

Greetings to you all in the matchless name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus



Christ. It brings me immense Joy to write to you all through this monthly newsletter. God has been faithful in each one of our lives, through his grace he has enabled us to see this 12th month of this year 2022. The month of December brings great joy to all of us, as we remember, rejoice in the birth of our Saviour Jesus Christ. I hope and believe that we all had a wonderful month of Thanksgiving. The theme for this month is "Celebrating God's gift on Earth"

As we enter this season of Christmas, it reminds us that God fulfilled his promise to humanity by sending his only begotten son Jesus Christ. He is the perfect revelation of God in human form. As we celebrate this Christmas season, our thoughts turn to that sacred event long ago when the prince of peace and the light of the world was born. How could anyone have known, that the Almighty, eternal God would in his wisdom and mercy come into our world in the frailty of a baby, born in the small-town of Bethlehem in a distant corner of the Roman empire, he would be named as Jesus, which means He will save, save his people from their sins. He would be called 'Emmanuel' – which means "God is with us." As we see in Isaiah 7:14, which says, therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign; the Virgin will conceive, and give birth to a Son and will call him Emmanuel."

The Lord himself will do this, Scripture says. In other words, this act, which occurred in the birth of Christ, was God-ordained and God-accomplished. This points to the grace, which comes not through human effort but rather through relying on God to do what we humans cannot. This was the reason Christ came. God gave us this child, named Emmanuel.

Hymn History - IN THE BLEAK MIDWINTER



Christina Georgiana Rossetti (1830-1894) gives us one of the most beloved Christmas hymns. The author of three collections of mostly religious poetry and four devotional books, she came from a family steeped in the arts. Her deep faith is thought to be partially the result of the solace that she found in writing as a result of her poor health from age sixteen.

Christina's father, Gabriele Rossetti, was a professor of Italian at King's College, London, living in exile in England. Her brothers Dante Gabriel and William

Michael gave birth to a nineteenth-century art movement, the Pre-Raphaelites, for which the beautiful Christina often served as a model (see the photo), especially for portraits of the Madonna. Among the family friends was Charles Dodgson, who, under the pseudonym of Lewis Carroll, authored the famous *Alice in Wonderland*. An ardent Anglican, Christina rejected one suitor because he was Roman Catholic.

Her most famous hymns are the Christmas texts, "Love Came Down at Christmas" composed in 1885 (UM Hymnal No. 242) and "In the Bleak Midwinter," the latter first published as the poem "A Christmas Carol" in *Scribner's Monthly* in January 1872. It first appeared as a hymn in *The English Hymnal* (1906), where it was paired to a tune by the famous English composer Gustav Holst (1874-1934). Now, over 100 years later, we sing this hymn in virtually the same form as it appeared in 1906.

In the first memorable stanza, Rossetti creates a dreary and desolate image of the world into which the infant Jesus appeared by drawing on the experience of a British winter. She is not suggesting that it literally snowed in Bethlehem, but is drawing on a long-established literary idea of associating snow with Christ's birth. The famous seventeenth-century poet, John Milton, used the winter imagery in his poem, "On the Morning of Christ's Nativity," as a pure covering to hide the sin of the world.

It was the Winter wilde, While the Heav'n-born-childe, All meanly wrapt in the rude manger lies; Nature in aw to him, Had doff't her gawdy trim . . .

Rossetti exploits this metaphor in the opposite way in her opening stanza. The Incarnate One, the Light of the World, brought warmth into the most forlorn and dreary of sinful situations.

The second stanza uses the device of antithesis to make the point that the eternal One whom "heaven could not hold" nor "earth sustain" appeared during the "bleak winter" of human existence where "a stable place sufficed." This paradox of the eternal One born in a humble setting is a primary theme of many hymns of this season.

An omitted third stanza explores the intimacy of the manger scene.

Enough for him, whom cherubim, Worship night and day, A breastful of milk, And a mangerful of hay; Enough for him, whom angels Fall down before, The ox and ass and camel. which adore.

The fourth stanza once again contrasts the heavenly glory of gathered "Angels and archangels" and "cherubim and seraphim" with the mother who alone "worshiped the beloved with a kiss."

The final stanza is perhaps one of the most endearing to singers of Christmas hymns. Yet, as British hymnologist J. R. Watson observes, "The final verse is strangely interesting."

What can I give him, Poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a wise man, I would do my part; Yet what I can I give him; Give my heart.

Watson cites an article by British hymn writer Elizabeth Cosnett (b. 1936) who provides a social commentary that may shed light on this stanza. She notes that, "when a woman wrote these words women were largely excluded from the professions and from higher education." Like the shepherds, she was not employed; like the wise men, Rossetti held no degree. Watson concludes that this reading of the final stanza "does not invalidate the more general reading of the verse; but it gives a special sharpness and poignancy to the last verse for those who wish to find it."

The writer invites us to offer our own gift to the Christ Child just as the shepherds and wise men did. Rather than the present of a lamb or expensive gifts, however, we offer the most important gift -- our hearts.

Christina Rossetti died on 29 December 1894 and was buried on New Year's Day 1895 in the family grave on the west side of Highgate Cemetery. There she joined her father, mother and Elizabeth Siddal, wife of her brother Dante Gabriel. Her brother William was also buried there in 1919, as were the ashes of four subsequent family members.

There is a stone tablet on the façade of 30 Torrington Square, Bloomsbury, marking her final home, where she died.

6 FACTS ABOUT JESUS' BIRTH

ere are seven amazing facts about the birth of Jesu Christ that are found in the Bible.

1. Where is the Innkeeper?

I looked in the Bible for the innkeeper in the story of a very pregnant Mary and Joseph but couldn't find it in the Bible. The fact that about every Christmas play I have ever seen has an inn-



keeper but there's not one in the account of Jesus' birth which sort of mystifies me. Where did that come from? Where did this originate? I'm not saying there wasn't an innkeeper in the experience of Joseph and Mary but we can't dogmatically say that there was. That is sheer speculation and that's not solid ground upon which to build an account of a biblical story.

2. Singing Angels at Jesus' Birth?

Nearly every Christmas card with a nativity scene in it has an angel present and watching over Joseph, Mary, and Jesus but it's not found in Scripture. The same belief that angels were singing at the time of Jesus' birth is not found in the Bible; it only says that "a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased" (Luke 2:13-14). They were "saying" not singing. That's altogether a different Greek word.

3. The Kings of the East?

The Bible never says that there were three kings or wise men (Magi) that visited Jesus. They did bring three gifts to Jesus and these were all fitting for the King; gold which was a gift to be given that was worthy of a king; there was frankincense which may have represented prayers being offered up to God; and there myrrh which would be used at Jesus' death for His burial. I doubt very much if there were only three kings on three camels. There may have been a dozen or more kings or Magi but there would have certainly been support staff and armed guards as they had likely been traveling for over half a year or more.

4. No visit in the Manger

I discovered that Jesus was not a babe lying in a manger when the Magi

or wise men (three kings) visited Jesus and presented their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. When they did arrive, it was well after the birth of Jesus after Jesus had already been presented in the temple (Luke 2:22-39) so when the wise men (Magi) "went into the house (not a manger) they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh" (Matt 2:11). The word used for child come from the Greek word "paidion" which means "young child, a little boy," or "a little girl" which is different from the Greek word used for infant. The Magi came "after Jesus was born in Bethlehem" (Matt 2:1) but not right at His birth.

5. An Un-Stable Account?

There is no record in the Bible that Jesus was born in a stable or a cave but we do know that there were animals present, therefore we can presume that Jesus was born in a place that housed animals or were animals were kept. Was it outside? Was it in a barn or stable? The Bible never tells us. The only clue we have to where Jesus was born was that He was born in a feeding trough (a manger) and animals were present. I suppose my conclusion is this; if God had thought it was important enough for us to know, He would've included it in Scripture. I think God wanted the focus to be on Christ and not the place.

6. Parental Rights

Jesus' parents, Joseph and Mary had no say in what to call the baby. Maybe they had some other name picked out. Not likely though since Joseph found Mary to be with child even before they were married so deciding on a name was probably the farthest thing from their minds. Instead, Joseph wanted to secretly divorce Mary to shield her from public shame and scandal but an angel told Joseph that Mary "will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins" (Matt 1:21). Joseph was not the real father but the Spirit of God was, even so God had predetermined the name Jesus which means "savior" because "he will save his people from their sins."

Conclusion

When it comes down to it, it doesn't really matter if we don't fully understand every detail in the account of Jesus' death. What does matter is if you have a relationship with Him or not. Jesus said "Whoever is not with me is against me, and whoever does not gather with me scatters" (Matt 12:30), there is no 3rd option. You must repent and believe in Christ or you will die in your sins by your refusal to repent and trust in the Savior.


