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PASTORAL LETTER

Greetings to you all in the matchless name of our Lord and Saviour
Jesus Christ. It gives me immense



joy to write to you all once again through this newsletter-Reach Out. God has been faithful to each one of us. He has enabled us to see the eleventh month of this year 2022. We are indebted to God for all the blessings received, be it our life, family, work, or society. It is God's grace that we are enjoying everything in our lives. I hope and believe that we had wonderful meditations on the topic "Loving our neighbour as ourselves" last month. As we are entering into the season of Thanksgiving and harvest. The theme for the month of November will be "Giving Thanks to the Lord".

Thankfulness is associated with getting something and showing your appreciation for it. But the principal that God wants us to understand is that thankfulness is a lifestyle. Not only thankful for what you get but grateful for all that has been done for us.

Gratefulness and Thankfulness are the two things that we need to practice in our lives so that we find peace with God and ourselves. Bible reminds us that we need to give thanks always. 1 Chronicles 16:34 "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his love endures forever." *Psalms 9:1* says "I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my hear; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds." *Philippians 4:6-7* "Do not be anxious for anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." *Psalms 95:2-3* says, let us come before him with thanksgiving and extol him with music and song. For the lord is the great God, the great king above all gods.

In the Old Testament as an act of thanksgiving people use to bring their first fruits to the lord. It was an instruction from the lord that, people brought the first fruits as a form of reverence and honoured God by giving first to God. when we do this, we acknowledge that God is the owner of everything we have. Therefore, we give him the first and the best. As we see in

Deuteronomy 26:1-2 the instructions that the Israelites received from Moses. "When you enter the land that Lord the God is giving you as an inheritance, and you take possession of it and settle in it, you are to take some of the fruits of all your produce from the soil of the land that the lord your God is giving you and put in a basket and shall go to the place which the Lord your God shall choose to place his name there." (Deuteronomy 26:1-2).

Beloved God's people, as we are celebrating thanksgiving Sunday/Harvest festival this month. Since the Covid times, there are so many things around us that tempt us to fall into despair. Not only many of us continue to fall sick due to diseases but also our world and nations are battered by many crises and disasters of both natural and human made. Climate change, economic uncertainty, migration issues, wars, un-employment, injustice, oppression, religious intolerance, violence and many more. These fears confront us on daily basis, filling our minds and hearts with fear and anxiety.

Amid these challenges, the Word of God comes to us encouraging us not to lose heart, but to be thankful in every situation and to honour God through our first fruits of all our produce and receive his blessings. *Proverbs* 3:9 "honour the lord with your wealth and with first fruit of all your produce; then your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats with bursting vine. In Habakkuk chapter 3 we see God's word coming strongly in the ancient words of the prophet Habakkuk: "Yet I will rejoice in God." the historical context for Habakkuk according to most Biblical scholars is that, Habakkuk was written during 7th century BCE in response to the westward expansion of the Babylonian empire. The writing was on the wall; it would not be long before Babylonian armies breached Judah's northern border and began their campaign of terror. Soldiers would burn fields, slaughter cattle, demolish homes and villages, and murder whole community in their efforts to gain control of the trade routes from Africa to Asia that passed through the tiny nation of Judah. In this context, how could Habakkuk possibly declare, "Yet I will rejoice God"

What Habakkuk had and we desperately need is a theology of gratitude fleshed out by a spiritual practice of thanksgiving. From a theological perspective, gratitude is more than just a positive response to the good things that we have already received; it is an attitude of trust in the one who has always loved us and who promises to sustain us through all the positive

and negative circumstances of our lives. whether or not our tress yield fruit and our fields produce grain... whether or not our flocks give birth to young and our investments generate profits... whether or not our bodies remain healthy and our dreams find fulfilment... God continues to be the changeless reality with which "we live and move and have our being." (*Acts* 17:28).

It's only through faith rooted in gratitude one can express himself/herself through the practice of thanksgiving. And just as gratitude goes deeper than just felling good about what we have, so thanksgiving is more than saying thank you. Living thankfully means living as though the abundance of God is real and there truly is enough to go around. The practice of thanksgiving engages us in the work of doing justice, loving kindness, living with compassion, and sharing with generosity. The practice of thanksgiving means taking our proper place within the family of God's people and if necessary, trusting God enough to give our last penny so that all can survive and thrive together.

WHAT DOES 'GIVE THANKS' MEAN?

very year at Thanksgiving, we give thanks to the Lord. We gather in Churches and share blessings He has bestowed on our lives, and we say thank God for everything. But what does "give thanks to the Lord" mean in a biblical context?

Obviously, those in the Bible didn't have the American holiday Thanksgiving. They did have harvest festivals. But have we misconstrued the meaning of this phrase? This article will explore what "give thanks to the Lord" truly means and how we can carry it out this Thanksgiving and in our daily lives.

What Does Give Thanks to the Lord Mean?

The phrase, "give thanks to the Lord" appears in several verses in Scripture, predominantly in the Psalms. But when we think of this phrase, we most likely think of Psalm 107:1.

"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. His love endures forever."

This phrase appears in worship songs and tends to be one of the most quotable verses in the Bible, especially around the month of November. What does this verse truly mean? Let's analyze a commentary to dive further into this verse and phrase. First, we have to analyze the chapter as a whole.

• A Call for Celebration

First and foremost, the thanks in the verse calls for celebration. Why? Because of the Lord's mercy, goodness, and love. It's everlasting. As temporal, contingent beings, we are unused to unconditional love, forgiveness, and grace. We celebrate and dwell in the Lord's everlasting goodness.

A Recognition of God's Provision

Thanks tends to arise when we realize all the ways God has provided for us—the ways he has provided in the past, today, and how He will continue to do so in the future. A practice I love is counting my blessings each day before I get up. I won't get out of bed until I can count ten blessings I know God will provide for the day. Gratitude doesn't have to start at Thanksgiving.

An Understanding of Our Past Bondage

Psalm 107 recognizes that we have been freed from the bondage of our oppressors. On the spiritual level, we have been released from the

oppression of sin. We can experience true thanks because we have been truly freed.

The "thanks" in the verse literally translates to the word *yada*. It means to "cast down," "throw down," or "shoot thanks." It's often akin to shooting arrows or throwing stones. Not exactly the imagery we'd have in mind for Thanksgiving, but it's a strong act of worship. It is an act of confession and thanksgiving combined. For more on this word and other verses that use it, check out this lexicon here.

What Does the Bible Say about Giving Thanks?

Before we can dive into how we can give thanks, we should first dissect what the Bible says about the act of giving thanks. Let's examine some verses below.

1 Corinthians 1:4 tells us to be thankful for the people that God has placed in our lives. He often provides people who can help pray for us, sympathize with us, and encourage us.

Ephesians 5:20 tells us to give thanks for anything and everything. This may look like thanking God for the mundane days. For the difficult things. For the tests and trials that refine us and purify us.

Philippians 4:6 says that thanks is often expressed in prayer. Prayer is the predominant way we communicate with God, so it makes sense that praise can be lifted up to Him in this way.

1 Thessalonians 5:18 tells us to give thanks in all circumstances. We can't reserve a time for gratitude just at the end of November. We acknowledge and praise the Lord in every season and every circumstance.

Hebrews 13:15 describes praise and thanks as a sacrifice. We may not always be in the mood to praise the Lord. Sometimes giving Him thanks amid difficult circumstances can seem like the hardest task in the world. And yet, we continue to do so.

We could go on, but Scripture makes one thing very clear: thanksgiving should be a part of our regular lives. So how do we give thanks to the Lord in the twenty-first century?

It's often messy, inconvenient, and hard. Thankfully, we have a God who delights in our praises, no matter how weak or sad we feel. So let's continue to thank him, in all circumstances and seasons.

HYMN HISTORY



"A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" (German: "Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott") is one of the best known hymns by the reformer Martin Luther, a prolific hymnodist. Luther wrote the words and composed the melody sometime between 1527 and 1529. It has been translated into English at least seventy times and also into many other languages. The words are mostly original, though the first line paraphrases that of Psalm 46.

No hymn is identified with the Protestant Reformation more than Martin Luther's "A Mighty Fortress." Luther (1483-1546) left a body of congregational songs that both defined the Lutheran confessional tradition and became truly ecumenical in influence.

The story of Luther's reforming movement is widely known. A Roman Catholic monk, his study led him to believe that the Church of Rome was corrupt. On October 31, 1517, he posted his famous 95 theses on the door of the church at Wittenberg, inviting debate. Luther broke with Rome in 1521, refusing to retract his writings before the Diet of Worms. Subsequently, he was recognized as the leader of the German Reformation.

In addition to skills as a writer, translator and preacher, Luther was an amateur musician. His thirty-seven hymns stand alongside his theological writings and his translation of the Bible into German as testaments of his creativity and intellectual ability.

United Methodist Hymnal editor Carlton R. Young summarizes well Luther's contribution to hymnody: he "wrote several original hymns and melodies, revised many Latin hymns to German texts set to adaptations of plainsong and folk melodies, and encouraged the composition of new texts and rhythmic hymn melodies. His thirty-seven hymns and paraphrase are cast in simple, plain, and sometimes rough phrases and striking metaphors, qualities that are for the most part lost in English translations."

Leading Catholic liturgical scholar and musician Edward Foley calls Martin Luther "a model pastoral musician... a proponent and composer of music from the people and for the people, as evidenced in his chorales." Speaking specifically of Ein feste Burg—the German title for "A mighty fortress" – and after pages of careful analysis, Fr. Foley notes

that this chorale "appears to be a paradigm of liturgical 'people music'. Luther's "craft is affirmed by its ageless singability" — high praise from a Catholic scholar, indicating not only the quality of Luther's work, but also its ecumenical popularity.

The original rhythm of this tune (not found in The United Methodist Hymnal) is quite lively and adds much to the vitality of this strong text. You can be sure that Luther and the Wesleys gave careful attention to the melodies they chose to pair with their texts. Justifying the use of specific current popular melodies with classic hymn texts by referring to the historical precedent of Luther and the Wesleys is not only inaccurate, but also borders on hymnological heresy. This is not to say that such practices might be helpful for invigorating historical texts, but the precedent cannot be convincingly established by referring to either Martin Luther or the Wesley brothers.



The greatest work that Luther accomplished was the translation of the New Testament into the language of the people. Then to the amazement of everyone, Luther began to write hymns and gospel songs. The people sang them with great fervor. Luther preached long and

hard, becoming a forceful leader of one of the world's greatest spiritual awakenings. Hymnbooks began to be used in the schools and homes, as well as in the churches. The Christian worship songs became a spring of spirituality in the hearts and lives of the people.

The song for which Luther will be remembered is "A Mighty Fortress is our God," written circa 1527. It exalts God to a high and lofty position in the minds and hearts of those who believe the message of the song.

On the base of Luther's tomb is inscribed, A Mighty Fortress Is Our God. It is said to be the greatest hymn of the greatest man in the greatest period in German history. Historians declare that it has been sung by persecuted people on their way to exile, and by martyrs at their death. The song is rugged and strong, much like Luther himself.
