Further underscored by our presenters was the importance of branding and rebranding, consequences of posting inappropriate pictures and videos like fighting, twerking, underage drinking, and the grim and highly disproportionate consequences of illegal online activity for African American boys and girls, which include fines, litigation and yes--jail time.

A few important tips worth noting included: Don't talk bad about parents on Social media as predators target unhappy teens. Don't show or brag about what you have (shoes, clothes, games, etc.); it's sad but people may target and attempt to rob or steal them. If you are not proud of your social media 'reputation', you get a DO OVER by deleting your posts, unfriending certain 'friends' and starting over.

Cash prizes were given to our students for answering questions correctly. Although we miss face-to-face workshops, using Zoom allowed families from all over the world to attend like my sister and

nephews in Germany! Lastly, participants completed an evaluation at the end of the workshop. Overall, the participants enjoyed the workshop, learned a number of new things and felt the workshop was a good use of their time. Let's Get College-Ready!



Applying to colleges in the middle of a pandemic can be even more of a challenge, so we pivoted and held our "Let's Get College-Ready Workshop" on Zoom! We addressed changes in the application process due to COVID and discussed the steps to take. Our speakers were (from left to right) Ms. Marnessa Vital, Education Consultant; Langston Hughes High School Counselor, Ms. Faylena Lewis; recent college graduate Mrs. Shavon Brown and Zena's House Executive Director, Mrs. Bernice Bronson.

We started the session with two videos about scholarships followed by Ms. Lewis who presented on the college application process. Some details were specific to students in Fulton county, GA only (using NAVIANCE software). She provided many helpful tips to include starting the process EARLY, researching and prioritizing schools, scheduling virtual visits, how to ask for recommendations, and creating a brag sheet. Mrs. Brown discussed using your contacts, mentors, and professional connections to your advantage. Such as family members in the military, sorority or fraternity as they may provide scholarship opportunities, etc. Additionally, update your resume regularly and always make sure you have a second person review and edit your essays!

Ms. Vital spoke about college debt, explained the purpose of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FASFA), how to complete it and tips to include: 1. use all 10 spaces given to enter the schools you are applying to, 2. don't lose your password because it's a long process to set a new one, and collect all documents before applying including your parent's tax information. Lastly, Mrs. Bronson discussed a number scholarships strategies and available scholarships students can currently apply for. Missed the workshop? No problem!
