THE ARTS ARE EVERYWHERE

- The Saint Louis Art Fair has returned to live exhibits in downtown Clayton, Missouri, a prestigious business and residential community neighboring St. Louis.
- In Hannibal, the birthplace of Samuel Clemens, the literature of Mark Twain continues to inspire, engage, and entertain, and the man himself makes an appearance at least once a year at the Twain on Main Festival.
- If you value fact over fiction, you
 would enjoy going to Columbia for
 the True/False Film Festival, called
 "The most important documentary
 festival in America" by the Los
 Angeles Times.

- The new terminal at the Kansas City
 International Airport which will open in
 March, 2023 will contain 28 separate art
 installations, 19 by local artists who
 represent diverse parts of the
 community, worth \$5.65 million, making
 it the largest public art project in Kansas
 City history.
- Friday Art Walks bring people into local downtown areas and stimulate the economy in cities like Springfield, Lee's Summit, Ste. Genevieve, Cape Girardeau, and Hermann.
- The Scott Joplin International Ragtime Festival held each spring in **Sedalia** celebrates the important contributions to American music by Joplin, who spent many years composing and playing in this central Missouri town.
- The Sculpture Walk of **Saint Joseph** introduces contemporary outdoor public art and sculptures to the entire community. The juried exhibits, on loan to the city for one year, is made possible by a partnership with the city, the Downtown Community Improvement District and individual sponsors.
- Fine Arts Education Day sponsored by the Missouri Alliance for Arts
 Education brings hundreds of students from diverse backgrounds to perform at the state capitol in Jefferson City each March. The night before, advocacy training sessions prepare students in the Show-Me Arts program to be effective advocates and meet with their state senators and representatives.
