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

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## **BIG YEAR FOR NATIONAL PARKS**

This year is the 100th anniversary of the National Park Service which was signed into law by President Woodrow Wilson on August 25, 1916.



And, it is also the 100th anniversary of what became Everglades National Park, thanks to some determined women in the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs who created a park at Royal Palm Hammock on Paradise Key near Homestead. If it were not for May Mann Jennings and her political clout (her husband William Sherman Jennings was governor of Florida 1901-1904), the ages-old trees might have been cut down so that the land could be farmed or developed.

In 1934 enabling legislation for Everglades National Park, which includes Royal Palm Hammock, was passed by Congress, thanks to Ruth Bryan Owen (the first woman from Florida to be elected as a Representative). However, World War II intervened and it was not until 1947 that President Harry S Truman pronounced the formal opening at a ceremony in Everglades City with our own Deaconess Harriet Bedell giving the invocation.

## Local History & Mystery

Ghosts of Chokoloskee? Death of Ochopee?

New books with these fascinating local histories will be for sale at **Art-in-the-Glades** on **Saturday**, **January 16**, in Everglades City along with arts & crafts by local vendors.

Chokoloskee is the home of the historic Smallwood Store which is the setting of the killing of Mister Watson, the subject of a famous novel by Peter Matthieson. Author Rick Magers imagines, after meticulous research, what the conversations would have been like back then among all the protagonists. His book *Ghosts of Chokoloskee* is one of many historical books that will be for sale on January 16.

Ochopee is known for having the "smallest post office". It was once a thriving tomato farming community and then home to the Golden Lion Motel, a great stopping place and community center until it was bought out by the National Park Service for Big Cypress National Preserve. You can read about the heartache that was caused by the death of this community in Jeff Whichello's book *What Happened to Ochopee?* which will also be for sale at Art-in-the-Glades.

## **CHURCH CELEBRATES 90 YEARS**

In 1926 a Presbyterian Community Church was organized in the town of Everglades. The Board of Elders included Mayor Daniel W. McLeod and among the Trustees was Judge George W. Storter, Jr. Services were held in



W. Storter, Jr. Services were held in the Everglades Club (Community Center which also showed films).

In 1939 the membership voted to build their own church and approached David Graham Copeland, manager of the Collier Corporation, who organized the donation of land on the Circle. However, there were conditions: the building must be completed by October 1940 and must be non-denominational.

In recent years, Everglades Community Church has completed a number of projects: restoration of the exterior to the original design, enlargement of the sanctuary, installation of stained-glass windows, rebuilding of the Louise Collier Jinkins Fellowship Hall, and construction of the Memorial Garden.

ECC was proclaimed a City Historic site in 2007. The historical marker was granted by the State in 2008.
