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Lt. Governor Husted to Discuss Importance of Early Exposure to TECH Education with Technology Leaders and Students

Columbus, Ohio –As part of In-Demand Jobs Week, TECH CORPS will lead a roundtable discussion bringing together state government leaders, including Lt. Governor Jon Husted and Development Director Lydia Mihalik, alongside TECH CORPS alumni, students, and business partners on Wednesday, May 4 from 3:30-4:30 p.m. at WillowTree (274 Marconi Blvd #300, Columbus, OH 43215). In-Demand Jobs Week will highlight Ohio's top jobs that pay more than \$50,000 per year and don't require a degree or years of training – just a credential. The roundtable will focus on the challenges and solutions facing individuals who will fill those in-demand tech jobs.

This discussion is part of a special announcement between TECH CORPS, a national nonprofit ensuring K-12 students have equal access to high-quality computer science and information technology learning experiences and WillowTree, a full-service digital product consultancy. The two will officially announce a NEW partnership to invest in early exposure to computer science for Central Ohio students.

"There is a real issue in the technology skills gap where students in elementary and middle school — specifically girls and under-represented groups — are not getting the access to technology education experiences," explained Vivi Nellen WillowTree Director of Administration, Events and Community Outreach. "As a full-service digital product consultancy, with a regional presence in Columbus, we have decided to focus on one local nonprofit partner in the hopes of exacting real change in the area."

The TECH CORPS | WillowTree partnership is a grassroots effort that has the power to influence and change the trajectory of technology access and exposure for greater Columbus area students.

TECH CORPS National Executive Director Lisa M. Chambers said, "When I hear the folks at WillowTree talk about wanting to be involved in the community, wanting to give back and wanting to do so through the lens of technology, for me, I knew this was going to be a perfect partnership."

One example of how the partnership will change technology education opportunities is through a current collaboration to develop a new curriculum for a data science program. WillowTree Software Engineer Zach Tumbleson is part of the development team. He explained, "I was very encouraged by the focus of volunteers' ideas during the session. The TECH CORPS folks did not give us a skeleton idea to flesh out, but rather focused on collecting brand new ideas and exploring how these could be combined and transformed into new programs or activities."

"At WillowTree, our team members who are building digital products for companies around the world are representative of those who are using the technology," said Jamie Timm, WillowTree Chief Delivery Officer. "Through this partnership with TECH CORPS, we will be able to influence the access of historically marginalized groups and change the composition of those working in technology."
