This Exhibitor's Handbook is intended to serve as a guide for exhibitors at the Curry County Fair. Information updates since publication are posted at the Fair Office. No liability is accepted for any errors or omissions.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

If any of the following rules or procedures aren't clear, please contact the Fairgrounds staff or the Department Superintendent.

The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition is vested in the Fair Manager.

On entry day; numbers, forms and tags will be available in Docia Sweet Hall.



RULES:

All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to read the information in this Exhibitors Handbook, both here as well as the specific rules for the department you are entering. Specific rules vary from Department to Department.

- **ENTRIES:** Only one entry per class by an exhibitor unless otherwise stated.
- **SPECIAL RULES:** All special rules listed under **applicable** Departments must be observed in addition to all rules listed in this section.

EXHIBITOR NUMBERS:

You **MUST** have an exhibitor number that was issued in or after 2022. You will use the same number for all entries at the Curry County Fair. If you don't have a new exhibitor number (or can't remember yours), they are available at the Fair Office until the Friday before entry day.

EXHIBITOR ENTRY FORMS:

Complete a separate form for each department entered. Complete all areas of the form as thoroughly as possible.

- **"Department"** is the two-letter abbreviation, (CA, PH etc.). See the Department pages for the code letters.
- **"Division"** is the age and/or skill category for the specific Department and/or class that you are entering. Each Department may have different Divisions. This information is located at the beginning of each Department page.
- **"Class Number"** and **"item-description"**: The 3-digit class numbers and descriptions are in the relevant Department in the Exhibitor Handbook

ENTRY TAGS: Complete an entry tag for each exhibit you are entering. Remove the claim check portion and keep it to reclaim your item on release day. **NO EXHIBIT WILL BE RELEASED WITHOUT THE CLAIM CHECK.**

Some Departments require special or additional tags.

ELIGIBILITY:

- A. All Static departments are open to all counties and states.
- B. Only the owner, maker or grower may exhibit an animal or article, and it must be entered in that person's name.
- C. Apart from livestock, any article which has been entered in a previous Curry County Fair cannot be entered in competition.

REFUSAL OF ENTRIES:

The Fair Manager reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered, and/or to remove any exhibit improperly entered or deemed dangerous, offensive or objectionable.

COMPLIANCE:

Persons and their exhibits failing to comply with the rules are subject to removal from the grounds and forfeiture of all awards.

REGROUPING:

The Superintendent reserves the right to re-classify entries that are deemed to have been mis-classified.

APPROPRIATE AWARD:

An exhibit may not be issued an award if it is deemed unworthy by judges.

Premiums are paid to youth ONLY – 18 and Younger.

DISPLAY ONLY:

Any exhibit not conforming to classes listed shall be for “Display Only.”

AWARD DISPLAY:

All awards are to be left on exhibits until release day.

ERRORS:

All errors in this Exhibitor Handbook or in the records of exhibits are subject to correction by the Fair Manager.

PROTESTS:

Any Exhibitor making a protest shall lodge such protest with the Fair Manager and/or the Fair Board in writing within 48 hours of the time of the cause of the protest. Protest must be based on a violation of the rules. No protest will be considered unless accompanied by a cash deposit of \$50. This deposit shall be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests shall be approved by the Fair Board. person, articles on exhibit, livestock, and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or other causes, or assume any liability for accidents to person or property.

LIABILITY:

The Fair Board will have Security Agents and Attendants on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection person, articles on exhibit, livestock, and property, but will not be responsible for loss and damage by theft, fire or other causes, or assume any liability for accidents to person or property.

EXPENSES AND CLAIMS:

No expenses or claims resulting from damage to entries will be allowed unless specifically authorized by the Fair Manager.

CONDUCT:

All people must conduct themselves in an orderly manner.

RULES INTERPRETATION:

The Fair Manager is the final authority in interpreting rules and in settling all misunderstandings.

- ❖ Paintings must be framed or on a stretched canvas, other work must be matted/mounted on stiff background
- ❖ Entries must have hanger on back and be ready for hanging or they will not be accepted. NO TAPE OR STRING.
- ❖ No wet oil paintings will be accepted.
- ❖ The superintendent reserves the right to reclassify pictures that are not in the correct class.
- ❖ Maximum size 36" width for panel, 48" for wall.
- ❖ Entries in the "drawings" classes may be in ink, pencil or crayon.
- ❖ Mixed media entries must have hangers on back and be ready for hanging or they will not be accepted. NO TAPE OR STRING.
- ❖ No glass covering art.

Rules:

- ❖ Exhibitors must follow the general rules & policies listed in the front of this Handbook.
- ❖ All photographs must have been taken by the exhibitor
- ❖ Photographs previously entered in the Curry County Fair photo exhibit for judging are not allowed
- ❖ Exhibit Dimensions: The outside dimensions of the photograph must be at least 5" x 7" and total overall size for the mat/mount are not to exceed 16" x 20". Panoramic photos are limited to one entry per exhibitor. Size limit is based on mat/mount size of 14" x 36". Collage entry maximum size is 24" x 36".
- ❖ Exhibits Mounts: All entries must be mounted onto a stiff mounting Board. Framing is not allowed.
- ❖ Hanger systems used on exhibits: All entered photographs must have adequate wired or similar hanging system that will support the piece. Any piece not having adequate hanging system already attached will be refused. Any photo that fails to remain in position after hanging may be removed from the exhibit by the Superintendent.
- ❖ Exhibit Information: Contact information of the exhibitor must appear on the back of the mount; Name, Address, Telephone Number, and Email.
- ❖ Directional Information: Write "Top" on the back of the mount to indicate the proper orientation for hanging.
- ❖ Photographic Art: Defined as a piece using a self-exposed photograph as its base, then altered by various means to artist's liking.
- ❖ Photographic Classes: Class is determined by the intended subject matter of an entered photograph.
- ❖ Photographs are Judged on: Patterns, technique, composition, light/dark and perspective.
- ❖ Entry Tag Information: Identify location, year, anything notable about the entry (i.e. taken during eclipse, etc.)
- ❖ No glass overlays on the photography.

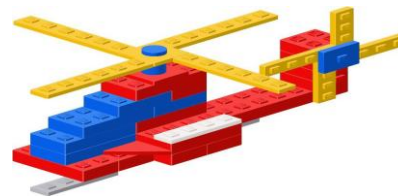

 - **Annuals:** Should be large flowered, long, stiff stems, good foliage and pure, bright colors. Flowers that grow in trusses or heads, such as phlox, should be full and spherical in shape; each floret large and well-formed.
 - **Fuchsias:** Good stem foliage, abundance of bloom, no seed pods.
 - **Gladiolus:** Five to seven florets, open, none removed. Long, stiff, straight stem and foliage.
 - **Lily:** Many large blooms per stalk. No pollen stain.
 - **Pansies:** Circular outline, overlapping petals, well defined eye. Long, straight stems.
 - **Roses:** Good flower form, healthy stems an foliage. Well rounded. No full open flower must have leaf.
 - **Potted Plants (Flowering):** Judged for cultural perfection, good stems and foliage, quantity and quality of bloom. Groom all dead plan material.

- ❖ Open class pre-entry closing date for livestock is **5:00PM on June 15, 2026**
- ❖ Entry forms must be complete and the correct entry fees must accompany each entry form. Late entries will be subject to a \$1 late fee.
- ❖ Identification tag/leg band numbers, tattoos, or other identification devices are required and must be on the entry form.

Rules: The following applies to all livestock and animal exhibitors (Youth & Open)

The Curry County Fair superintendents, under direction of the Fair Board, shall have charge and authority of the department they have been assigned. They work in partnership with the advisors and superintendents of recognized youth programs. Exhibitors must follow his/her instructions relating to the exhibition of livestock entries.

1. **MANDATORY:** Youth Quality Care Assurance: All youth livestock exhibitors (include those showing in open class) ages 9-13 must complete the YQCA online program to be eligible to participate. Certificate numbers are needed for fair entry. To register go to: <https://yqcaprogram.org> and create an account
2. The barns/livestock pavilion open at 6:00AM and close at 9PM.
3. No alcohol is allowed except in approved and permitted areas approved by the Fair Management.
4. The Fairgrounds is a smoke-free zone. Smoking will not be tolerated on the grounds.
5. Unloading/Load areas must be kept clear at all times: Livestock need to be unloaded/loaded quickly and all vehicles removed to designate parking areas.
6. Animals other than those entered in the fair will not be allowed on the grounds, in exhibit halls, or in the livestock pavilion.
7. Exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their exhibit area (stalls, pens, cages). All decorations shall be placed so as to not block the view from one end of the barn to the other or obstruct pathways. No balloons. No generators.

Livestock Exhibits

Entry:

8. All livestock must be pre-entered with entry forms and fees submitted by the pre-entry deadline. Late entries will be subject to a \$1 late fee.
9. Open class entries are open to all Counties and States.
10. Livestock will be accepted as space allows. Priority will be given to youth entries.
11. Youth project animals shown in 4H/FFA classes may not be entered in Open Class.
12. Animals will be shown and judged in the proper class and section for breed, variety, age, and sex only. If no class is offered, no awards will be given.
13. Exhibitors may make unlimited entries in each class or subclass but are eligible for only two premiums in any one class or subclass. Youth programs may have different rules regarding entries.
14. Fair Management has the right to limit the number of entries in any Division or Class.
15. If there are a sufficient number of entries, Fair Management may divide classes.
16. If there are not sufficient numbers of entries, Fair Management may combine classes.
17. Entries in pure bred class must exhibit characteristics to the breed they represent. Entries not clear of specific breed will show in Cross Breed Class.
18. The Superintendent's choice as to stall, pen, or cage assignment and admittance of animals is final.
19. Fair Management reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered and to remove any exhibit improperly entered, deemed dangerous or objectionable, is sick, uncared for, or is injured. This applies to all exhibitors.
20. Exhibitors must demonstrate safe handling of animal. If deemed unsafe by Judge/Fair Management, animal may be removed from competition and/or fairgrounds.

Judging:

21. Fair Management and/or judge may excuse any animal from competition if it appears fatigued or out of condition.
22. The Judge's decision is final.
23. Any animal deemed unworthy shall not be awarded a premium merely because there is no competition.

Livestock Exhibits

24. Each exhibitor must show their own animals. Exceptions can be granted only by the Fair Management, youth advisor, or Superintendent.
25. Champion and Reserve Champion are awarded at the discretion of the Judge.
26. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion are awarded at the discretion of the Judge when two or more classes have been awarded Champions and/or Reserve Champions.
27. Special Classes – Ribbon awarded only.

Care of Animals:

28. Owners must check on and care for their livestock a minimum of twice a day, AM and PM, or they will be required to take their livestock home. Pens and stalls must be stripped daily before 9:00AM. Manure and waste must be deposited in designated areas.
29. Animals must be securely tied or penned at all times in their assigned places, properly fed and watered, kept groomed, cleaned, and in show condition at all times. Pathways must be kept clean for spectators.
30. Improper care or treatment of any animal will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or removal of the owner of that animal.
31. Cattle: Halters and neck ropes will be required. Water buckets and food containers are to be removed after feeding is complete.
32. Sheep and Goats: Must be secured by halters or collars when moved outside the pens.
33. All major clipping must be done before bringing an animal to the Fair. Only minor touch ups will be allowed in pre-designated areas at the Fair.
34. No generators are allowed in the barns.
35. Animals may be washed only at the wash rack.
36. Livestock Identification:
 - All sheep and goats are required to have a scrapie tag.
 - Cattle and Swine are required to have an ear tag, tattoo, brand, or other identifying device.
 - Rabbits must be identified with a tattoo.
 - Cavies must have an ear tag.
 - Poultry, birds, turkeys, geese, and waterfowl must be identified with leg bands.

Livestock Exhibits

Livestock Health:

Local veterinarians donate their time for check-in purposes. If an exhibitor requires the services of a veterinarian during the fair, responsibility for payment to the veterinarian is that of the exhibitor.

37. Entries for all species are subject to the recommendations of the Oregon State Veterinarian and may be excluded up to and including entry days. All livestock exhibitors (large and small animals) are responsible for knowing and meeting all required Oregon State Veterinarian exhibitor requirements.
38. Vet Checks: All animals must be inspected by the veterinarian upon arrival prior to entering the barns.
39. Large and small livestock: Wednesday, July 22, 2026 from 1:00PM to 5:00PM at the West side of the Livestock Pavillion. Livestock are not allowed in barns until passing the vet health check and have registered with the superintendents.
40. Any animal not passing health check must be removed immediately from the fairgrounds including the campgrounds.
41. Animals that develop or exhibits symptoms of illness, injury during the course of the Fair:
 - Exhibitor must contact appropriate Superintendent/youth advisor.
 - If a veterinarian is requested or required, exhibitor is responsible for cost associated with care.
 - Animals needing to be removed from the premises before the end of Fair must have permission from the Superintendent/Youth Advisor.

Release of Livestock:

42. General Release: Barns close to the public at **3:00PM on Sunday, July 26, 2026**. Breeding, non-auction, or auction animals not hauled out by the Auction Board must be removed by **7:00PM on Sunday, July 26, 2026**.
43. Exhibitors will not be released until stalls, pens and personal belongings are removed from the barn. When applicable, pens and cages must be dismantled and stored per instructions from Superintendents. Make sure to have your assigned Superintendent or Youth premium slips before leaving. Premiums may be withheld and fees charged.
44. Exhibitors that leave prior to the closing of Fair without the consent of the Superintendent/Youth Advisor forfeit premiums and may not be allowed to show at future events sponsored by Curry County Fairgrounds.

Little People Showmanship – The following events are offered to encourage participation by our younger youth. The class is intended for learning appropriate showmanship and sportsmanship in the show ring. The Judge will offer constructive critiques, comments or general suggestions at their discretion.

1. Participant has completed 3rd grade or younger (not old enough for 4H animal project)
2. Superintendent will make arrangements with experienced high school 4H or FFA members to use their show ring expertise to assist a young person.
3. Each young person will be assigned one of the 4H or FFA members to mentor.
4. Consent forms are mandatory signed by the participants' responsible adult.
5. No entry fee is required.
6. Animals that are allowed: Rabbits, Cavies, Poultry, Goats, Sheep and Swine.
7. No premiums will be awarded, but everyone will receive a ribbon. Ribbons will be given 1st through 3rd place and a participants ribbon will be given to all other entrants in this Division.

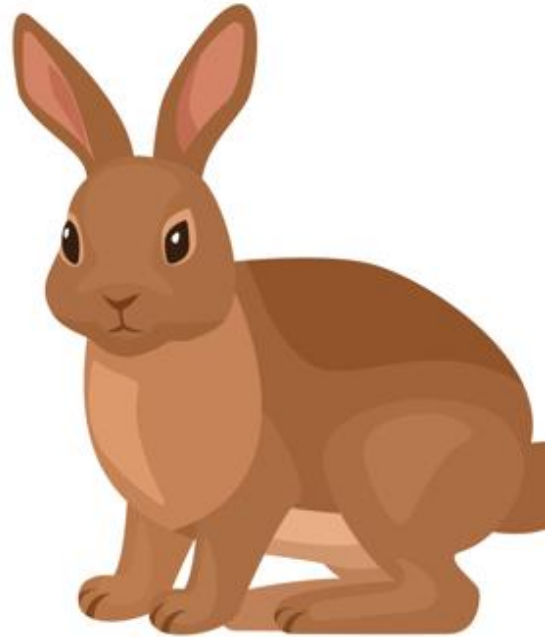

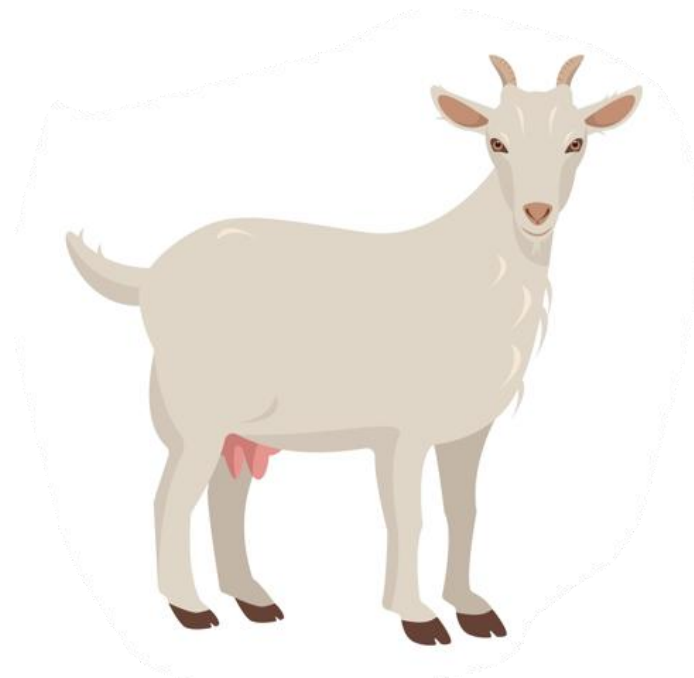

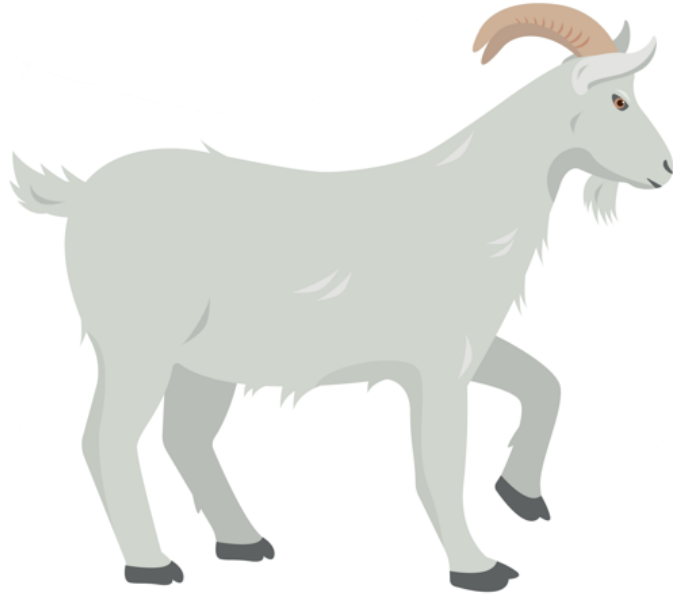
