### The Quarterly Forum - Woody Duncan



### A Death in Question,,,

There are many ongoing mysteries that surround the Richards family. I was reminded of the death of the youngest son, Joseph J Richards in 1932. If you remember he was married to the former Nettie Sienknecht and they had two sons, Henry Sienknecht Richards and Benjamin Thomas Richards Sr.

As a reminder, Joseph was in charge of the Richards coal mine operations and later served as a coal mine inspector for the state of Tennessee and became the General Manager of the Blue Diamond Coal Company when he moved to Winchester, KY in 1922. He was quiet successful in his own right when he bought the remaining interest of his brothers in the existing portions of their father's estate in Oliver Springs.

In 1930 he was living on Maple Dr in Winchester KY, an exclusive section in the most expensive home. By this time he was General Manager of the Alex Bonnyman Coal Company and his son, Henry Sienknecht Richards was the Safety Director for the Blue Diamond Coal Company.

But something happened with Joseph and for reasons unknown he went to the Battle Creek Sanitarium in Battle Creek, Michigan. Keep in mind the word sanitarium, back then was defined as a health resort. In 1928, Battle Creek Sanitarium expanded with a fourteen-story tower shown in the photo. The sanitarium became a destination for both prominent and middle-class American citizens but after the Wall Street Crash of 1929 few previously well-to-do patients came to the sanitarium. What caused Joseph to go there in 1932 is a mystery to me but on June 20, 1932 he would either fall or jump to his death from a sixth floor window to the pavement below. He was 66 years-old. His wife, Nettie would leave Winchester and move to Knoxville while his oldest son would move to Middlesboro, KY. His youngest son, Benjamin Thomas Richards Sr had a successful career in New York as a magazine editor.

Could his death be an accident, or related to the Wall Street Crash? Could it possibly be for some unknown health issues or maybe stress from past squabbles over the handling of the Richards estate? He seemed to have so much to live for....

# **Teens and History**


The Oliver Springs Historical Society and the Oliver Springs Academy are partnering with each other to unlock significant benefits for both institutions. The Academy has instituted a Project-Based Learning (PBL) program to enhance their Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM) initiative and partnering with the Historical Society gives students hands-on opportunities to assist in projects relating to the history of Oliver Springs.

Partnering with the Oliver Springs Academy offers mutual benefits, from enhancing student skills and career readiness to providing the Historical Society with a talent pipeline to help preserve the town's history. Students involved in museum projects can build essential skills such as critical thinking, problem-solving, communication, creativity and digital literacy.

A task list was developed and provided to the Academy. This on-going task list is a tool that adapts to changing circumstances to provide structure and clarity. Students are also encouraged to present their ideas on projects and make suggestions for improvement. Project Base Learning will provide students with opportunities to apply classroom knowledge in practical, real-world settings and enhance their learning experience.

Students are given hands-on learning opportunities to create and develop museum signage and labels; conduct research on various people, historical buildings and other historical objects; curate an exhibit; build a digital platform that makes museum content more accessible to the community; and conduct and record oral histories.

Partnerships require planning and commitment between both parties and our goal is to become a "learning lab" which helps students develop critical skills while invigorating our museum with new perspective and energy. By working together, we can foster a sense of shared responsibility and pride in our students' success while strengthening our community bond.













### Oliver Springs - A Busy Place

Big-time railroading began in Oliver Springs when the Southern Railway Company bought the East Tennessee, Virginia and Georgia Railway Company (E.T.V. & G) at a for-closure sale in July of 1894. At that time, the area coal mines were booming and Oliver Springs was rapidly developing into a freight distribution center.





Settlers came for the rich wildlife and mineral waters, leading to a period of rapid growth and a bustling tourism-focused economy. Life in early Oliver Springs revolved around its natural mineral springs, which led to the establishment of a grand hotel, the nationally-known Oliver Springs Resort Hotel that was built in 1895. Passenger trains stopped in front of the Hotel to accommodate the high society and ever-increasing passenger traffic.

In addition to the various smaller stores and coal company commissaries, the H. Sienknecht Department Store was opened in 1901, which was the largest retail outlet in the Oliver Springs area.





A brick plant was put into operation, a canning factory became a new town industry, numerous saw and planning mills were doing big business, a bank was established in 1904, slaughter pins were built, a consolidated school was an asset, and Paul Deblieux and Dennis Letorey had opened the Oliver Springs Bottling Works for the manufacturing of "soda pop". The Southern Railway's business expanded in proportion with the town's growing needs with little competition from the horse and buggy and none from paved highways and the yet unborn trucking industry.

At one time, Oliver Springs was indeed a busy place, as it advanced from coal mining to a popular resort town and continued to grow with the development of numerous industries. During World War II, The United States Government established the secret city of Oak Ridge nearby for the Manhattan Project. This created new jobs and partially shifted the local economy toward government employment.

The town still features numerous buildings from before the 20th century. Oliver Springs has since shifted its focus to tourism, emphasizing its history and taking advantage of the surrounding mountains for off-road recreation. Once again, Oliver Springs is becoming a busy place.
