

Psalm 23 is a beloved and well-known passage that begins with the assurance that the Lord is our shepherd, providing for our needs and guiding us in paths of righteousness. DAY 2

Reflect: Reflecting on this psalm prompts us to consider the choices we make in our daily lives. Do we find delight in God's Word, meditating on it regularly to draw strength and wisdom? Are our lives characterized by a rootedness in God's truth, leading to spiritual vitality and fruitfulness?
