Success Stories	<p>A family was discharged after their NICU stay with a baby that was only 3 pounds and 12 ounces. The baby could not utilize a standard car seat to go home in as the smallest ones start at 4 pounds to safely use. Through community collaboration, the car seat tech from Lutheran Services in Iowa was able to use a car bed, that has lower weight limits, from another tech at another local agency. The car seat tech from LSI provided the family with education on how to use their seat, through an interpreter as English is not their first language, and demonstrate how to put the baby in the car bed and the car bed in their vehicle. The family was able to safely discharge from the hospital and returned the car bed once their baby was able to meet the requirements to fit in a traditional rear facing car seat.</p>			

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
