Order now through April 16th, 2021

Although we strive to provide all of the plants listed, there may be times when these species become unavailable from the local nurseries. If the listed species are not available at the time of delivery, we will work with the nurseries to substitute a similar plant species.

Please note that all sales are final, however, you have the right to refuse plants ordered at the time of pick up if dissatisfied. A refund, minus a 5% restocking fee, will be issued by check within one week.

There are two options available for order pick up:

Option 1: Grab & go. Schedule a pick up time on **Friday, May 7th**. Orders will be placed on tables in front of the Dining Hall. There will be no contact and pick up will be outdoors. Simply grab your order and go. There will not be the opportunity to purchase additional plants at this time.

Option 2: Public Sale & Native Plant Fest. There are no scheduled pick up times to get your order, just stop by on **Saturday, May 8th** between 9:00 am and 3:00 pm. You will also have the option to shop for additional plants at the Public Sale. Other activities, like hikes and presentations, will be available at this time as a part of Native Plant Fest.

After all orders are in, we will contact you about your pick up preference.

Wildflowers

Aquilegia canadensis (Columbine) - Red and yellow bell-shaped flowers appear in late spring providing nectar for pollinators like hummingbirds. Prefers well-drained sites in shade to part shade. Reaches 2 to 3 feet tall. Deer resistant.

Asclepias incarnata (Marsh Milkweed) - Clusters of bright pink flowers appear in July and August. An excellent plant for adding color to difficult wet areas, it will also grow in any moist garden soil in full sun. This plant reaches 3 to 4 feet in height. Vanilla-scented flowers. Host plant to Monarch butterflies.

Asclepias sullivantii (Sullivant's Milkweed) - A resident of moist to wet prairies, this milkweed species reaches 3 to 4 feet tall with clusters of pink flowers in July through August. Host plant for Monarch Butterfly. Similar in appearance to Common Milkweed, but less aggressive.

Baptisia australis (Blue False Indigo) - A spectacular specimen in the perennial garden! This plant produces long spikes of beautiful blue flowers in May and June, and has blue-green foliage. Later in the season, large dark seed pods make an interesting addition to dried arrangements. Mature plants are 3 to 4 feet high with an equal spread.

Chelone glabra (White Turtlehead) - Blooms in August through September with white flowers sometimes tinged with pink. Does best in part shade with moist to wet soils. Reaches 2 to 4 feet tall. Host plant to the Baltimore Checkerspot butterfly.

Echinacea purpurea (Purple Coneflower) - Large pink-purple flowers with spiny orange centers appear in July & August. The hardy drought-resistant plants grow 3 to 4 feet tall. Thrives in full sun or partial shade. The flowers are excellent for cutting and attract butterflies.

Filipendula rubra (Queen of the Prairie) - This regal plant reaches up to 5 feet tall, topped with a showy pink cloud of flowers. Prefers moist sites with part shade to full sun. It makes a great accent plant for the flower garden.

Geranium maculatum (Wild Geranium) - Forms a 1 foot tall mound of foliage with pink flowers in April through May. Excellent in woodland gardens, and can tolerate full sun if there is adequate moisture.

Hibiscus moscheutos (Swamp Rose Mallow) - Large, showy, white to pink flowers atop 3 to 6 feet tall plants. Prefers full sun. Does well in moist soils to standing water. Flowers visited by Ruby-Throated Hummingbirds and other pollinators.

Iris virginica shrevei (Blue Flag Iris) - Blue iris reaching 2 to 3 feet tall. Native to wetlands, it grows well in moist soil to shallow water. Prefers partial to full sun. Blue-purple flowers appear from May through July. Great for rain gardens and ponds.

Liatris spicata (Dense Blazing Star) - Showy pink-purple spikes bloom in July through August and are favorites of bees and butterflies. Good cut flower. Prefers wet to moist soils and full sun. Plants grow 3 to 5 feet tall.

Lobelia cardinalis (Cardinal Flower) - Brilliant red flowers along tall spikes appear in August & September. Excellent for attracting hummingbirds. Grows 2 to 5 feet in moist to wet soils in sun or partial shade.

Lobelia siphilitica (Great Blue Lobelia) - Spikes of blue flowers appear in August and September on 2 to 3 feet tall plants. Very adaptable, this plant will grow in sun or shade in moist to wet soils.

Monarda fistulosa (Bergamot) - Also known as Bee Balm. Showy pink flowers appear from June through August above fragrant foliage. Prefers full sun. Spreads vigorously. A favorite of pollinators.

Oenothera pilosella (Prairie Sundrops) - Bright yellow flowers bloom in June and July on this foot-tall plant. Found in moist and wet prairies in full sun. Becomes dormant later in the season. May spread aggressively, but is shallow-rooted and easy to pull.

Penstemon digitalis (Foxglove Beardtongue) - White, tube-shaped flowers that are long-lasting. Blooms in June. Plants reach 1 to 2 feet tall. Prefers sun to part-shade. Tolerant of clay soils. Visited by hummingbirds and bees.

Ratibida pinnata (Yellow Coneflower) - Yellow flowers appear on 3 to 5 feet plants in July and August. Prefers full sun and moist conditions. Also known as Gray-headed Coneflower. Flowers on slender stalks that tend to sway in the breeze. Host plant for Silver Checkerspot butterfly.

Rudbeckia fulgida speciosa (Showy Black-Eyed Susan) - Gold petals surrounding a dark brown center make for showy flowers. Plants reach 2 to 3 feet tall and bloom in August through September. Deer resistant.

Scutellaria incana (Downy Scullcap) - Native to moist to dry woods, growing to 2 feet tall in partial to full shade. True blue flowers appear in late June and July. An excellent plant for the shady perennial border or woodland garden.

Sedum ternatum (Wild Stonecrop) - Native to moist woods, this native groundcover does well in shady rock gardens. It reaches only about 3 inches tall and has white flowers in May. Round, succulent, evergreen leaves.

Silene regia (Royal Catchfly) - Bright red, star-shaped flowers reaching 2 to 4 feet tall. Prefers moist, well-drained soil and part shade to sun. Attracts hummingbirds and other pollinators.

Wildflowers (cont.)

Solidago caesia (Blue-stemmed Goldenrod)- A 1 to 2 feet tall plant with blue-purple stems covered with many small, yellow flowers. Does well in dappled shade at the edge of woodlands. Prefers moist to dry conditions. Provides nice fall color in September through October. Does not spread aggressively.

Solidago speciosa (Showy Goldenrod) – A beautiful species of well-drained prairies, it produces conical spires of bright golden flowers in September and early October. Forms a showy clump in full sun with well-drained soil. A pollinator favorite!

Stylophorum diphyllum (Celadine Poppy) – A 1 to 2 foot tall showy, yellow flower for woodland and shade gardens. Blooms from March to June, and under optimum conditions, will have secondary blooms through summer. Great early spring color!

Symphotrichum novae-angliae (New England Aster) - Purple to pink blooms in September - October, make it a great late-season nectar source for pollinators. Reaches 3 to 5 feet tall, but can be pinched back for shorter, bushier plants. Prefers moist to wet sites.

Symphotrichum oolentangiense (Sky Blue Aster) - A beautiful low stature aster of well-drained prairies and savannas. It features attractive blue flowers on two feet tall plants in September and early October. Easily grown in full sun and ordinary garden soil.

Tradescantia ohioensis (Ohio Spiderwort) - Blue-purple flowers appear from June through July on 2 to 3 feet tall plants with grass-like foliage. Tends to bloom in the morning and close in mid-day sun. Adaptable to a variety of site conditions.

Vernonia fasciculata (Smooth Ironweed) - Produces purple flowers in August to September and reaches 3 to 6 feet tall. Prefers sun and moist sites. Host plant to the American Painted Lady butterfly. Often found in old pastures. Can spread aggressively.

Veronicastrum virginicum (Culver's Root) - White, candelabra-like flowers produced in July and August. 3 to 6 feet tall. Prefers moist to wet sites in sun to part shade. Great accent plant in a flower bed.

Zizia aurea (Golden Alexanders) – Yellow flowers appear in mid to late spring on two feet tall plants. Native to moist to wet prairies and floodplain woods. Prefers moist soil and full sun to filtered shade. Host plant for Black Swallowtail butterflies.

Grasses & Sedges

Carex radiata (Straight-Styled Wood Sedge) – Delicate, wispy foliage reaching a foot tall. Native to moist and wet woods, it prefers shade. Excellent for use as a clumping ground cover or a border.

Chasmanthium latifolium (Northern Sea Oats) – This 2 to 3 feet tall grass has a showy seedheads that dangle from arching stems. Grass turns a bronze color in the fall. Self seeds, and can spread aggressively on wetter sites. Good winter interest!

Panicum virgatum (Switchgrass) - This clump-forming grass reaches 3 to 5 feet tall and is topped with airy seedheads in late summer. Native to prairies, it prefers sun and moist conditions. Can be used as a replacement for invasive Miscanthus grass.

Schizachyrium scoparium (Little Bluestem) - A medium stature grass with exceptional ornamental qualities. Attractive bluish-green foliage grows to 2 to 3 feet tall. Fluffy seed emerges in August. The foliage turns beautiful shades of reddish brown in autumn, remaining attractive through the winter.

Sporobolus heterolepis (Prairie Dropseed) - This fine-textured prairie grass forms a graceful fountain of bright green foliage. Delicately scented, airy seedheads appear in mid to late summer. This outstanding ornamental grass develops slowly, but is worth the wait. Plant in full sun in well-drained soil for best results.

Preselected Mixes

Pollinator Mix – This 34 plant mix includes 8 species of wildflowers (Purple Coneflower, Bergamot, Hairy Penstemon, Mountaint Mint, Royal Catchfly, Showy Goldenrod, Sky-blue Aster, Golden Alexanders) and 2 grass species (Little Bluestem & Prairie Dropseed) adapted to full sun. Bloom times are staggered for flowering throughout the season. Designed to benefit pollinators, such as hummingbirds, butterflies and bees by providing nectar, pollen, food for caterpillars or shelter.

Rain Garden Mix – The 34 plants in this mix thrive in full sun and will handle temporary wet conditions associated with rain gardens. Includes 8 wildflower species (Marsh Milkweed, Purple Coneflower, Blue Flag Iris, Dense Blazing Star, Cardinal Flower, Riddell's Goldenrod, New England Aster, Golden Alexanders), and 2 grass/sedge species (Fox Sedge & Little Bluestem). These plant species are utilized to prevent erosion and increase water infiltration. The flowers in this mix will provide color throughout the summer.

Woodland Mix – These 34 plants are well-suited to woodland gardens and shady areas with moist soil. The mix includes 8 wildflower species (Columbine, Wild Geranium, Great Blue Lobelia, Downy Scullcap, Wild Stonecrop, Blue-stemmed Goldenrod, Celadine Poppy, Side-flowering Aster) and 2 grass/sedge species (Straight-Styled Wood Sedge & Bottlebrush Grass). Several of the flower species bloom early before trees leaf out, providing early springtime color. Other species bloom through early fall.
