





FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


The Tippecanoe Soil & Water Conservation District had an income of \$ 188,556.09 plus \$235,415.28 for 3 salaries and fringe benefits paid through the county and \$12,300 in-kind building space, utilities and supplies paid by NRCS. The total expenses of \$144,155.03 plus salaries and in-kind. Our net gain for 2024 was \$44,401.06.






