An Official Proclamation of FBA Identity and National Standing

INTRODUCTION

This is where our foundation begins. It does not begin with systems of power, struggle, or oppression. It begins with freedom. Freedom is not something we earned through suffering. It is something we inherited through lineage, protected through memory, and secured through covenant.

The *United States of Black America* stands on an unshakable truth: our freedom was never granted and could not be denied because it was inherited—passed down through legacy, preserved in memory, and secured through covenant. It is not a claim we make for validation, but a reality we uphold through discipline, unity, and self-governance.

This declaration does not seek recognition. It affirms what has always belonged to us. As Foundational Black Americans (FBA), our freedom is not conditional, performative, or symbolic. It is structural, generational, and sacred.

Read these words with clarity. Defend them with discipline. Let this declaration serve not merely as a statement of belief, but as the cornerstone of our governance and the blueprint for everything we are building.

We are the descendants of the enslaved in the United States of America. Our ancestors endured the unthinkable and still chose to survive. In their honor, we make this Declaration of Freedom.

We offer it as an act of remembrance,
not as a reaction to what was done to us,
but as confirmation of who we are.

Our freedom was not granted by law.
It was carried through generations,
guarded in prayer,
secured through the sacrifice of labor,
and spoken boldly by those who dreamed beyond what they were given.

We name it now,
not to claim it for the first time,
but to preserve it—fully, formally, and without apology.
