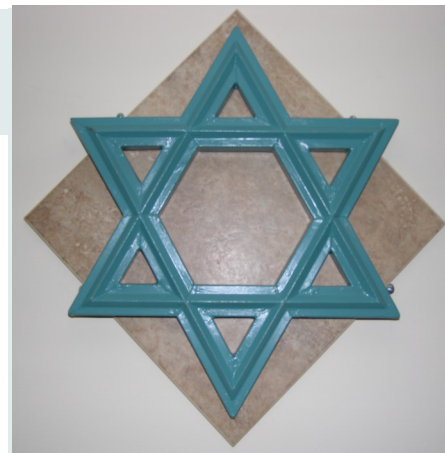

World Zionist Congress Elections

The World Zionist Congress (WZC) election is your chance to shape the future of the global Jewish community and the State of Israel. Held every five years, the WZC is the world's largest democratic Jewish body, making decisions about over a billion dollars of funding and guiding policy in education and social programs in Israel and the diaspora.

The Reconstructionist movement is actively participating as part of the [Hatikvah platform](#), which stands for a two-state solution, an inclusive Israeli society, and the diverse expression of Jewish life.

Registration and voting open March 10, 2025, and run through May 4, 2025. As a congregation, we urge you to join us in supporting the Hatikvah platform to strengthen a vision of Israel that reflects our Reconstructionist values. Notes from the Presidents...

This winter has been cold and blustery, and I am sure we are all looking forward to a mild spring. I hope everyone has been well and able to keep warm and enjoy some family time. As we enter spring, we have some celebrations to look forward to.

First, we have Purim. Once again, we are invited to join Beth El and Chisuk Emuna to celebrate together. Please, watch for notices in our weekly bulletin, and in the community notifications for details of the fun event. The rabbis and their helpers always make it a very enjoyable service.

Passover is a family affair and hopefully as the first seder occurs on a Saturday night it will be possible for families to gather and celebrate. We will not be having a second night community seder at Beth Shalom, the logistics of such an undertaking are just too complex for our small group to organize.

In April we will have the Reading of the Names. We will be asking you to give fifteen minutes of your time to read sometime between 10 p.m. and 1:30 a.m. I realize this is a lot to ask of people, staying up later than they might like and reading names they can hardly pronounce. I have often wondered why I do this. Last summer I had the privilege of visiting Auschwitz with my daughter and grandson. It is a somber and barren place, set out among fields next to the railway line. Walking through to old bunk houses and listening to the guide I could not help but feel the weight of the horrors that had played out there. I asked the young lady guide how she could do this day after day. She said she felt it was her obligation to help preserve the memory of what can happen when no one stops it.

So, I am going to ask you again this year to volunteer to read names. If you cannot read for Beth Shalom, please consider volunteering at one of the other synagogues. These people whose names we struggle to read were once alive. We owe them the dignity of once again having their names said out loud in the sincere hope that such a horror will never happen again.

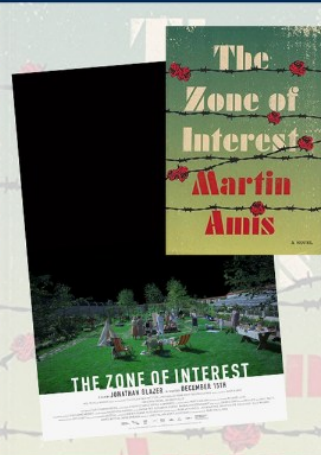

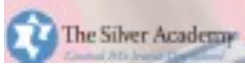

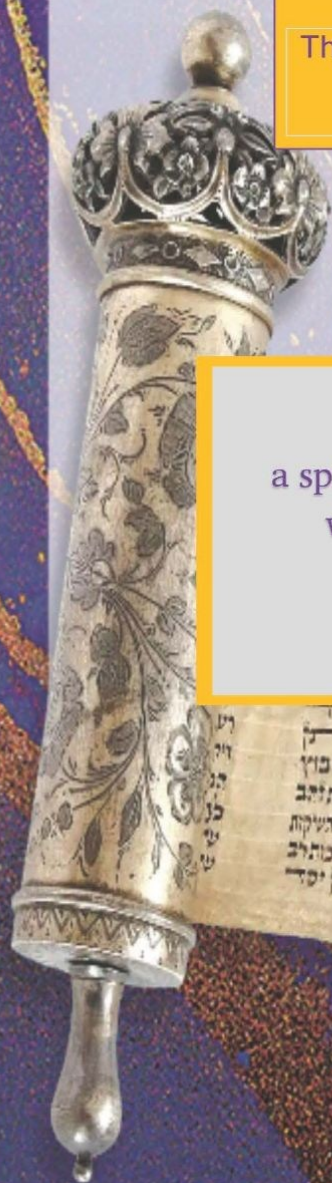


Exhibit: State of Deception - The Power of Nazi Propaganda

Holocaust Remembrance – Reading of Names

On Monday evening, April 17, 2023 at 7:30 pm, Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) will be commemorated with the “Reading of Names” program to be held at Keshet Israel Congregation. The Reading of Names is a vigil in which the names of those who perished during the Holocaust are read continuously over a period of 24 hours.

“Unto Every Person There is a Name” seeks to dignify the memories of victims of the Shoah (the Nazi Holocaust) by reading their names aloud. These victims were stripped of their names by their oppressors and tattooed with numbers. Through the public reading of the names of Holocaust victims, this program strives to restore a portion of their humanity and to retrieve them from the lost depths of anonymity.

In an effort to pass the torch of remembrance to the next generation, students from congregational Religious Schools will take part in the conduct of the opening ceremony. They will also read names with their parents immediately following the opening ceremony.

We hope that you and your family will be able to attend this special opening service and stay for a portion of the Reading of Names program.

On Lighting the Yahrzeit Candle...

TBS members requested that we include a prayer for lighting the yahrzeit candle in the bulletin. With Rabbi Choper's assistance, the following is provided.

There is no one blessing that is traditionally required to be said when lighting a yahrzeit candle. It is an opportunity to remember our loved ones and how their presence somehow remains with us. The practice of lighting a candle is based at least in part on the verse (Proverbs 20:27) "The Human Soul is the Lamp Of G-d." This is a beautiful teaching that emphasizes the importance of each human being as an opportunity for some aspect of Divine Light to enter into the world, and that somehow each soul is a connection to G-d.

"The Human Soul is the Lamp of G-d." May it be Your will, Adonai our G-d and the G-d of our Ancestors, that the soul of my beloved one should be bound up in the bonds of life, as with the souls of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah. May (his/her) memory be a blessing to us all."

If desired, it is also traditionally appropriate to recite Psalm 23 or 121.
