Covid-19 continues to infect both child care centers and child care homes. RSV, croup,				

Barriers Encountered	adenoviruses, rhinoviruses, and hand, foot, and mouth virus have also infected many of the child care centers and child care homes. These viruses have left centers and homes scrambling for staff to stay in child/staff ratio. Some centers have had to close a room due to illness, while other centers remained open with staff and children moving to other rooms to keep in compliance with staff/child ratio.
Success Stories	The CCNC was trained by the I-Smile Program Coordinator and is able to provide oral health screenings, fluoride varnish applications, and referrals for dental care. (Performance measure 14A). Two child care centers and one child care home were able to receive these services a total of 148 children were seen. Forty-five of these children were high risk (needing dental services within 3 months) and twenty-six needed assistance with finding a dental home (have not been to a dentist in 3 or more years). Assisted 2 families of special needs children to enroll in 4 year old preschool. Both families were happy with the guidance and both children are doing well with first time preschool experience.
