Cornelius Jerome Jones Aug.12, 1944 -Oct. 11, 2018



CJ, as we so lovingly called him, served in several capacities at TMM, including director of development and administrator, from 1978 through 1990. He was the architect of many of TMM's programs during his tenure. During later years, he served in a consultancy role. CJ loved the Ministry and was a champion for the disenfranchised.

Whether at TMM or other organizations, CJ dedicated himself to improving the quality of life of others. He was involved in the Civil Rights Movement through SNCC. He also worked/served at Federation of Southern Cooperatives/ Emerging Land Fund; Foundation for the Mid-South; Mississippi Action for Community Education; and Voice of Calvary Ministries. He received several recognitions for his dedication and service, including the MS Civil Rights Legacy Award in 2017.

Mr. CJ is deeply missed by everyone who knew him.

Returned to Rebuild Dr. Scottye Holloway

"[Poor] Neighborhoods, both rural and urban, usually lack more than money. They also lack leadership." These are the sentiments of Dr. John M. Perkins, a pioneer of Christian Community Development and a man who spent decades implementing strategies designed to help empower communities of disenfranchised people. He argues that strengthening communities can best be done by building leaders and empowering leaders from within their own communities.

This model of ministry has been practiced at The Mendenhall Ministries (TMM) since the organization's inception. Mentors and leadership developers played very important roles in developing what we presently experience as The Mendenhall Ministries. TMM pioneers: John Perkins, Dolphus Weary, and Artis Fletcher, invested in the lives of many young people who participated in the programs TMM offered.

I am one of those who was blessed to be mentored and discipled by Dr. Dolphus Weary and Attorney Suzanne Griggins Keys when I was a college student. (Attorney Keys was the Director of TMM's Community Law Office at that time). I cannot begin to tell you how important it was that these leaders invested in me.

Equipped young Christians are the bridges that help organizations remain relevant and in touch with the people they serve.

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Billy Craft Retires

After 35 years of serving as TMM's Director of Business Affairs, Billy Craft retired in December 2018.

His retirement came after suffering a stroke and subsequent complications in June 2018.

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Youth Leadership Development Program

Eleven young people dedicated five weeks of their summer to discovering their [individual] purpose and developing their leadership skills and talents. After being interviewed and screened, the successful 11 participated in a two-day training session. After training, the participants served as leaders in the Summer Enrichment Program. They read and discussed Extraordinary by Darrin Patrick over the five weeks.

Participants paychecks were used to teach practical lessons in money management: banking, budgeting, saving, and most importantly, tithing. For some it was the first time they had banked or received a paycheck.

Some of their comments were:

"I learned many things, including leadership, patience, responsibility, and how to manage money."

"We made a documentary through which I learned a lot about my community."

"The greatest thing I got from the program was maturity. I learned that I cannot control anyone but myself: my actions, my words, and my reactions. Thanks for this experience."

"Thanks to TMM for this program; for turning a bunch of students into a hard-working, tight-knitted group with integrity."

"Before participating in this program I avoided eye contact with people. Now I am much more confident and sure of myself. Thank you for supporting me... and preparing me for my future."

Collaboration with Copiah-Lincoln Community College

The friendly, professional voice you hear when you call TMM belongs to either Mrs. Alma Jean Banks, or Mrs. Maxine Thornton. These ladies began serving at TMM May 2019, through the Senior Community Service Employment Program, (SCSEP), at Co-Lin Community College,

Mendenhall campus. Through the SCSEP, seniors receive onthe-job training over a one-year period at SCSEP partner organizations. Upon graduation, participants receive a certificate certifying them qualified and ready for the workplace.

This collaboration is a win-win endeavor for TMM. The Ministry is providing an important service to the community and the individuals participating in the program. At the same time, the need to fill a key position is being met at TMM.

Summer Enrichment Program

The Summer Enrichment Program got underway with interviews and training sessions early this spring. Students arrived June 3rd ready to learn. This unique 4½ week program provided opportunities for students, preschool through eighth grade, to continue their academic and social development. Highly gualified & certified teachers

And while we may not know how God will use those who are discipled, faithfulness requires that those in leadership do so with joy and earnestness.

The development of indigenous leaders has tremendous benefits. Indigenous leaders have passionate and vested interest in transforming their communities. They understand the people and are more prone to be holistic in addressing the issues.

I am blessed to be a product of two worlds. I was reared in a traditional African American Baptist Church where my father served as pastor. He gave me a biblical understanding of Salvation and what it means to follow Christ. To further my development, I took advantage of opportunities for growth by participating in the Youth Leadership Development Program at Mendenhall Ministries.

As the current President of The Mendenhall Ministries, (since May 2017), I can say that I developed a great vision for ministry during my earlier days here. I was impressed by what I saw: ministers with formal theological training investing themselves (at the grass root level) in others and impacting the community. I was also fascinated by their ability to explain Scripture. When I sensed God moving me into ministry, I reasoned that I needed formal training also. Without the model I saw at TMM. I am not sure I would have understood the significance of formal training. I was privileged to receive a Master's in Theology from Dallas Theological Seminary and a Doctorate from Bethel Theological Seminary in St. Paul Minnesota. These accomplishments, (along with my upbringing and my time at TMM), helped me to come to a deeper awareness of what God desired of me.

Volunteer Highlights

After pastoring for 30 years, I am back in Mendenhall serving in a capacity I never thought possible. An important part of my mission is helping young people come to know what God desires of them as they pursue His heart. TMM is therefore purposefully creating opportunities for former students to return, help re-build, and invest in the next generation.
