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Grand Champion Exhibitor

You MUST sign up to be eligible. The sign-up sheet will be in Docia Sweet Hall on entry day. Entries are limited to Curry County residents. Contestants must enter and place in at least three departments to qualify. Winner will be posted in Docia Sweet Hall by Opening Day of Fair.

MAIN POINT SYSTEM:

Blue/First Place: 3 points Red/Second Place: 2 points White/Third Place: 1 point

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Static Exhibits

All static (non-livestock) entry departments are open to anyone, regardless of county or state of residence.

Entry Day

Monday, July 21, 2025 10:00 am to 7:00 pm No entry fees charged. This is the ONLY day for static entries.

Judging Day

Tuesday, July 22, 2025 NOT OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Exhibits Released

Sunday, July 27, 2025 11:00 am to 2:00 pm Exhibits will not be released before thist ime.

Please Note:

Perishable exhibits (and their containers) not picked up during these hours will be disposed of at closing time on release day.

Non-perishable exhibits not picked up during these hours will be held at the Event Center/Fair Office until August 8, 2025 at 3 pm.

Unclaimed exhibits and premiums after that date and time will be considered a donation to the Curry County Fair.

PREMIUM PAYOUT:

Sunday, July 27, 2025 12:00 pm to 3:00 pm Premiums will not be mailed and are contingent on the availability of funds. Premiums may be adjusted depending on funds available.



LIVESTOCK INFO

Entry information for all Open Class Livestock:

- NO 4-H project animals shown in the 4-H show can be entered in Open Class Livestock.
- Pre-entry and Fees required: All livestock entry forms and fees must be submitted to the Fair Office by Thursday, June 9, 2025 at 5:00 pm, NO EXCEPTIONS.
- Livestock will be accepted AS SPACE ALLOWS. Priority will be given to 4-H entries.
- Entries for all species are subject to the recommendation of the State vet and may be excluded up to and including entry days.
- Large Livestock: Owner must check on and care for their livestock a minimum of twice a day, AM and PM, or they will be required to take their livestock home.
- Small Livestock: Owner must check on and care for their livestock a minimum of once a day or they will be required to take livestock home.
- Entry Date: Tuesday, July 22, 2025 from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm (no early arrivals allowed). Absolutely NO entries allowed in the barn after 5:00 pm.
- Vet Checks are from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm Tuesday July 22, 2025, west side of Pavilion, outside. No animals allowed in Pavilion until vet checked. Any animal not passing the health check is not allowed and must be removed immediately.
- Release Date: Sunday, July 27, 2025, from 8:00 am to 10:00 am. Stalls and pens must be cleaned by owner before leaving premises.

OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK SHOW

NOTE: CATTLE WILL BE ALLOWED AS ROOM PERMITS.

Open Class Livestock are a valuable part of the Curry County Fair.

The Livestock Superintendents would like to invite and encourage anyone who owns poultry, rabbits, cavies (Guinea Pigs), sheep, swine or goats to participate in the Open Class Livestock Show.

Go to the Livestock Section of this book for information on divisions, classes, and entry information.

Free season passes are available with a specific number of livestock entries. Contact superintendent or see entry form for more information.

Once pens are clean, be sure to have the Superintendent sign off on your premium slips so you can collect your premiums.



ENTERING EXHIBITS

If any of the following rules or procedures are unclear, please contact the Fairgrounds Staff or Department Superintendent.

The general supervision of the grounds and entire exhibition is vested in the Fair Manager.

On entry day, numbers, forms and tags will be available in Docia Sweet Hall.

RULES FOR THE CURRY COUNTY FAIR

- 1. ENTRIES: Only one entry per class by an exhibitor unless otherwise stated.
- 2. SPECIAL RULES: All special rules listed under applicable Departments must be observed in addition to all rules listed in this section.
- 3. **EXHIBITOR NUMBERS:** You MUST have an exhibitor number that was issued in or after 2022. You will use the same number for all entries at the Curry County Fair. If you don't have a new exhibitor number (or you can't remember yours), they are available at the Fair Office in Gold Beach until the Wednesday before entry day. On the Entry Day, the numbers will only be available in Docia Sweet Hall (the main exhibit hall). This number is used to tally all of your winning points and premium money at the end of Fair.

4. PREMIUMS:

A. Only one first place, one second place and one third place award and/or premium will be awarded in each class.

B. Premiums are as follows: 1st place - \$3.00 2nd Place - \$2.00 3rd place - \$1.00 *unless otherwise stated.

C. PREMIUMS ARE PAID TO YOUTH 18 & UNDER ONLY, AND MAY BE ADJUSTED BASED ON AVAILABLE FUNDS.

5. EXHIBITOR ENTRY FORMS:

Complete a separate form for each department entered. Complete all areas of the form as completely as possible.

- "Department" is the two letter abbreviation (CA, PH, etc.). See the Department pages for the code
- "Division" is the age and/or skill category for the specific Department and/or class that you are entering. Each Department may have different Divisions. This information is located at the beginning of each Department
- page.
 "Class Number" and "item description": the 3-digit class numbers and descriptions are located in the relevant Department in this Exhibitor's Handbook.
- 6. **ENTRY TAGS:** Complete an entry tag for each exhibit you are entering. Remove the claim check portion and keep it for reclaiming your item on release day. NO EXHIBIT WILL BE RELEASED WITHOUT THE CLAIM CHECK.

7. ELIGIBILITY:

A. All departments are open to all counties and states.

B. Only the owner, maker or grower may exhibit the animal or article and it must be entered in that persons name unless otherwise specificied.

C. With the exception of livestock, any article which has been entered in a previous Curry County Fair cannot be 4 entered in competition.

ENTERING EXHIBITS

- 8. **REFUSAL OF ENTRIES:** The Fair Manager reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered, and/or to remove any exhibit improperly entered or deemed dangerous, offensive, or objectionable.
- 9. **COMPLIANCE:** Persons and their exhibits failing to comply with the rules are subject to removal from the grounds and forfeiture of all awards.
- 10. **REGROUPING:** The Superintendent reserves the right to re-classify entries that are deemed to have been misclassified.
- 11. **APPROPRIATE AWARD:** An exhibit may not be issued an award if it is deemed unworthy by judges.
- 12. **DISPLAY ONLY:** Any exhibit not conforming to classes listed shall be for "Display Only."
- 13. **AWARD DISPLAY:** All awards are to be left on the exhibits until release day.
- 14. **ERRORS:** Any and all errors in this Exhibitor's Handbook or in the records of exhibits are subject to correction by the Fair Manager.
- 15. **PROTESTS:** Any exhibitor making a protest shall lodge such protest with the Fair Manger and/or the Fair Board in writing within 48 hours of the time of the cause of the protest. Protest must be based on a violation of the rules. No protest will be considered unless it is accompanied by a cash deposit of \$50.00. This deposit shall be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protests shall be adjudicated by the Fair Board.
- 16. **LIABILITY:** The Fair Board will have Security Agents and Attendants on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of person, articles on exhibit, livestock, and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire, or other causes, or assume

any liability for accidents to person or property.

- 17. **EXPENSES AND CLAIMS:** No expenses or claims resulting from damage to entries will be allowed unless specifically authorized by the Fair Manager.
- 18. **CONDUCT:** All persons must conduct themselves in an orderly manner.
- 19. **RULES INTERPRETATION:** The Fair Manger is the final authority in interpreting rules and in settling any and all misunderstandings.



RULES:

- Exhibitors must follow the general rules & policies listed in the front of this Handbook.
- All photographs must have been taken by the exhibitor.
- Photographs previously entered in the Curry County Fair photo exhibit for judging are not allowed.
- 4. EXHIBIT DIMENSIONS: The outside dimensions of the photograph must be at least 5" x 7" and total overall size for the mat/mount are not to exceed 16" x 20". Panoramic photos are limited to one entry per exhibitor. Size limit is based on mat/mount size of 14" x 36". Collage entry maximum size is 24"x36".
- EXHIBIT MOUNTS: All entries must be securely attached to a stiff mounting board. Framing is NOT allowed.
- board. Framing is NOT allowed.

 6. HANGER SYSTEMS USED ON EXHIBITS: All entered photographs must have adequate wired or similar hanging system that will support the piece. Any piece not having adequate hanging system already attached will be refused. Any photo that fails to remain in position after hanging may be removed from the exhibit by the Superintendent. No double-sided tape.
- EXHIBIT INFORMATION: Contact information of the exhibitor must appear on the back of mount: Name, address, telephone number and e-mail if applicable.
- DIRECTIONAL INFORMATION: Write "top" on the back of the mount to indicate the proper orientation for hanging.

 PHOTOGRAPHIC ART: Is a piece using a self -exposed photograph as its base, then altered by various means to artist's liking.

 10. PHOTOGRAPHIC CLASSES: Class is determined by the intended subject matter of an entered photograph.

 11. PHOTOGRAPHS ARE JUDGED ON: Patterns,







Good stem foliage, abundance of bloom, no seed pods.

Gladiolus:

Five to seven florets open, none removed; long, stiff, straight stem and foliage.

Many large blooms per stalk; no pollen stain Pansies:

Circular outline, overlapping petals, well defined eye, long, straight stems.



Please note:

- space for livestock is limited and 4-H entries will be given priority. Open class entries will be accepted as space allows.
- Entries for all species are subject to the recommendation of the State Vet and may be excluded up to and including entry day.

RULES:

- Exhibitors must follow the general rules & policies listed in the front of this Handbook.
- 2. All animals will be inspected upon arrival. Clinical evidence of disease may prevent entry of the animal to the fair. Diseased animals must be removed from the fairgrounds as soon as possible. Specified guidelines for vet inspections will be provided by the division superintendent. All cattle must be from disease-free herds. Any female cattle over 4 months old that are exhibited in any non-market classes must have had a Bangs Vaccine. ALL sheep and goats MUST have a scrapie tag or tattoo, regardless of age or sex.
- Classes are open to all counties and states.
- Pre-entry: All livestock must be pre-entered, with entry forms and fees submitted by the pre-entry deadline.
- Unloading/loading areas must be kept clear at all times; stock unloaded and loaded quickly and all vehicles removed to parking area.
- Animals must be securely tied or penned at all times in their assigned places, properly fed and watered, kept thoroughly groomed, clean and in show condition, and supplied with necessary bedding.
- Stalls and pens will be bedded when stock arrives. Owner must bed stalls after that.
- Animals may be washed only at the wash rack.
- To provide an attractive, inviting exhibition, all pens, stalls, pathways and approaches must be kept neat and must be cleaned before 8:00 AM each morning. All refuse matter must be dumped in the manure bunker.

- 10. All cages, pens and stalls must be cleaned at the end of Fair by exhibitor.
- If entering for Exhibit Purposes only, clearly write "Exhibit Only" on Entry Sheet.
- 12. Exhibitors may make unlimited entries in each class or sub-class but are eligible for only two premiums in any one class or subclass. Each entry is eligible for only one premium. All animals shown in group/special classes must have been shown in their regular classes.
- 13. Entries in purebred class must show a preponderance of characteristics to the breed they represent. Entries not clearly of specific breed will show in Crossbred class.
- Base date of age by show date.
- 15. Animals will be shown and judged in the proper class and section for breed, variety, age and sex only. If no class is offered, no awards will be made.
- A judge may excuse an animal from competition if it appears fatigued or out of condition.
- 17. Special Classes: ribbon award only.
- Every precaution will be taken to properly protect exhibits in all departments. For this purpose a caretaker will be on duty during the fair.
- The Fair and/or the caretaker are not responsible for losses or accidents to exhibits.
- The superintendent's choice as to cage assignment and admittance of animals is final.
- 21. Improper care or treatment of any animal wil be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or removal of the owner of that animal.
- 22. The Curry County Fair Manager and/or Livestock Superintendents may remove any animal on the fair grounds if deemed sick, uncared for, injured, or dangerous. This applies to all exhibitors including but not limited to 4-H, FFA, Grange and/or Open Class.
