The Year In Review: A Compassionate Response at the Border

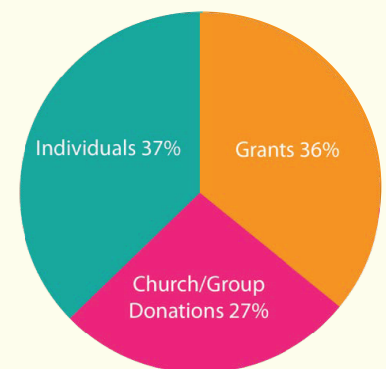
Border Compassion continues to provide a humanitarian response to asylum-seekers and refugees who arrive in Mexicali, Mexico unable to legally immigrate into the US and unable to return to their home countries as most are fleeing cartel violence or government oppression.

In partnership with the faith communities who join us in this ministry, we are grateful to share all that was accomplished:

- 102 individuals lived in the shelter where they received shelter, food, medicine, and all basic living needs
- BC now extends Crossover invitations to previous residents of the shelter who have resettled in Mexicali and with whom we remain in relationship
- More than 55,000 meals were provided on a daily basis and for celebrations of holidays and holy days
- 31 faith communities of all kinds, with a total of 203 volunteers, have participated in 12 Crossover events
- Generous grants and donations enabled us to replace the roof which failed during a storm damaging the entire top floor, install new toilets and update plumbing, repair or replace air conditioners in the bedrooms, and renovate and paint the ESL classroom damaged in the flood. We also pay for propane for cooking and drinking water
- Transition assistance was provided to 12 families who legally immigrated into the US prior to the closure of the border and need support with immigration attorneys and living expenses

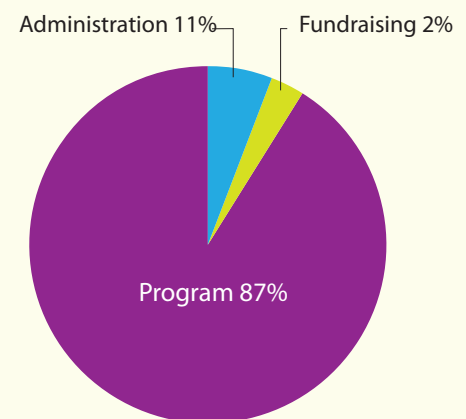
Our greatest challenge and urgency is that every NGO that previously supported the shelter--including the United Nations--has pulled out. Border Compassion is the only remaining agency ensuring La Posada shelter remains a welcoming sanctuary for immigrants and refugees.
