**SUMMARY OF RESEARCH FINDINGS:** The family tree of Edward Douglass Gilmer over the last two centuries are almost entirely in two locations. Russell County, Virginia for his father's side, and Hawkins County, Tennessee on his mother's side. A few branches reach into Culpeper County, Virginia, and North Carolina. The family arrived in their locations early in the frontier period and were able to secure large pieces of land, which made most of them at least moderately wealthy. They were leaders in their communities with many of them serving as military officers and politicians.

Most of the ancestors were farmers but we also see merchants, a minister and an insurance salesman. Five veterans have been found in this tree, to include three Civil War Confederates, one of which fought at Gettysburg and two War of 1812 veterans, one of which was the Colonel of the Hawkins County, Tennessee Militia. Several others with military titles have been found without military records and likely were in their local militias. It appears that most, if not all branches lead to Revolutionary War Veterans, and their land grants are likely what lead them to the frontier of western Virginia, and Tennessee.

It is undetermined as to the ethnic background of these ancestors in this report but appear to be a mixture of English, Scottish, Scott-Irish, German, and possibly one French branch. More, deeper research will need to be done to determine this because we do not have any immigrant ancestors in this level of the report. No Native Americans were found in this report. Six slave holding ancestors were found with as many as forty-two slave in their care.

**GENEALOGIST COMMENTS:** The Edward Douglas Gilmer family tree is unique due to the amount of wealth and prominent people that make up its branches. Their prominence and documentation had led to this report being extremely long compared to most and we are blessed to be able to learn so much about so many individuals, as well as family groups. The families appear to be hard working, strong Christians in a tight knit community. It appears that many of the direct ancestors of this report had

siblings that intermarried into other families that appear in this family tree. Both sides have a Confederate veteran which speaks to their love of community. In multiple occasions we find at least three generations living in one house, they took care of their own.

All ancestors are matched to how they are kin to (Client Name), such as 2x great-grandfather, etc., so future generations in the family will know their relation to each family member. The report reads in direct male lines until an end is found, and then moves over to the closet female line, etc.

It has truly been a treat to spend some much time learning about the ancestors of Edward Douglas Gilmer and bringing them back to life! May they never be forgotten!

**FURTHER RESEARCH SUGGESTION:** More details can be found about the people in this report. This project can be extended in other Family Tree Nuts packages that reach deeper into history. Searches in local repositories will no doubt turn up wills, deeds and other family records that have not been scanned into online formats. 

He was the last survivor of a family of 13 children, and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Cummings Gilmer. Born in Russell county, he had spent his entire life near his birthplace. Surviving are the following children: Mrs. Walter Ferguson and Miss Mattie Gilmer of Lebanon; C. H. and M. G. Gilmer of Matoaka, W. Va.; Mrs. F. L. Ketron and Mrs. B. F. Gilmer of Lebanon; and E. T. Gilmer, Jr., of Beckley, W. Va. Also surviving are 14 grandchildren.

His wife died several years ago.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home at 3 p. m. Monday. Interment will follow in the Russell Memorial cemetery.



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



Hale enlisted on 26 September 1862, in Hawkins County, Tennessee, in Company L, 60<sup>th</sup> Mounted Tennessee Infantry. When the men of the 60<sup>th</sup> reported for duty to the Confederate Army, they would only take ten companies, and Company L disbanded. It is not known if this 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. Phillip S. Hale, is the same person as the subject of this report, or if he is another relative. Perhaps the title of Colonel was given by mistake in the article because his father was a Colonel in the War of 1812.
- Phillip married Harriet Somerville Richards on 3 September 1846, in Culpeper County, Tennessee.

In 1850, Phillip lived in Hawkins County, Tennessee, with his wife and three children. He was a farmer, and his real estate was valued at \$3,000.

Spears' real estate was valued at \$2,000, and personal estate at \$5,000.

## MRS. HARRIET SOMERVILLE HALE,

Rogersville, Feb. 8.-Mrs. Harriet Somerville Hale died at her home in Rogersville on the early morning of Friday, January 24. She was the daughter of Major James Richards and wife, Winnifred Berry Benson Richards, and was born March 12, 1820, at Point Pleasant, Virginia, on her father's plantation between the Rappahannoch and the Rapidan rivers. She first came to Rogersville in 1835 with her father, whose health had failed, and who had heard of the wonderful curative powers of the sulphur springs near here. The trip was made by carriage, and took many days. Major Richards was pleased with the place, purchased the springs, and, until his death several years later, spent most of his time there. At his request his body was buried on the summit of the high mountain overlooking the springs.

Harriet Somerville Richards was most happily married to Major Philip Smith Hale on the 3rd of September, 1846, at her home in Culpepper county, Va. To them the following children were born: Winfield Berry Hale, Rogersville; Mrs. Margaret Hamilton Gammon, Knoxville; Robert Franklin Hale, deceased; John Shelton Hale, Knoxville; George Douglas Hale, Rogersville; James Richards Hale, deceased; Mary Elizabeth Riley, deceased; Frances Hugh Hale, Rogersville, and Philip Smith Hale, Rogersville.

About eight years ago Mrs. Hale fell and practured her hip, since which time she has been an invalid. Though confined to her chair or bed her hands were not idle, but were ever doing some dainty needle work for her children or friends, and no day was ever so full of suffering that she could put aside the needs or sorrows of others. Her bright cheerful little home was always open, and no acquaintance deemed a visit in Rogersville complete without a call on "Mother Hale," or "Aunt Somer," as she was lovingly called.

She was a woman of unusual interest, and, having read a great deal, was a most interesting companion. These, with her varied experiences, bitter sorrows and long illness, were the very elements which gave her such a full knowledge, and sympathy for others.

Richards drove through the mountains from his home in Culpepper county, Va., to the springs and being well pleased with the place and the picturesque scenery, purchased acres of land in the valley and along the mountain side. Here during the remainder of his life he spent his summers, always bringing a large number of slaves and dispensing hospitality with a lavish hand. 



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• Jacob served in the Civil War as a Private, in Company B, 60<sup>th</sup> Tennessee Mounted Infantry. He enlisted on 14 September 1862, in Rogersville, Hawkins County, Tennessee for three years. When the unit was mustered into service for the war on 7 November 1862, he was listed as being on furlough. He must not have served the total three years for some reason because on 11 December 1863, Jacob sold five bushels of corn to the Confederate Army for \$10. It is unknown if he returned from furlough, or if he was granted a discharge for some reason. In 1863, his unit took part in the battles of Chickasaw Bayou, Chickasaw Bluff, Vicksburg, and Big Black River Bridge. It is unknown if Charles was present for any of these due to incomplete records. It is the genealogist's opinion that since he was on furlough at the time of the musting in, and he was home to sell corn to the army later before his enlistment would have been up, he likely was given some sort of discharge. His brother John Charles served in the same unit as a 3<sup>rd</sup> Lieutenant.

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





- 3<sup>rd</sup> Great-Grandfather Captain Lazarus Spears was born 29 September 1785, in possibly Halifax County, North Carolina, to Samuel Spears and Sarah Rebecca Smith. He is called Captain in the article below. No military records have been found for the War of 1812, but he may have been a Captain of the local militia.
- Lazarus married Nancy Haynes 26 June 1810, likely in Hawkins County, Tennessee. Nancy died in 1826.



- In 1817, Lazarus purchased one hundred acres of land on both sides of Dodson's Creek, from Thomas Haynes, and Herbert George
- In 1826, Lazarus purchased thirty acres of land in Hawkins County, Tennessee.



- In 1830, Lazarus lived in Hawkins County, Tennessee, with five other family members, and thirteen slaves. The slaves were one female, 36-54, one female 24-35, three females 10-23, one female under 10, two males 24-35, three males 10-23, two males under 10.
- Lazarus married Elizabeth Mary "Polly" Amis on 3 January 1833, in Hawkins County, Tennessee.
- In 1840, Lazarus lived in Hawkins County, Tennessee, with six other family members, and fifteen slaves. The slaves were one female 55-99, two females 36-54, two females 24-35, three females 10-23, four females under 10, one male 10-23, two males under 10. Five people were employed in agriculture.
- Lazarus died 4 March 1849, in Hipshire Hollow, Hawkins County, Tennessee, and is buried in Spears Cemetery, Hawkins County, Tennessee.

- Mary married Lazarus Spears on 3 January 1833, in Hawkins County, Tennessee. Her story matches her husbands until his death in 1849.
- In 1850, In 1850, Mary lived in Hawkins County, Tennessee with her mother Mary Amis, and seven children. Her husband Lazarus had died the previous year. Mary is listed as a farmer and the real estate was valued at \$3,300.
- In 1860, Mary lived in Mill Bend, Hawkins County, Tennessee, with eight other children or family members. Her son Lazarus is listed as a farmer.

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• In 1870, Mary lived in Rogersville, Hawkins County, Tennessee, with three family members.

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• Mary died 11 November 1873, in Hawkins County, Tennessee, and is buried in Spears Cemetery, Hawkins County, Tennessee.
