REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The year 2018 continued the area’s recovery after Hurricane Irma the previous September. Local public buildings, such as City Hall and Everglades Community Church, were finally ready for occupation after extensive refurbishment.

The speaker at our **Annual Meeting** on February 23rd was Jack Shealy who talked about his life in the Gladesman culture. Jack grew up in Ochopee where his family carries on the traditions they share with the Indians – never take more from nature than you need.

The new Everglades City Planning & Zoning Board established regular meetings on the third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. in City Hall. Bob Bergin volunteered to be the chairman.

At our March meeting, the Board elected Kathy Brock as President and in October we invited John M. Wilson to join us as a Director.

The ESHP Board introduced **Lifetime memberships** so you never have to worry about renewals again and can show support for our goal to preserve the unique heritage of this area.

The big event of the spring was the 90th Anniversary of the opening of the Tamiami Trail. The Friends of the Museum organized the celebration which included a parade and the reading of Barron Collier’s speech by his grandson.

Unfortunately, the old Ivey House Lodge and adjacent little houses were beyond repair and were demolished in September. A new Lodge is being built in much the same style as the old one but high enough to be above flood plain.

The old **Everglades Bank Building** featured as one of “Florida’s 11 to Save” on the front page of *The Florida Preservationist*, the official publication of the Florida Trust for Historic Preservation. Our **Welcome-Back Historical Talk** on November 16th focused on the history and future of the Bank Building.

ESHP sponsored a **Veterans’ Memorial** which was unveiled on November 11th on the City Hall Lawn. We have also funded the new **picture rail** in City Hall which will allow some of our historic photos to be hung again.

Finally, we were sorry to hear of the **passing** of Dorothy (“Mama Dot”) Weeks and Beatrice (“Aunt Bea”) Rogers, both long-standing residents of Chokoloskee. Marco Island lost its architect, Herb Savage who shaped its modern history from the 1960s onward.
