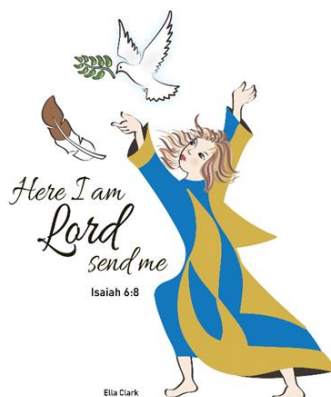

Kathy Burtnik has been committed to Catholic education for her entire life. She attended Catholic elementary and secondary schools in Niagara, as did her children and grandchildren.

Kathy was an avid volunteer in her children's schools and became involved in the Parent Council (now known as Catholic School Council) and was a familiar face at school events, supporting them in any way possible, with the goal of enriching each student's experience.

It was through this school connection that she decided to run as a Catholic school board trustee. She was first elected a trustee to the Lincoln County Roman Catholic Separate School Board in 1994. She served multiple terms as trustee, vice-chair and chair on that board, then after the amalgamation of school boards in 1998, (Niagara Catholic District School Board) until her retirement from public service in 2022.

During her tenure as a Catholic school trustee, she served as a trustee representative on Niagara Catholic's Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) and Niagara Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (NCPIC), ensuring their voices were heard at the trustee table. She supported their initiatives at events and activities and was consistently an advocate for their support of students.

For these very tangible reasons and for the countless other examples of her commitment and dedication to Catholic education and Niagara Catholic, we are proud to present Kathy Burtnik, a long-time friend and advocate for Catholic education, with a Niagara Catholic Education **Award of Distinction**.

| Month of the Holy Spirit & The Holy Eucharist |

Catholic Culture



The month of April is dedicated to The Holy Spirit and The Holy Eucharist.

The first nineteen days of the month fall during the season of Lent which is represented by the liturgical color violet or purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

April 20th is Easter Sunday and the beginning of the Easter

season. The liturgical color is white — the color of light, a symbol of joy, purity and innocence (absolute or restored).

As our Lenten journey comes to a close, we prepare to follow Christ all the way to the cross and to witness His glorious Resurrection. Hopefully we have sacrificed and prayed so that we are now able to more fully reap the fruits of a well-spent Lent. After our solemn commemoration of the last days and death of Our Lord, we will spend the remainder of the month of April celebrating. As Spring breaks forth, even nature will join us as buds and blooms begin to surface, and we spend this month basking in the joy of the Resurrection. We continue throughout the entire month our cry, “Christ is risen, Christ is truly risen.”

The Feast of Divine Mercy offers us the opportunity to begin again as though we were newly baptized. The unfathomable mercy of God is made manifest today if we but accept His most gracious offer. Easter is the feast

of feasts, the unalloyed joy and gladness of all Christians. This truly is “the day that the Lord has made.” From Sunday to Sunday, from year to year, the Easters of this earth will lead us to that blessed day on which Christ has promised that He will come again with glory to take us with Him into the kingdom of His Father.



The feasts and saints that we will focus on this month — those who have already shared in the rewards of the Resurrection are:

St. Francis of Paola (April 2),
St. Isidore of Seville (April 4),
St. Vincent Ferrer (April 5),
St. John Baptist de la Salle (April 7),
St. Stanislaus of Cracow (April 11),
St. Peter Chanel and **St. Louis Marie de Montfort**, (April 28),
St. Catherine of Siena (April 29),
and **St. Pius V** (April 30).

These feasts are superseded by Holy Week, the Octave of Easter or Sunday liturgies:

St. Martin I (April 13),
St. Anselm (April 21),
Sts. George and Adalbert (April 23),
St. Fidelis (April 24), and
St. Mark, Evangelist (April 25).

The month of April is a wonderful time of year. Not only is spring very much in the air -- with the trees blossoming, winter coats stored away, and lighter evenings -- it's also a time of great celebrations in the Catholic Church. While some are grand, others are more simple, but they come with a touch of grace.

Although Easter often takes center stage, there's so much more to celebrate in April. So here's a little guide to the best Catholic moments this month, with some ideas on how to make the most of them:

Eastertide

Obviously the list has to start with Easter. However, while the world often focuses on Easter as a day to snaffle copious amounts of chocolate, Catholics know the truth — Easter isn't just a day; it's a whole season! The 50 days of Eastertide stretch all the way to Pentecost, meaning we have plenty of time to bask in the Resurrection's joy. Divine Mercy Sunday (First Sunday after Easter)

It's a perfect time to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet, go to confession, and maybe even extend some mercy to that one family member who always takes the last slice of cake. (Yes, even them.)

A saintly lineup worth celebrating

April is packed with incredible saints, including:

St. Gemma Galgani (April 11) – The patron saint of students and pharmacists, she was a mystic who had an incredible devotion to Christ's Passion. If you've got exams coming up, she's your go-to intercessor.

St. Bernadette Soubirous (April 16) – The visionary of Lourdes, reminding us of the beauty of faith, perseverance, and the power of Our Lady's intercession.

St. George (April 23) – Famous for slaying a dragon (metaphorically or not, it's still pretty impressive), St. George inspires us to face our own dragons — whether they're fear, doubt, or a mountain of laundry.

St. Mark the Evangelist (April 25) – The Gospel writer who reminds us that sharing the Good News is a job for all of us. Maybe take a

moment to share an uplifting Bible verse on social media instead of your latest vacation pic, or delicious dessert.

A little Marian love: The month before May

While May is the traditional month of Mary, April gives us a great chance to warm up our Marian devotion. Why not start incorporating the Angelus (substituting the Regina Caeli during Eastertide!) or the Rosary into your daily routine? Bonus points if you do it outside among the fresh spring blooms.

Earth Day (April 22): Caring for God's Creation

April also brings Earth Day, a perfect reminder that stewardship of the earth is part of our Catholic call. Plant a tree, clean up a park, or simply take a moment to thank God for the beauty of nature. (Of course, as it is spring, you might find even greater joy in caring for your garden, or giving your indoor plants a little extra love.)

Spring cleaning for the soul

April, with its themes of renewal and mercy, is a great time for a little spiritual spring cleaning. Go to confession, let go of grudges, and refresh your prayer life. And if you happen to declutter your home in the process, well, consider it an added grace.

So there you have it — a month full of faith, joy, and opportunities for renewal. Why Should You Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet?

When I first heard about the Divine Mercy Chaplet, I thought it was ridiculous.

That was in the year 2000, when St. Pope John Paul II canonized St. Faustina and granted universal observance of the Feast of Divine Mercy annually on the Second Sunday of Easter. Up to that point, I'd never heard of Divine Mercy, nor did I know much about chaplets in general. So, I knew nothing about the Divine Mercy Chaplet.

We have the Rosary; why do we need anything else? I thought to myself.

I figured one bead-related devotion was plenty. The Blessed Mother herself had given the devotion to St. Dominic (d. 1221), citing 15 promises to all who pray the Rosary. “Whatever you ask in the Rosary will be granted,” she told him.

Then she promised this:

1. Whoever shall faithfully serve me by the recitation of the Rosary, shall receive signal graces.
2. I promise my special protection and the greatest graces to all those who shall recite the Rosary.
3. The Rosary shall be a powerful armor against hell, it will destroy vice, decrease sin, and defeat heresies.
4. The Rosary will cause virtue and good works to flourish; it will obtain for souls the abundant mercy of God; it will withdraw the hearts of men from the love of the world and its vanities, and will lift them to the desire for eternal things. Oh, that souls would sanctify themselves by this means.
5. The soul which recommends itself to me by the recitation of the Rosary, shall not perish.
6. Whoever shall recite the Rosary devoutly, applying himself to the consideration of its sacred mysteries shall never be conquered by misfortune. God will not chastise him in His justice, he shall not perish by an unprovided death; if he be just, he shall remain in the grace of God, and become worthy of eternal life.
7. Whoever shall have a true devotion for the Rosary shall not die without the sacraments of the Church.
8. Those who are faithful to recite the Rosary shall have during their life and at their death the light of God and the plenitude of His graces; at the moment of death, they shall participate in the merits of the saints in paradise.
9. I shall deliver from Purgatory those who have been devoted to the Rosary.
10. The faithful children of the Rosary shall merit a high degree of glory in Heaven.
11. You shall obtain all you ask of me by the recitation of the Rosary.

12. All those who propagate the Holy Rosary shall be aided by me in their necessities.
13. I have obtained from my Divine Son that all the advocates of the Rosary shall have for intercessors the entire celestial court during their life and at the hour of death.
14. All who recite the Rosary are my sons and daughters, and brothers and sisters of my only Son Jesus Christ.
15. Devotion of my Rosary is a great sign of predestination.

I figured that just about covers everything.

Given, those promises, I viewed similar devotions as a waste of time. Until, that is, I heard St. Pope John Paul II's words in regard to St. Faustina and the devotion to Divine Mercy.

In his homily during the canonization Mass of St. Faustina, he said:

“Today my joy is truly great in presenting the life and witness of *Sr Faustina Kowalska* to the whole Church as a gift of God for our time. By divine Providence, the life of this humble daughter of Poland was completely linked with the history of the 20th century, the century we have just left behind. In fact, it was between the First and Second World Wars that Christ entrusted his message of mercy to her. Those who remember, who were witnesses and participants in the events of those years and the horrible sufferings they caused for millions of people, know well how necessary was the message of mercy.”

I was curious. Who is this Polish sister who so touched the heart of John Paul II?

So, I read her diary, cover to cover. Then, I read about the devotions connected with Divine Mercy – the promises, novena, and, yes, the Chaplet. What I discovered was like a lightning bolt zapping my heart.

I was especially “zapped” by what Jesus had told St. Faustina about the chaplet.

“Say unceasingly the Chaplet that I have taught you. Whoever will recite it, they will receive great mercy at the hour of death. Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy.” (Diary, 687)

I still do pray the Rosary daily, and often, a number of times throughout the day. That’s a mainstay in my spiritual schedule. But the Divine Mercy Chaplet has become a mainstay as well.

May 12-23, 2025 with Fr. Peter T. Rowe



Dear Pilgrims, Parishioners, and Friends:

To find ourselves in close proximity to the holy touches something that is essential to our humanity. Along the way, you may find places that tug at your heart more deeply than others. On the whole, the fruits of the journey will be inestimable!

For you who have been on a pilgrimage with me before, you'll find this one to be very compact in terms of distances covered. If you haven't journeyed with me before, I sure welcome you to the adventure! You'll meet many wonderful people, and we'll traverse four (and more) major river basins: the Meuse, the Mosel, the Somme, and the Seine – all crossroads of European history.

We begin in the Netherlands. In its southeast is Limburg, our base for visits into eastern Belgium and Germany. While perhaps not as well-known as more famous Marian shrines, nonetheless Banneux and

Beauraing in Belgium are worth a prayerful visit. The German cities of Aachen and Trier are saturated with historical significance, from Rome's empire to Charlemagne's. Nearby Luxembourg beckons, too.

Our pilgrimage complements Pope Francis' own pilgrimage to Catholic Belgium and Luxembourg (2024) and looks back to St. John Paul being in the Benelux countries forty years earlier (1985). For a small country, Belgium has a remarkable number of cities of art: among them, Brussels, Gent, and Brugge introduce us to the Flemish Masters. We commemorate the sacrifices of so many "in Flanders fields" as we take in Ieper (Ypres), Passchendaele, and Vimy. After traversing the north of France to behold its great cathedrals, we arrive in Paris for an enjoyable couple of days in the city and vicinity.

DAY 1, MONDAY-JULY 7

FLIGHT TO DUBROVNIK

We fly to Dubrovnik via Vienna. Relax and enjoy your flights. Complimentary meals and in-flight movies on transatlantic flight only. Group seating for our flight will be pre-assigned by the airline.

DAY 2, TUESDAY-JULY 8

MEDJUGORJE

After landing in Dubrovnik airport and collecting our luggage, we meet our guide and depart for Medjugorje. We will arrive at our hotel and get some rest after the long journey. Each evening, we will attend the parish evening programme which begins with the Rosary followed by Holy Mass and depending on the day, we finish with adoration.

Dinner

Since 1981, in this small village of Medjugorje in Bosnia-Herzegovina, the Blessed Virgin Mary has been appearing and giving messages to the world. These years that She is spending with us are a time of special Grace granted by God. In Her own words She tells us, "I have come to tell the world that God exists. He is the fullness of life, and to enjoy this fullness and peace, you must return to God".

DAYS 3 TO 5, WEDNESDAY TO FRIDAY-JULY 9 TO 11

MEDJUGORJE

During our stay, you will experience the beauty and peace of this simple village and have the opportunity to share your faith with pilgrims from all over the world. Here are some of the activities planned for our visit:

Daily Mass: Each morning at St. James Church for Mass.

Climb Apparition Hill: Recite the Rosary while climbing the hill to the place where the visionaries first encountered Our Lady.



Climb Cross Mountain: In 1933, the villagers built a 30' high cross atop a mountain to commemorate Jesus' passion and death on the cross. Climb to the top, stopping 14 times along the way to rest and Pray the Stations of the Cross.

We get settled in our hotel, enjoy dinner and retire for the evening.

DAY 8, MONDAY-JULY 14

SAN GIOVANNI ROTONDO: ST. PADRE PIO

This Morning we pray at the Old Church, tour the sanctuary and view the crucifix, in front of which St. Padre Pio received the stigmata. We also see the humble saint's confessional from where St. Padre Pio spent an innumerable number of hours listening to the faithful's confession. Later visit to the Grotto of St. Michael the Archangel in Cagnano Varano.

Overnight: San Giovanni Rotondo

Breakfast, Dinner

DAY 9, TUESDAY-JULY 15

SAN GIOVANNI ROTONDO-LANCIANO-ROME

We say goodbye to Padre Pio and depart towards Lanciano, where we see the greatest Eucharistic Miracle— a consecrated Host that turned into human flesh and has remained so for centuries. Carol Wojtyla, then Cardinal of Krakow, visited the SS. Relics of the Eucharistic Miracle on November 3, 1974. On the guestbook the Supreme Pontiff John Paul II expressed his devotion so: "Let us always believe more in you, have hope in you, love you." Continue our journey to Rome and check-in at our hotel for the last 3 nights of our pilgrimage.

Sep 2 Afternoon departure from Toronto to Athens on Air Canada direct flight
 Sep 3 Upon arrival in Athens, you are met by your guide and bus driver. Transfer to your hotel. There will be a walking tour with Mass at the Cathedral. Dinner, then free time - overnight at the hotel.
 Sep 4 Today we visit Athens, we see the ruins of the Parthenon, the Erechtheum & the Propylae. We will ascend Mars Hill where Paul spoke to the ancient Athenians about the one & only God. From here we have an excellent view of the ancient agora, former center of the Athenian public life. Afternoon you will visit the Olympic Stadium, where they were first held in 1896 and then also a tour of the current Olympic Stadium. Afterward free time in Plaka before returning to the hotel. Dinner and overnight.



Sep 5 This morning you will board the ship and sail to the world-famous island of **Mykonos**. The town is a small architectural miracle, with its gleaming, white-washed buildings and windmills, and one of the most cosmopolitan places in the world.
 Sep 6 In the morning you will arrive in **Kusadasi**, Turkey, and drive to **Ephesus**, there we will have Mass at the House of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The impressive remains of Ephesus include the **Agora**, the **Theater**, the **Stadium**, the **Library of Celsius**, the ruins of the **Temple of Diana** (one of the "Seven Wonders of the Ancient World") and many more. Later, you will sail for the island of **Patmos**, where you can choose to visit the **Monastery of St. John**, on one of the island's highest points. From there, you will walk down to the **Grotto of the Apocalypse**, the site of the apocalyptic Revelations of St. John the Divine.



Sep 7 In the morning arrive at Heraklion, Crete, where you can choose to visit the Minoan Palace of **Knossos**, home to king Minos and his legendary beast, the Minotaur. Then, sail north to the island of **Santorini**, the most breathtaking of all the Greek islands. The exquisite, whitewashed villages, including the town of **Fira**, or Thira, cling to volcanic cliffs, accessible by cable-car, or mule.

Sep 8 You arrive in **Pireaus**, Athens, early in the morning and, after breakfast, you disembark and begin your trip to **Meteora**, which has particularly impressive scenery. Continue to the Meteora Monasteries, perched upon the summits of gigantic rocks, which have been etched into variety of strange shapes. Dinner and overnight at our hotel.



Sep 9 We become acquainted with this great city, the "Queen of the North", where Paul wrote two epistles to the ancient **Thessalonians**. Our city tour takes us to the Arch of Galerius on the Via Egnatia, where we look over the second largest city of Greece from the Old City ramparts.

Sep10 We visit the beautiful city of **Kavala** (ancient Neapolis), and from there on to **Philippi** which was a Roman garrison town and the chief city in the province of Macedonia. Next, we visit the Panagia Eikosifinita Monastery. We return to Thessaloniki for dinner and overnight.

Sep11 We continue to **Veria** (Beroea) where we visit the monument dedicated to Paul; we see the Bema where he stood and preached to the people of Veria. Then to Vergina is where Philip built a massive palace and a theatre. The tomb of Philip was found here undisturbed in 1977, full of treasures that are now on display in Thessaloniki's Archaeological Museum. Enjoy a wine tour and wine tasting at a local winery. Continue to Athens. Tonight, you will enjoy a cooking demonstration on Greek cuisine and will enjoy a farewell dinner at a local Greek restaurant.



Sep12 We board our coach for **Corinth**, taking the coastal road along the Saronic Gulf to the Corinth Canal, which connects the Aegean Sea with the Ionian Sea. Short stop for pictures and continue to the site of ancient Corinth, Paul's beloved city and site of his most extensive ministry. Time for leisure at the port of Cenchrea. Before taking the way back to Athens we will stop to a Greek traditional olive oil farm! You will see how the olive oil is made and taste it. Dinner and overnight at our hotel.

His Excellency Bishop Gerard Bergie extends an invitation to join him on pilgrimage to Rome and to enter through the Holy Doors of St. Peter's Basilica, the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran and the Basilica of St. Mary Major during the 2025 Jubilee Year.

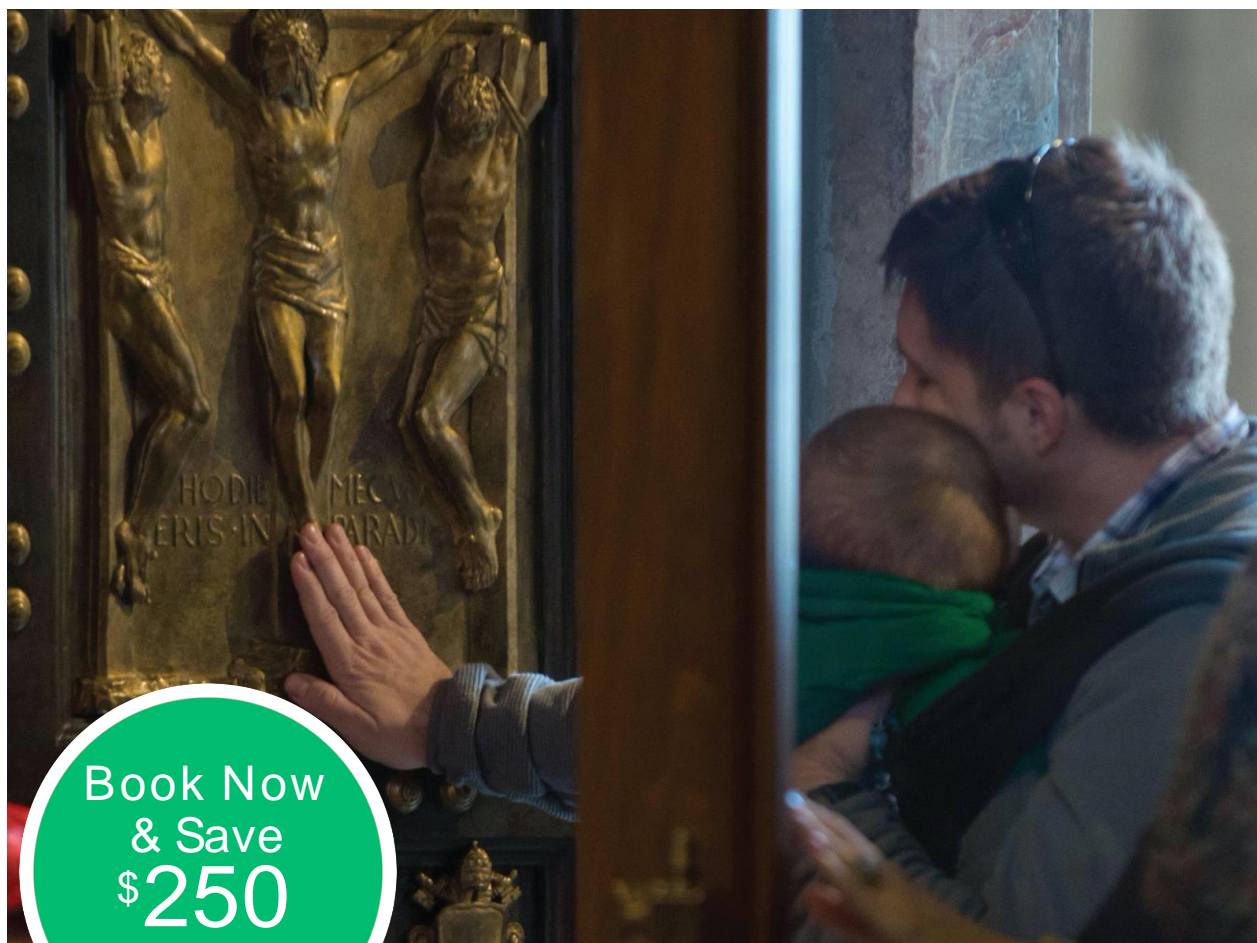
This Spiritual Journey starts on October 16th with a Toronto flight to Rome and coach to Assisi where we honour and pray at the tomb of Blessed Carlo Acutis. The tour continues with a full day tour in Assisi. On the way to San Giovanni Rotondo (Shrine of Padre Pio of Pietrelcina) we stop in Lanciano (Eucharistic Miracle of Jesus.) Via the Montecassino monastery, we reach Rome, enter through the Holy Doors and receive a Papal Blessing. The return flight is scheduled for October 24.

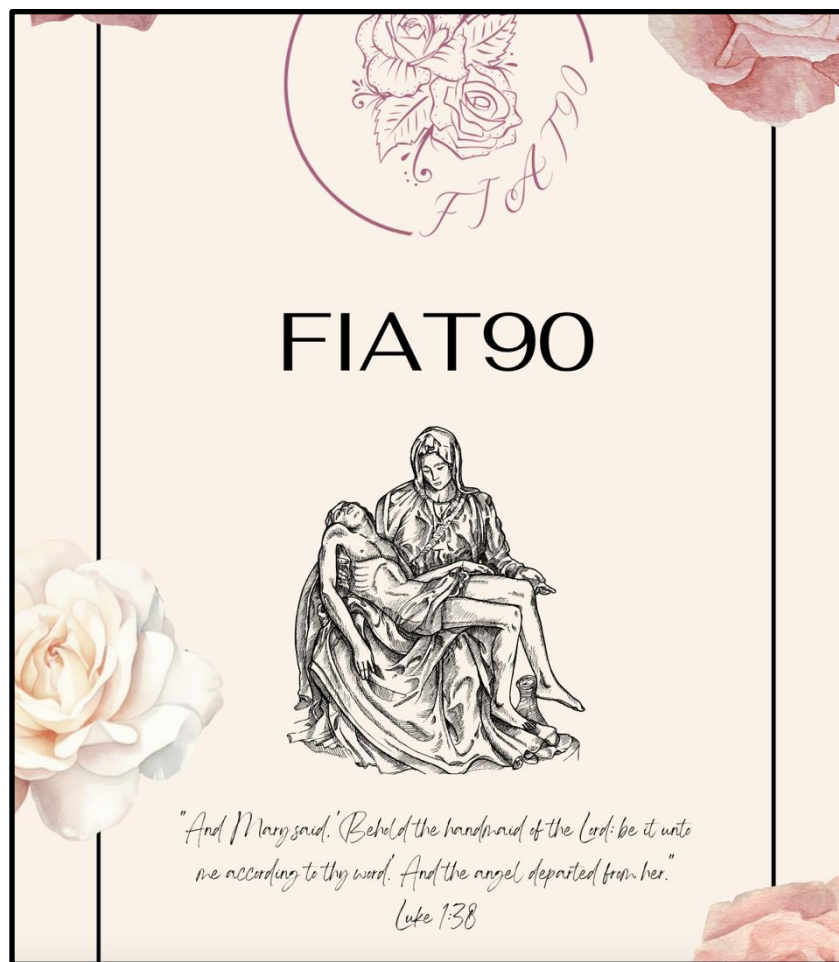

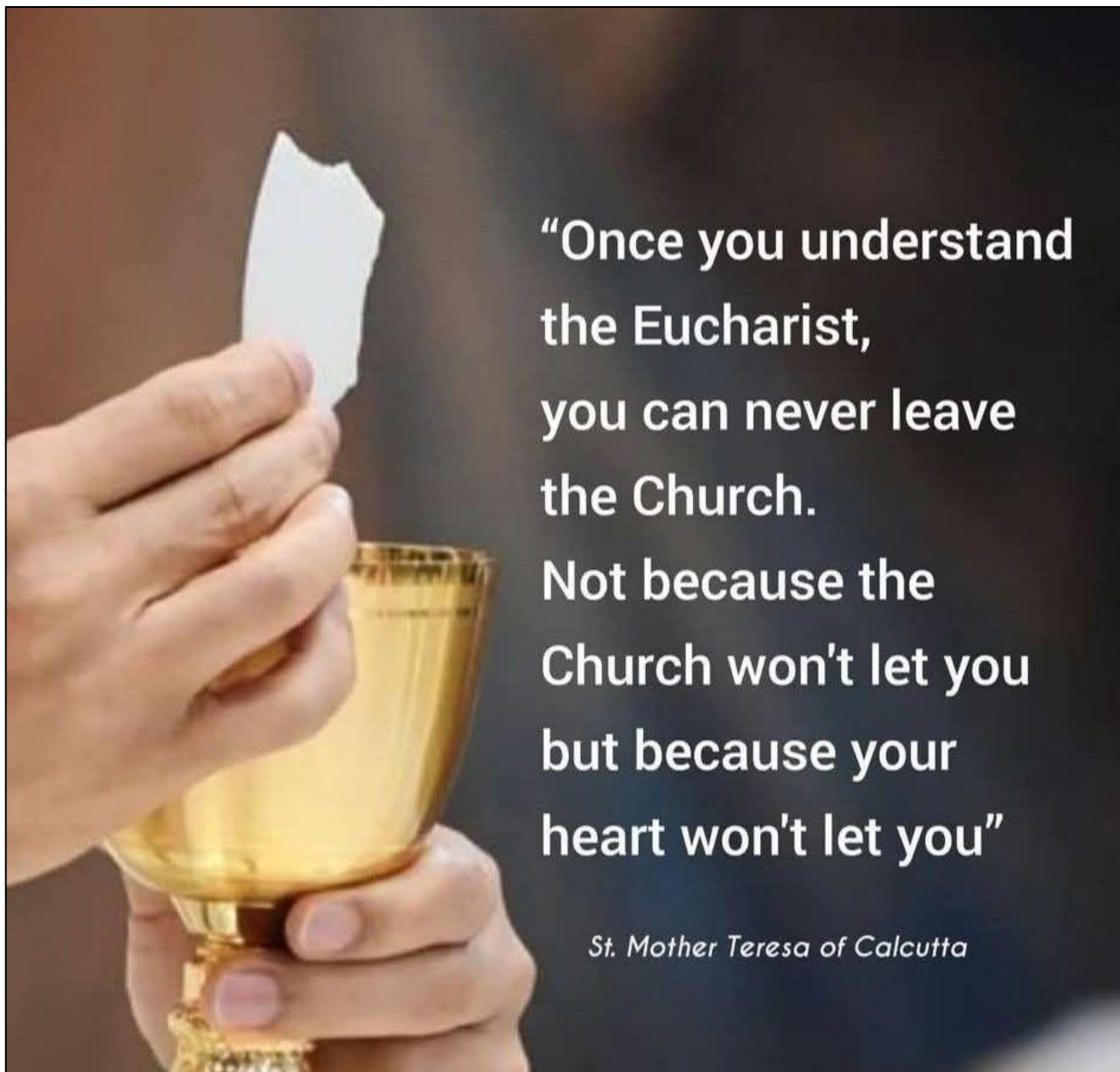
