

IS BOASTING A SIN?

Many of us Christians say 'Boasting is a sin'- right?

Indeed, it is not right to be boastful, as it has its root in pride. The Bible is full of passages on the sinfulness of pride and boasting (for example, Judges 7:2, 1 Samuel 2:3, Psalms 49:6, Proverbs 27:1 and many more). The Greek word "to boast," appear sixty-three times in the New Testament. Most notably, thirty-nine usages are found in the Corinthian correspondence, with almost half employed in defense of Paul's apostolic authority and ministry.



Let me take you back to the history to see the powerful King Jabin.

King Jabin, the King of Canaan was riding high. For 20 years he had held God's children as slaves. King Jabin, the Bible tells us, had reigned in Hazor (Judges 4:2). With his able head of defense Sisera, King Jabin felt invincible. Having 900 chariots of iron - Jabin ruled and he dominated. He was in control, or so he thought.

You see, Jabin was not much different from a lot of people today. He thought his word was law. He thought the country was his. He thought the people were under his dominion. He thought his army was under his power. He even thought he controlled his own destiny.

KING JABIN WAS BOASTFUL!

The Bible tells us he ruled in Hazor, northern Palestine. Evidently, King Jabin hadn't taken time to get acquainted with another King whose rulership not only covered the territory Jabin boasted about ruling over, but covered all of earth and all of heaven. For we are told in the Psalms,

The Lord that made heaven and earth bless thee out of Zion (Psalm 134:3). Pompous King Jabin wouldn't have had a

speck of soil to rule over if the King of the Universe, our Sovereign God, hadn't created it.

So the God of heaven and earth, sent a message to His daughter Deborah saying, now is the time, Sisera and his army and King Jabin are going to be visited by Me.

The Psalmist David in describing God's interaction with events in the universes ays "God does whatever He pleases" (Psalm 115: 3). When we look at the Hebrew meaning of the word, "pleases." it means, "delights, desires. He is not a God who is taking out His anger on His children. In fact, it is just the opposite. David was referring to a loving Father who delights in doing for His children what He knows will bring them pleasure. And I can assure you, God knew it would bring joy and courage and hope into the lives of His children to release them from the tyrannical rule of King Jabin and Sisera.

The Bible says the Lord discomfited Sisera, and all his chariots, and all his host. Once again I looked at the dictionary for the word discomfit, which means to utterly crush and destroy. Look at the other place where exactly same word is used in the Bible.

Interestingly, this chapter in 2 Samuel is one of the most beautiful in Scripture as David speaks of the way God has delivered him, "God sent out arrows, and scattered them, lightning, and discomfited them." (2 Samuel 22: 15).

This is the crushing blow delivered to Sisera and the boastful king Jabin who thought they ruled with their iron chariots when in fact they were no match for the God of heaven and earth. At the crushing defeat of the enemies of Israel, it wasn't only King Jabin and Sisera who learned something about God's sovereign rulership. God's children learned something, too.

When we least think God has things in control, God asks us to arise, stand up, and get ready to move, for He is about to "discomfit" the boastful Jabin and Sisera on behalf of His children.

SO BOASTFULNESS IS WRONG!

But the practice of self-praise or glory was common among popular teachers and philosophers of the Greco-Roman honor and shame culture. They spoke with pride of their accomplishment and status to advance their arguments or position and win over adherents. However, Paul strongly opposed those who boasted about themselves, believers and nonbelievers alike (1 Corinthians 1:28–29).

BUT HERE PAUL IS BOASTING!!!!!!!

Yet, on one occasion in his letter to the Corinthians, Paul said that he was forced to boast (2 Corinthians 11:16 - 18). Why?

His opponents were trying to discredit Paul and his ministry and, by extension, discredit the Christ who sent him. So, Paul defended himself by recounting his heritage (2 Corinthians 11:22), suffering in ministries (2 Corinthians 11:23–33), and even supernatural experiences (2 Corinthians 12:1–6).

A careful reading of these texts will show that when Paul boasted, we do not come away seeing Paul's loftiness. Instead, we are drawn to a passionate Paul who loved his flock; more significantly, we see Christ who sustained him.

Similarly, Paul's choice of word in Romans 5:2–3, "And we boast in hope of the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in the sufferings..." is significant. Likewise, Paul and those with him were "joyfully confident with a sense of pride" of their hope in the glory of God.

They looked forward to God's generous sharing of his magnificent glory with those who did not deserve it! So much so that they could endure suffering with confidence, with a sense of pride, in the great God whom they trusted because this suffering ultimately would lead to hope for God's coming glory.

SO CAN WE BOAST OR NOT?

Therefore, Christians today should not boast or brag about themselves. Instead, our boasting should direct others' attention to God through our lives. When we are blessed, praise God! He is the one who blesses us, not because we deserve to receive these blessings. When we suffer, we can endure not because we are more spiritual or capable but only because He is the one who enables us to go through life's trials.

As we boast in our Maker, we invite others to experience His faithfulness in every season—whether good or bad.

HYMN HISTORY

"Be Thou My Vision" (Old Irish: Rop tú mo baile or Rob tú mo bhoile) is a traditional Christian hymn of Irish origin. The words are based on a Middle Irish poem that has traditionally been attributed to Saint Dallán Forgaill.

The best-known English version, with some minor variations, was translated in 1905 by Mary Elizabeth Byrne in 1905, then made into verse by Eleanor Hull and published in 1912. Since 1919 it has been commonly sung to an Irish folk tune, noted as "Slane" in church hymnals, and



is one of the most popular hymns in the United Kingdom. The original poem, found in two Irish manuscripts in the library of the Royal Irish Academy, may be dated as early as the 8th century.

Quite often, older hymns come to us as a collaborative effort before we are able to sing them from our hymnals. The Irish text, beginning "Rob tu mo bhoile, a Comdi cride," was translated into literal prose by Irish scholar Mary Byrne (1880-1931), a Dublin native, and then published in Eriú, the journal of the School of Irish Learning, in 1905. Byrne was also known for her academic publications, including Old and Mid-Irish Dictionary, Dictionary of the Irish Language, and a treatise, England in the Age of Chaucer. The original prose translation comes to us in 16 couplets.

The first is:

Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart. None other is aught but the King of the seven heavens.

And the last is:

O heart of my heat, whate'er befall me, O ruler of all, be thou my vision.



It is at this point that **Eleanor Hull** (1860-1935) enters the story. Born in Manchester, England, she was the founder of the

Irish Text Society and president of the Irish Literary Society of London. Hull versified the text and it was published in her Poem Book of the Gael (1912). Following the original publication in Ireland, the hymn was included in a number of British hymnals. After World War II, the hymn came to the attention of hymnal editors in the U.S. and it has become a standard hymn in most hymnals today.

Irish liturgy and ritual scholar Helen Phelan, a lecturer at the University of Limerick, points out how the language of this hymn is drawn from traditional Irish culture: "One of the essential characteristics of the text is the use of 'heroic' imagery to describe God. This was very typical of medieval Irish poetry, which cast God as the 'chieftain' or 'High King' (Ard Ri) who provided protection to his people or clan. The lorica is one of the most popular forms of this kind of protection prayer and is very prevalent in texts of this period." The original chieftain language of the "High King of heaven" has given way to the more inclusive "Great God" in the UM Hymnal.

When Hull's versification was paired with the lovely traditional Irish tune SLANE in The Irish Church Hymnal in 1919, its popularity was sealed. The folk melody was taken from a nonliturgical source, Patrick Weston Joyce's Old Irish Folk Music and Collection 842 Songs Songs: of Airs and unpublished (1909). It was on Slane Hill in County Meath around 433 CE that St. Patrick lit candles on Easter Eve, defying a decree by High King Logaire of Tara that no one could light a fire before the king signaled the beginning of the pagan spring festival by lighting a fire on Tara Hill. King Logaire was so impressed by Patrick's devotion that, despite his defiance, he was permitted to continue his work as Ireland's first Christian missionary.

A medieval poem entitled "On the breaking up of a School" composed by Tadhg Og O Huiginn, c.1400, refers to the death of St. Dallán which caused his school to break up and the students to disperse as they would accept no other master. In a list of ancient Irish authors contained in the Book of Ballymote, Dallán is called "grandson of testimony".
