PRIEST, VIGOROUS FOE OF KKK, DIES

SAN ANTONIO, July 22.—(NC) —Archbishop Robert E. Lucey of San Antonio presided at a Solemn Mass of Requiem in the Cathedral of San Fernando here for the Rev. Francis J. Ledwig, Chaplain at the St. Francis home in this city. Father Ledwig, who died at the age of 58, was noted for his vigorous campaign to stamp out Ku Klux Klan activities in Texas in the early 1920's.
