


Friday is Preservation Day with Rachel Kangas of FPAN explaining how to restore old cemeteries.

NEW VISITOR CENTER

Where can tourists go to get local information?

ESHP is opening a Visitor Center to promote area businesses in the coral-colored building *(photo above)* at 207 West Broadway, opposite the Rod & Gun, where Glades Realty had their office.

The formal launch is on **Saturday**, **February 1**, with the Mayor cutting the ribbon and numerous other dignitaries taking part. Everyone is welcome to attend and enjoy refreshments after the historic ceremony.

The Visitor Center is also the Trail Town headquarters for the City which was recognized in 2019 by the Florida's Office of Greenways & Trails as an important hub for recreational activities, such as paddling, hiking and biking.



The Center will offer brochures and artwork for sale as well as answers to tourists' questions. It will be staffed by volunteers and open daily during our busy season.
