- * Decrease their risk of drug and alcohol use
- * Have healthier relationships with friends and family

- Helping a child discover and develop their strengths
- Sharing relevant experiences from their own life
- Establishing trust and friendship by observing confidentiality
- Listening to and standing by a child through joys and frustrations

Our Story

Lakeland mentoring was originally established in 2013 as an affiliate of The Kinship Network. In 2015, this program was brought under the services of Lakeland Family Resource Center.

We believe that mentoring relationships can be the basis for healthy development in many areas of a young person's life. For this reason, we collaborate with many organizations that are already actively working with children and families in the Washburn County area.

Aligning with National Standards

Our mentoring program follows the format and process established by the National Mentorship Partnership. This six stage process reflects the latest in quality mentoring research, policies, and practices.

1. Recruitment
2. Screening
3. Training
4. Matching
5. Monitoring & Support
6. Closure

How it works

Youth come to the mentoring program via referral from their school, a social worker, or other trusted adult. We work with youth ages 5-14. Both the youth and their parent/guardian fill out an application and go through our screening process. Once they have been approved for the program, they are put on a waiting list until a suitable mentor match is found.

Volunteer Mentors come to us through a variety of ways—churches, friends, family, and through Lakeland's other programs and events. Volunteer mentors complete an application and screening process. Once approved, they are put on a wait list, provided training opportunities, and work with Lakeland staff to find a suitable youth match.

What Mentors do:

- ◇ Commit to spending 2 hours (minimum) per month together, for one year.
- ◇ Listen to youth and offer non-judgmental support.
- ◇ Share relevant experiences from their own life.
- ◇ Introduce youth to new experiences
- ◇ Continue to stay connected with Lakeland staff as a mentor.

Keeping it local

Lakeland mentoring reaches out to all corners of Washburn County. Washburn County is home to just under 16,000 people and is located in beautiful Northwest WI.
