

From Classroom Management to Classroom Leadership

1. Shift the Mindset

- Teaching is leadership, not control.
- Students are capable of ownership and responsibility.
- Changing mindset changes outcomes.

2. Redefine the Teacher Role

- Move from director to facilitator.
- Ask: How can I help you succeed?
- Remove obstacles instead of enforcing compliance.

3. Create Clear Structure

- Co-create classroom expectations.
- Make learning goals visible.
- Establish consistent routines.

4. Build Student Ownership

- Offer choice in learning and assessment.
- Encourage reflection and self-assessment.
- Return responsibility for learning to students.

5. Use Leadership Language

- Accountability instead of discipline.
- Ownership instead of obedience.
- Leadership instead of management.

6. Model Leadership

- Demonstrate empathy and consistency.
- Reflect openly and admit mistakes.
- Recognize leadership behaviors in students.
