a person who has died or has gone to another church - and we can lament those events and those people, because we value them. The sacred experience of lament is always at our fingertips. But we might need practice.

When presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly meet, they are conducting the legislative and judicial business of the church and incur necessary expenses. There are also some necessary administrative expenses involved which enable these ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions to be performed. Historically, per capita has been used to fund these. Importantly, per capita funding enables governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without itself being funded by those same dollars.
