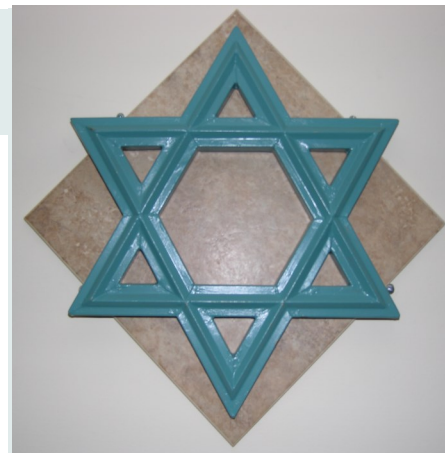

Professor Emeritus Lawrence Baron held the Nasatir Chair of Modern Jewish History at San Diego State University from 1988 until 2012 and directed its Jewish studies program until 2006. He received his Ph.D. in modern European cultural and intellectual history from the University of Wisconsin, where he studied with George L. Mosse. He has authored and edited four books, including *The Modern Jewish Experience in World Cinema* (Brandeis University Press: 2011) and *Projecting the Holocaust into the Present: The Changing Focus of Contemporary Holocaust Cinema* (Rowman and Littlefield: 2005). Professor Baron served as the historian and as an interviewer for Sam and Pearl Oliner's *The Altruistic Personality: Rescuers of Jews in Nazi Europe*. In 2006 he delivered the keynote address for Yad Vashem's first conference devoted to Hollywood and the Holocaust. His contribution to Holocaust studies was profiled in *Fifty Key Thinkers on the Holocaust and Genocide* (Routledge: 2010). In the fall semester of 2015, he taught as the Ida King Distinguished Visiting Professor of Holocaust and Genocide Studies at Stockton University in New Jersey.

She is a professor of history and Italian studies at New York University, the recipient of Guggenheim, Fulbright, and other fellowships, and an advisor to Protect Democracy. On Lighting the Yahrzeit Candle...

TBS members requested that we include a prayer for lighting the yahrzeit candle in the bulletin. With Rabbi Choper's assistance, the following is provided.

There is no one blessing that is traditionally required to be said when lighting a yahrzeit candle. It is an opportunity to remember our loved ones and how their presence somehow remains with us. The practice of lighting a candle is based at least in part on the verse (Proverbs 20:27) "The Human Soul is the Lamp Of G-d." This is a beautiful teaching that emphasizes the importance of each human being as an opportunity for some aspect of Divine Light to enter into the world, and that somehow each soul is a connection to G-d.

"The Human Soul is the Lamp of G-d." May it be Your will, Adonai our G-d and the G-d of our Ancestors, that the soul of my beloved one should be bound up in the bonds of life, as with the souls of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah. May (his/her) memory be a blessing to us all."

If desired, it is also traditionally appropriate to recite Psalm 23 or 121.
