#### WHITE RUSSIANS Continued

have been interwoven since their marriage a quarter of a century ago in Mukden, China, provide a modern odyssey beneath a scudding Red cloud.

Arkady's father, a German musician, went to Russia more than 90 years ago. He was a celebrated professor in the Moscow Conservatory from 1863 to 1869. Among his close associates were the great composers, Tchaikovsky and Nikolai Rubinstein.

He fell in love with one of his pupils, a dark-eyed Tatar countess, whose proud family possessed vast riches and countless acres of land since the time of the Great Khan. But Weber was a commoner and frowned on by the lady's father. When she married the German musician, she went to him without a dowry.

Marguerite's father was director of post and telegraph in St. Petersburg, now called Leningrad, but she won't use that name for the city.

Her mother, born and reared in a French-speaking canton of Switzerland, went to St. Petersburg some time before the Russian revolution of 1905. When the Grand Duke's children no longer required her services, she taught French at Smolny Institution, a school for girls of noble birth. Only because her mother was a teacher there, Marguerite was allowed to attend the institution.

ALTHOUGH his father was a German, Arkady volunteered for the Imperial Russian Army at the outbreak of World War I when he was 17. After only two months of training, he was sent to the Eastern Front to fight his father's people. Wounded, he was taken prisoner and spent almost two years in Germany. Twice he escaped only to be recaptured.

When Arkady returned to his home at Tambow, in Central Russia, the Russians were warring among themselves. The Tsar had been deposed. The Bolshevik Reds and the Menshevik Whites were in a bloody struggle for control. The dark-eyed countess, young Weber's mother, was dying of cancer. The despised Reds were winning. Arkady saw that Lenin and Trotsky were on their way to the top. When his mother died, Arkady fled the country.

He made his way through Siberia, and crossed into China. When he reached Harbin, then a refuge for Russian aristocrats, he had only 5 kopeks (about 5 cents), which he spent for a loaf of bread. But he quickly found a job playing the piano in a movie. It paid him 60 yen a month, but it didn't last long. After a few days, his salary was reduced to 8 yen because the theater wasn't doing so well.

It wasn't funny then, but Arkady laughs about it now. "I don't know whether the patronage dropped off because

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
