Reading John 21.1-19 I have been thinking about the disciples and how they exemplify the human experience. As we have considered what it means to live our lives with the Risen Christ, the disciples were the OGs at navigating this new concept. They got in their boats and went back to work. If you've ever gotten tragic news, you've felt that odd sense that the world keeps going even though perhaps you feel stuck in a moment. Or even as the world changes perhaps you try to find some stability in what is consistent for you.

The disciples' world is rocked when Jesus resurrects, so they might have just been going through the motions as they get in their boat to fish. All night they catch nothing. Jesus appears on the shore and asks if they have caught any fish (they haven't) then suggests they move their net to the right side of the boat. Did it even occur to them to move the net? That feels like some Fishing 101 to me - but I'm no expert. I also know that when we are in shock and processing information, we aren't always thinking as our best selves.

They move the net, they catch the fish. This passage brings to mind a book I recently read: Who Moved My Cheese? Apologies to session and those who have heard this story before. It's been around for a minute.

The story focuses on two mice and two people. I'm going to simplify for space saving measures. Every day the mice and the people go into the maze and find the cheese. The cheese is always in the same spot, and they return day after day. One mouse can smell that the cheese is turning one day, and begins to seek other cheese. One day, all the cheese in that one spot is gone, and the mice are gone. The people go through anger (who took my cheese?!) and giving up (we'll never find the cheese!). One person boldly decides to seek out new cheese. It takes energy and planning and false starts, but they eventually find new cheese - better cheese! The other human could not break out of their complaining long enough to seek new cheese.

This version of the story is simplified, and we're not looking for cheese - but if we look at where we are headed for the future, what is our "cheese?" What are we seeking? And rather than lamenting who took it, how do we find it now? Are we willing to put in some effort for a new cheese? The author of the book, Spencer Johnson, said: "The quicker you let go of old cheese the faster you find new cheese."


