Scott Chorley's Van was originally used by British Airways to carry aircraft components between hangars, only leaving Gatwick Airport for MOTs. To buy the low-mileage Van for £1,000, back in 2009, he had to sign a disclaimer saying he would never return it to British Airways livery. He, his dad and son rebuilt it with a 1071 S engine. The original yellow was deemed too bright, so now it's Primrose Yellow.

Bryan Harding was enjoying a day out with his time-warp MkI Austin Mini - which was converted by legendary London-based Mini tuning company, Speedwell, when it was new. It drew a

lot of attention at the show because it has not been seen in public for some years. The original owner, George Morgan, also had Speedwell install a racing seat and additional gauges and raced the Mini at Brands Hatch, and kept it until his death in 2002.
