Registration Instructions

Like last year, we are hosting hybrid services for most of the High Holidays. What we mean by hybrid services is an online platform – Zoom – that will host the service.

Members that are attending the services in person will meet in the TBS Sanctuary. Members that are attending the services virtually will join the service on Zoom. It is our intention that where you are physically should not matter with respect to participating in the services. Everyone should be connected in real time visually and audially.

We are offering these services to our own religious community, but also to the larger West Shore community. For security reasons, we are requiring all attendees to register separately for each service they plan to attend, whether in-person or on zoom (see below).

Please note Day 2 of Rosh Hashanah will be in person at Temple Beth Shalom. It will not be put on Zoom or Livestreamed.

Option 1: In-person attendance

In-person attendance will be available for all High Holiday services. TBS is not charging for attending High Holiday Services, whether in-person or on zoom. Registration is still required, but there will be no fees or paywall to attend services. Instead, we will be requesting donations to Temple Beth Shalom on a voluntary basis.

TBS Safety Protocols

1. Masking will be optional for all-in-person attendees. If you feel the need to mask, please do so. If you do not have your mask with you, we will provide a mask.
2. While we are not requiring vaccinations for attendance, we do strongly recommend that all attendees get fully vaccinated. This is as much for your own personal health, as well as those in your family and others in the community that cannot be vaccinated.
3. We are requesting social distancing outside of family units. Alternate rows in the Sanctuary have been cordoned off.
4. Finally, if you are showing COVID symptoms, and/or have tested positive for COVID in the last 5 days, we ask that you join our services via Zoom (see Option 2 below).

Option 2: Participation in services through Zoom

If you are not attending a High Holiday Service in person, you are invited to participate via Zoom. As with in-person attendance, TBS is not charging for attending via zoom; however, we are still requiring advance registration. Rather than selling tickets, TBS is requesting donations to Temple Beth Shalom on a voluntary basis.

If you need a Reconstructionist Prayerbook, you can either rent one from TBS or purchase one. Please contact the office no later than September 1st. During most of the services, the Prayerbook page will be shared online.

Option 3: Viewing services on YouTube as livestream

If you are not attending a High Holiday Service in person, nor plan to register and attend on Zoom, you are invited to view the services live on YouTube, which means it can be watched on a computer or TV. Because it is a livestream, you will not be able to directly participate, though.

On Lighting the Yahrzeit Candle...

TBS members requested that we include a prayer for lighting the yahrzeit candle in the bulletin. With Rabbi Choper's assistance, the following is provided.

There is no one blessing that is traditionally required to be said when lighting a yahrzeit candle. It is an opportunity to remember our loved ones and how their presence somehow remains with us. The practice of lighting a candle is based at least in part on the verse (Proverbs 20:27) "The Human Soul is the Lamp Of G-d." This is a beautiful teaching that emphasizes the importance of each human being as an opportunity for some aspect of Divine Light to enter into the world, and that somehow each soul is a connection to G-d.

"The Human Soul is the Lamp of G-d." May it be Your will, Adonai our G-d and the G-d of our Ancestors, that the soul of my beloved one should be bound up in the bonds of life, as with the souls of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah. May (his/her) memory be a blessing to us all."

If desired, it is also traditionally appropriate to recite Psalm 23 or 121.
