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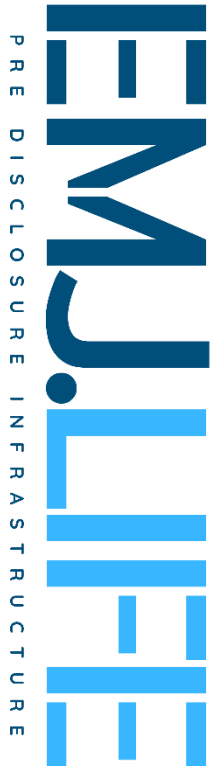

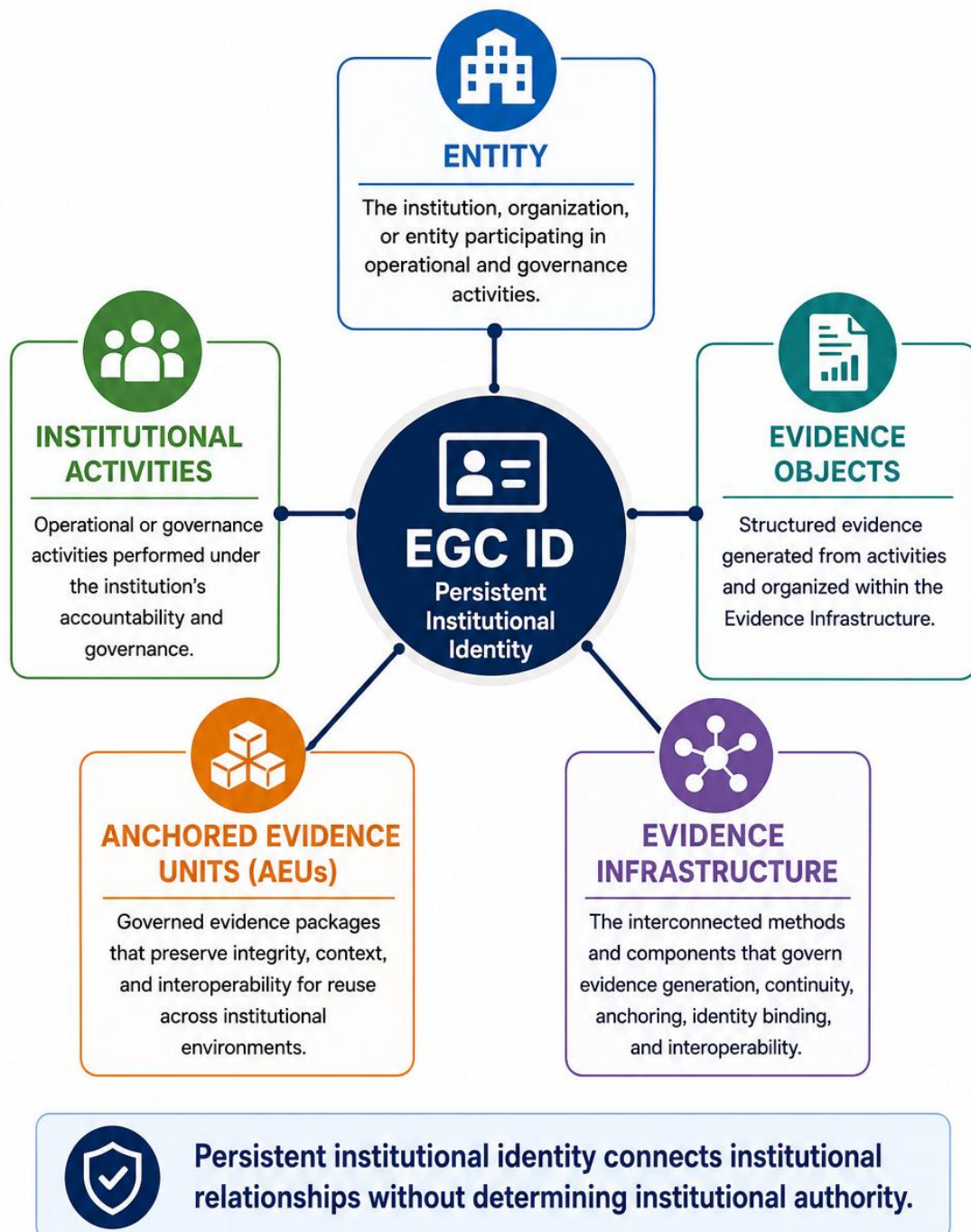

Its purpose is to clarify the architectural responsibilities of institutional identity while distinguishing them from the independent responsibilities of reporting organizations, assurance
