

GRAND CHAMPION EXHIBITOR

You MUST signup to be eligible. The sign up sheet will be in Docia Sweet Hall on entry day. Entries are limited to Curry County residents. Contestants must enter and place in at least three departments to qualify. Winner will be notified within 48 hours after the end of Fair, at the phone number provided by the exhibitor.

Main point system is:

Blue/First Place: 3 points
Red/Second Place: 2 points
White/Third Place: 1 point
Judges Choice: 10 points
Best of Show: 15 points
Sweepstakes: 15 points
(chosen from best of show)

LIVESTOCK Entry information for all Open Class Livestock

- NO 4-H Project animals shown in the 4-H show can be entered in Open Class Livestock.
- Pre-entry and fees required: All livestock entry forms and fees must be submitted to the Fair Office by Friday, June 9, 2023 at 5:00 pm, NO EXCEPTIONS.
- Livestock will be accepted AS SPACE ALLOWS
- Large Livestock: Owner must check on and care for their livestock a minimum of twice a day, am and pm, or they will be required to take livestock home.
- Small Livestock: Owner must check on and care for their livestock a minimum of once a day or they will be required to take livestock home.
- Entry date: Tuesday, July 25, 2023, from Noon to 5:00 pm (No early arrivals allowed). Absolutely NO entries allowed in the barn after 5:00 pm.
- Vet Checks begin at 5:00 pm
 Tuesday, July 25, 2023, west side
 of Pavilion, outside. No animals
 allowed in Pavilion until vet
 checked. Any animal not passing
 the health check will be quarantined
 and owner contacted. Quarantined
 animal must be removed from
 premises by owner by 9:00 pm on
 Tuesday, July 25, 2023.
- Release date: Sunday, July 30, 2023, starting at 6:30 am. Stalls and pens must be cleaned by owner before leaving premises.

NOTE: WATERFOWL AND CATTLE WILL NOT BE ALLOWED AT THE 2023 FAIR.


Open Class Livestock are a valuable part of the Curry County Fair.

The Livestock Superintendents would like to invite and encourage anyone who owns poultry, rabbits, cavies (Guinea Pigs), sheep, swine, goats or cattle to participate in the Open Class Livestock Show.

Go to the Livestock section for information on divisions, classes and entry information.

Free season passes are available with a specific number of livestock entries. Contact superintendent or see entry form for more information.

Once pens are clean, be sure to have the Superintendent sign off your premium slip so you can collect your premiums.

On entry day all exhibits must be quickly unloaded and all vehicles moved to designated parking areas.

RULES FOR THE CURRY COUNTY FAIR

The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition, including entries, booths, concessions, arrangement of exhibits, and all other details is vested in the Fair Manager. All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to read the information in this Exhibitors Handbook, both here as well as the specific rules for the department you are entering. Specific rules vary from Department to Department.

1. **EXHIBITOR NUMBERS:** You MUST have an exhibitor number that was issued in or after 2022. you will use the same number for all entries, in any department, at the Curry County Fair. If you don't have a new exhibitor number (or can't remember yours), they are available at the

Fair Office in Gold Beach until the Friday before entry day. On entry day the numbers will **ONLY** be available in Docia Sweet Hall (the main exhibit hall). This number is used to tally all of your winning points and premium money at the end of the fair.

2. ENTRIES AND PREMIUMS:

A. Only one entry per class by exhibitor unless otherwise stated.

B. Only one first place, one second place and one third place award and/or premium will be awarded in each class.

C. Premiums are as follows: First - \$3.00; 2^{nd} - \$2.00; 3^{rd} - \$1.00 Unless otherwise stated.

D. Payout of premiums is contingent upon the availability of funds for distribution at the Curry County Fair. Premiums may be adjusted depending on funds available.

E. Premiums will not be mailed F. All premiums, prizes and awards not picked up within 14 days of the closing of the Fair will be considered a contribution to the Fair.

- 3. **EXHIBITOR ENTRY FORMS:** Complete a <u>separate form for each department entered</u>. Complete all areas of the form as completely as possible.
 - 'Department" is the two-letter abbreviation, (CA, PH etc.). See the Department pages for the code letters.
 - "Junior" is 17 years of age and under.
 - "Division" is the age and/or skill category for the specific Department and/or class that you are entering. Generally this is either "adult" or "junior, although some Departments have multiple age categories. This information is located at
 - the beginning of each Department page. "Class Number" and "item-description": The 3-digit class numbers and descriptions are located in the relevant Department in the Exhibitor Handbook.
- 4. **ENTRY TAGS:** Complete an entry tag for each exhibit you are entering. After removing the claim check portion, fold the tag so exhibitor name is not visible (if applicable). Some Departments require special or additional tags. Entry tags are to be completed with the same information as the exhibitor entry form for each entry/ exhibit. When submitting your exhibit, remove the claim check and keep it for reclaiming your item at pickup time at the conclusion of the fair. NO EXHIBIT WILL BE RELEASED WITHOUT THE CLAIM CHECK.

5. **ELIGIBILITY:**

- A. All departments are open to all counties and states.
- B. Only the owner, maker or grower may exhibit an animal or article and it must be entered in that person's name.
- C. With the exception of livestock, any article which has been entered in a previous Curry County Fair cannot be entered in competition.
- 6. **ENTRIES:** The Fair Manager and/or Superintendents reserve the right to accept entries after closing time if good and sufficient reasons for the delay exist.
- 7. **REFUSAL OF ENTRIES:** The Fair Manager reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered and to remove any exhibit improperly entered or deemed dangerous, offensive or objectionable.
- 8. **ENTRY DAY:** On entry day all buildings will be open only for exhibitors to drop off entries. Once entries have been accepted, exhibitors must leave the grounds. This is necessary to allow officials to arrange exhibits and prepare for judging.
- 9. APPROPRIATE AWARD: An exhibit may not be issued an award for which it is deemed unworthy by judges. For example: if there is only one entry in a particular class and that entry is deemed of a third-place quality then only the third-place award will be issued for that class. The Judges have the option to not issue any awards.
- 10. DISPLAY ONLY: Any exhibit not conforming to classes listed shall be for "Display Only". Such exhibits shall not be considered for premium competition or other awards. Sufficient interest in unrecognized categories may warrant a official class for a subsequent Fair.
- 11. **REGROUPING:** The Superintendent reserves the right to re-classify entries that are deemed to have been mis-classified.
- 12.**AWARD DISPLAY:** All ribbon, sticker or banner awards are to be conspicuously displayed with the exhibits and left until release time.
- 13. **ERRORS:** Any and all errors in the

- printing of this Exhibitor Handbook, or in the records of exhibits, for any reason, are subject to correction by the Fair Manager.
- 14. **PROTESTS:** Any exhibitor making a protest shall lodge such protest with the Fair Manager and/or the Fair Board in writing within 48 hours of the time of the cause of the protest. Protest must be based on a violation of rules. No protest will be considered unless accompanied by a cash deposit of \$50. This deposit shall be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests shall be adjudicated by the Fair Board.
- 15. **LIABILITY:** The Fair Board will have Security Agents and Attendants on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of person, articles on exhibit, livestock, and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theff, fire or other causes, or assume any liability for accidents to person or property.
- 16. EXPENSES AND CLAIMS: No expenses or claims resulting from damage to entries will be allowed unless specifically authorized by the Fair Manager.
- 17. **TREATMENT OF ANIMALS:** Improper treatment of any animal will be grounds for immediate disqualification or removal of the owner or exhibitor of that animal.
- 18. **CONDUCT:** All persons must conduct themselves in an orderly manner.
- 19. **RULES INTERPRETATION:** The Fair Manager is the final authority in interpreting rules and in settling any and all misunderstandings.
- 20. **SPECIAL RULES:** All special rules listed under applicable Departments must be observed in addition to all rules listed in this section.
- 21. **COMPLIANCE:** Persons and their exhibits failing to comply with the rules are subject to removal from the grounds and forfeiture of all awards.

RULES:

- 1. Exhibitors must follow the general rules & policies listed in the front of this Handbook.
- 2. All photographs must have been exposed by the exhibitor.
- 3. Photographs previously entered in the Curry County Fair photo exhibit for **judging are not allowed.**4. EXHIBIT DIMENSIONS: The outside
- dimensions of the photograph must be at least 5" x 7" and total overall size for the mat/mount are not to exceed 16" x 20". Panoramic photos are limited to one entry per exhibitor. Size limit is based on mat/ mount size of 14" x 36". Collage entry maximum size is 24"x36".
- 5. EXHIBIT MOUNTS: All entries must be mounted onto a stiff mounting board. Framing is **NOT** allowed.
- 6. HANGER SYSTEMS USED ON EXHIBITS: All entered photographs must have adequate wired or similar hanging system that will support the piece. Any piece not having adequate hanging system already attached will be refused. Any photo that fails to remain in position after hanging may be removed from the exhibit by the Superintendent.
- 7. EXHIBIT INFORMATION: Contact information of the exhibitor must appear on the back of mount: Name, address, telephone number and e-mail if applicable.
- 8. DIRECTIONAL INFORMATION: Write "top" on the back of the mount to indicate the
- proper orientation for hanging.9. PHOTOGRAPHIC ART: Is a piece using a self -exposed photograph as its base, then altered by various means to artist's liking.
- 10. PHOTOGRAPHIC CLASSES: Class is determined by the intended subject matter of an entered photograph.
- 11. PHOTOGRAPH'S ARE JUDGED ON: Patterns, technique, composition, light/dark and perspective.
- 12. ENTRY TAG INFORMATION: Identify location, year, anything notable about the entry (i.e. taken during eclipse, etc.)





Good stem foliage, abundance of bloom, no seed pods.

Five to seven florets open, none removed; long, stiff, straight stem and foliage.

<u>Lily:</u>

Many large blooms per stalk; no pollen stain

Pansies:

Circular outline, overlapping petals, well defined eye, long, straight stems.

Roses:

Good flower form, healthy stems and foliage; well rounded, but NO FULL OPEN FLOWER, must have full leaf.

Judged for cultural perfection, good stems and foliage, quantity and quality of bloom. Groom all dead plant material.

- Exhibitors must follow the general rules & policies listed in the front of this Handbook.
- 2. All animals will be inspected upon arrival. Clinical evidence of disease may prevent entry of the animal to the fair. Diseased animals must be removed from the fairgrounds as soon as possible. Specified guidelines for vet inspections will be provided by the division superintendent. All cattle must be from disease-free herds. Any female cattle over 4 months old that are exhibited in any non-market classes must have had a Bangs Vaccine. ALL sheep and goats MUST have a scrapie tag or tattoo, regardless of age or sex.
- 3. Classes are open to all counties and states.
- 4. Pre-entry: All livestock must be pre-entered, with entry forms and fees submitted by the pre-entry deadline.
- Unloading/loading areas must be kept clear at all times; stock unloaded and loaded quickly and all vehicles removed to parking area.
- Animals must be securely tied or penned at all times in their assigned places, properly fed and watered, kept thoroughly groomed, clean and in show condition, and supplied with necessary bedding.
- 7. Stalls and pens will be bedded when stock arrives. Owner must bed stalls after that.
- 8. Animals may be washed only at the wash
- To provide an attractive, inviting exhibition, all pens, stalls, pathways and approaches must be kept neat and must be cleaned before 8:00 AM each morning. All refuse matter must be dumped in the manure bunker.
- 10.All cages, pens and stalls must be cleaned at the end of Fair by exhibitor.
- 11.If entering for Exhibit Purposes only, clearly write "Exhibit Only" on Entry Sheet.
- 12. Exhibitors may make unlimited entries in each class or sub-class but are eligible for only two premiums in any one class or subclass. Each entry is eligible for only one

- premium. All animals shown in group/special classes must have been shown in their regular classes.
- Entries in purebred class must show a preponderance of characteristics to the breed they represent. Entries not clearly of specific breed will show in Crossbred class.
- 14. Base date of age by show date.
- 15. Animals will be shown and judged in the proper class and section for breed, variety, age and sex only. If no class is offered, no awards will be made.
- 16. A judge may excuse an animal from competition if it appears fatigued or out of condition.
- 17. Special Classes: ribbon award only.
- Every precaution will be taken to properly protect exhibits in all departments. For this purpose a caretaker will be on duty during the fair.
- The Fair and/or the caretaker are not responsible for losses or accidents to exhibits.
- 20. The superintendent's choice as to cage assignment and admittance of animals is final.

- 5. All food preservation entries are to be in standard canning jars. This may include quart size or smaller, except where otherwise
- 6. All jars must be sealed and exhibited with a screw band that is new, clean and in good shape. No decorated jars unless otherwise
- 7. Fruits, jellies, jams, butters, marmalades, preserves, conserves, pickles and relishes MAY BE OPENED during judging.
- 8. The round adhesive labels provided by the Fair must be used and attached to the lid of the jar. DO NOT write the name of Exhibitor on this label. Exhibitor number, name of product, date product was made, method of preservation (boiling water bath or pressure), processing temperature and time is required. The entry is disqualified if processing information is not given. To identify the name for viewing after judging, also complete an entry tag.
