Registration Instructions

We are now in interesting times, given the stubborn continuance of COVID-19 over the last 30 months. Like last year, we are hosting hybrid services for most of the High Holidays. What we mean by hybrid services is an online platform – Zoom – that will host the service, and members that are attending the services in person will meet in the TBS Sanctuary. Members that are attending the services virtually will join the service on Zoom. It is our intention that where you are physically should not matter with respect to participating in the services. Everyone should be connected in real time visually and audially. We are offering these services to our own religious community, but also to the larger West Shore community. For security reasons, we are requiring all attendees to register separately for each service they plan to attend, whether in-person or on zoom (see below).

- **Registration is required in advance.**
- **Registration is required whether you are attending in person or via Zoom.**
- **Each registration is for each service.** To attend all services, you need to register 6 times (the 2 Yom Kippur services on October 5th will be entered through two links.)
- Go to the link to each day below. You will be required to register separately for each program you wish to join. After registering you will receive a confirmation e-mail containing information about joining the meeting, if you are joining via zoom.
- **There is no ticketing for any of the programs.**
- If you are participating through Zoom, you can participate if you have a cell phone, computer, or tablet.
- For each day's registration, a registration will be honored on Zoom or in person. We are asking if you plan to attend in person, so we can plan for seating. Make your best guess. If you wish to attend in person and can meet our safety protocols you can attend in person, even if you selected zoom for that service.
- Note: if you do not have access to a computer and wish to attend, please call the Office, at (717) 697-2662. We will add you to the registration list.

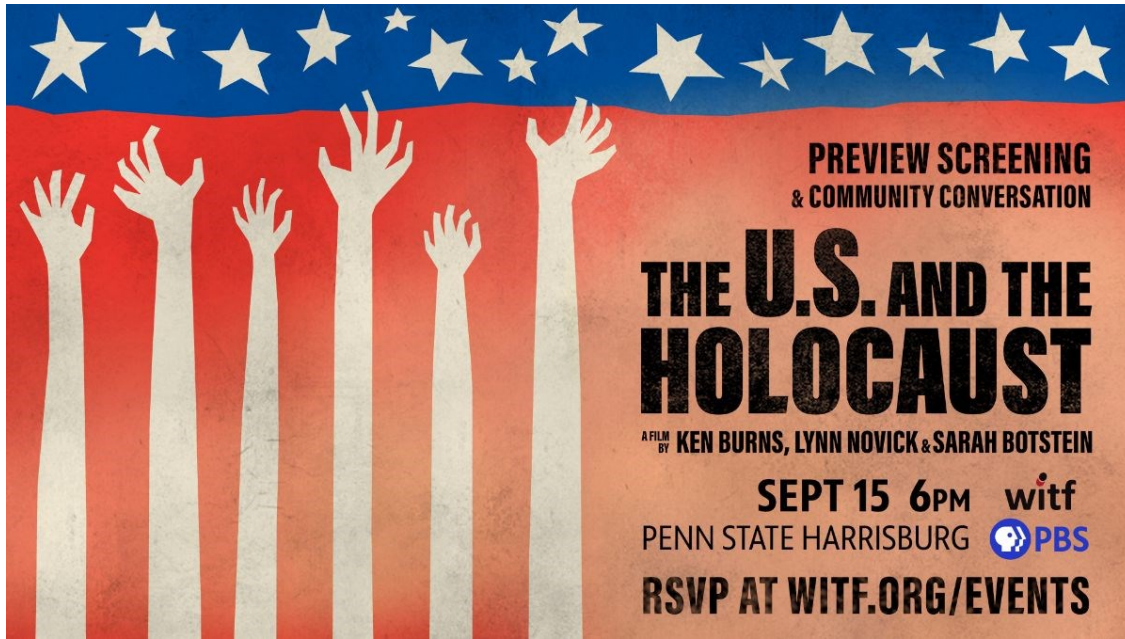

JFS Afghan and Ukraine Resettlement

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO ASSIST STAFF WITH INTENSIVE CASE MANAGEMENT

Good afternoon. JFS has secured funding to continue our resettlement work for next year. Rather than the intensive resettlement we initiated at the beginning of 2022, we will focus on providing continued case management to our current Afghan parolees who will need additional assistance past their first year. The primary focus is to help medically fragile clients. We also intend to offer case management services to arriving refugees or parolees, including Ukrainian refugees.

UKRAINE

How are Ukrainians being helped? The model for resettling Ukrainian parolees being promoted by the US Citizenship & Immigration Service is called “Uniting for Ukraine.” This is a privatized resettlement model where a family or individual can sponsor a Ukrainian individual or family to reside for up to 2 years in the United States. The sponsor commits to financially providing for the parolee and guarantees that they will provide housing. The sponsor is responsible for enrolling the Ukrainians in social service programs, and arranging for healthcare, employment and or schooling.

The US government has privatized this model in recognition of the difficulty in finding housing for refugees; in this model the refugee is guaranteed housing prior to their arrival in a community.

JFS will continue to partner with other agencies as we move forward in resettlement work. Volunteers will be needed to assist in this initiative. Please contact Kim if you or someone you know may be interested (717 – 233-1681 x 3014).

On Lighting the Yahrzeit Candle...

TBS members requested that we include a prayer for lighting the yahrzeit candle in the bulletin. With Rabbi Choper's assistance, the following is provided.

There is no one blessing that is traditionally required to be said when lighting a yahrzeit candle. It is an opportunity to remember our loved ones and how their presence somehow remains with us. The practice of lighting a candle is based at least in part on the verse (Proverbs 20:27) "The Human Soul is the Lamp Of G-d." This is a beautiful teaching that emphasizes the importance of each human being as an opportunity for some aspect of Divine Light to enter into the world, and that somehow each soul is a connection to G-d.

"The Human Soul is the Lamp of G-d." May it be Your will, Adonai our G-d and the G-d of our Ancestors, that the soul of my beloved one should be bound up in the bonds of life, as with the souls of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah. May (his/her) memory be a blessing to us all."

If desired, it is also traditionally appropriate to recite Psalm 23 or 121.
