




American is still undecided but we are in the running!

2022 POST AWARDS!

We held our annual awards ceremony on the evening of May 12th. A special thanks goes out to the City Council who graciously allowed us to host the ceremony in their chambers at City Hall.

Each year more than 130,000 students in grades 6 through 8 enter the VFW's Patriot's Pen youth essay contest. The contest encourages young people to examine America's history, along with their own experiences in modern society, by drafting a 300 to 400-word essay, expressing their views on different themes, this year's being, "How Can I Be A Good American?" The winner of Post 2894's Patriots' Pen for 2021-22 is Mackenzie Radford, a 6th grader at Oaktree Academy in Virginia Beach. In her essay,

many countries get the privileges we have. We have so many freedoms and sometimes we forget to be grateful for that. Respect others. Respect your Country. Love your neighbor. Don't kneel for the [Anthem], don't sit. Stand up high and be proud of who you are and where you come from...There are a lot of people who don't know how lucky we are to live here...God protects us all as a nation...I am a 6th grader and a proud American." Congratulations, Mackenzie.

The Voice of Democracy Award is VFW's premier scholarship program. Each year, nearly 40,000 high school students compete for more than 2.2 million dollars in scholarships and incentives. These scholarships range up to a national first place prize of \$30,000. The VFW established the program in 1947 to provide high school students the opportunity to express themselves in regards to democratic

ideas and principles. Students compete by writing and recording an audio essay on an annual patriotic theme. This year's theme was: "America: Where Do We Go From Here?" The winner of Voice this year's Democracy contest for Post 2894 was Lucas Evans, a senior at Grassfield High His parents are School. Louisa and David. Here's what he expressed in his



essay, "Right now our country is more divided than ever. Divided over political parties and ideologies, divided on what is right and what is wrong, and divided by race...how can it be possible that the United States of America, one of the most respected countries in the world, is more divided today than we were 150 years ago [during the Civil War?]...See, the answer to 'Where do we go from here?' is simple. We go forward because going backwards isn't an option and doing nothing is no better...The question should not be 'Where do we go from here?' but when...'When do we start to move forward?' ...when do we start taking accountability for our actions[?]...When do we stop seeing people in black or white and just start seeing them as Americans, or better yet humans? When do we realize that the only privilege we have is that we are Americans? When do realize that that privilege is a privilege men and women died for?...[Our generation is] the only hope...and if we don't act now the privileges we take for granted today will be what we are begging for tomorrow...We are Americans, we are better than what we been portrayed as. This is the land of the free and home of the brave. A gift given to us by all those who have served. We must not forget that. God bless America!" With patriotism and dedication like this, Lucas was enthusiastically awarded our Post's Voice of Democracy award.

Our Post Teacher of the Year was Jennifer Siler, a 7th Grade teacher at Hugo Owens Middle School. The Teacher of



the Year program recognizes teachers who promote a sense of national pride in their students. Every year, 7500 VFW posts around the country nominate teachers for awards at the elementary, middle and high school levels. Previous Post 2894 winners have finished first in the nation and third runner-up – truly incredible achievements! There is no more important task than the development of an informed,

effective, and responsible citizenry; and that's what our Post

nominee for Teacher of the Year, Mrs. Jennifer Siler has been doing with her students for 18 years - teaching them what it means to be a free American citizen, in the greatest country on Earth, with all the rights and responsibilities that that entails. As Alexis de Toqueville pointed out, each new generation is a new people that must acquire the knowledge, learn the skills, and develop the dispositions or traits of private and public character that undergird a constitutional democracy. During the segments on Colonial and Civil War eras: she leads trips to Williamsburg and the Hampton Roads Naval Museum; arranges for in-school visits from Civil War reenactment camps; and brings the colonial era to life for her students by having them dress in period attire, listen to a reenactor read writings from George Washington, and use a quill, ink, and wax seal to sign their own copies of the Declaration of Independence. Jennifer writes that she tries to teach "Not only the history lessons, but more importantly the lessons of honesty, integrity, hard work, structure, compassion, and empathy that I truly try to instill in my students through, not only instruction, but example as well. I truly love what I do. It is a part of who I am and always will be." Jennifer was also selected as District 2's Teacher of the Year – essentially, all of South Hampton Roads. For her passion in teaching and her interest in our future generations, Jennifer Siler is awarded the Post 2894 Teacher of the Year award.

We then moved on to our Public Servant Awards. We recognized that National Police Week was the following week and remembered that when we servicemen and women were oversees protecting our country, all the first responders were here at home protecting our families and communities. We veterans of foreign wars owe you, the firefighters, EMTs, police officers, deputy sheriffs, and state troopers, our utmost gratitude.

Our first Public Servant award went to our Firefighter of the Year, Master Firefighter/EMT Bradford Turner. He began his career with the Chesapeake Fire Department just over 21 years ago and has won numerous awards from the department including three "Life Saved" awards. Three years ago he was a member of a FEMA Task Force that deployed to Hawaii. Brad served twenty years as a Firefighter and Hazmat specialist. On the Hazmat team, Brad was the radiological officer and



program manager for the monitoring and detection program. The program consists of calibration, maintenance, and repair of approximately 100 meters. Brad has volunteered as a Board member of the Franklin/ Southampton Area Chamber of Commerce. In addition, a group of friends, including Brad and his wife, Mary Ann, started Playful Minds Fun Center, which provides DVDs, iPads, coloring books, stuffed animals,

etc., to entertain kids during their stay in the local hospital. On Saint Patrick's Day two months ago, Brad officially retired from the Chesapeake Fire Department. Brad's second job, which is now his full-time job, is vice president and co-owner of Southern Charm Garden Center which he and his wife

started in 2008 – and we all know who the president is, don't we... Brad and Mary Ann have two daughters and live in Franklin. For his outstanding performance and commitment to the city of Chesapeake for the past 21 years, Master Firefighter/EMT Bradford Turner is our Post Firefighter of the Year!

Our next award winner for Emergency Medical Technician of the Year wasn't a stranger to in our midst since we gave her the same honor three years ago! Field Medical Officer/Firefighter Cheryl King started her career in emergency medical services in 1996 as an EMT with the East Fishkill Fire



Department in York. When she first moved to Chesapeake in 1998, she worked as a dispatcher, winning Dispatcher of the Year in her second year. She was certified as a paramedic in 2002 and worked for Currituck Fire Department for 12 years before joining Chesapeake Department 2014. in She has

received numerous individual and unit awards commendations both from within the department as well as from outside agencies including the Governor's office. One citation stated that she is, "a valuable resource at Recruit Academies, helping train the next generation of our EMS providers... Whether it be her skill or professional and courteous demeanor, Cheryl makes not only her patients, but the other providers she works with feel secure. She is someone you can trust to make the right decision in any situation." For the past two years Cheryl has been teaching EMTs in the medic program of the US Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). Never one to stand still, she is currently working on a Bachelor's degree from Columbia Southern University. In her rare off times, Cheryl enjoys spending time with her children and - this must be a typo - grandchildren. One of her commanders said, "She gets it. She understands our mission statement is to help citizens and make our community a better and safer place. She doesn't do any of this for recognition, but

because it's the right thing to do and she cares." For her passionate concern for the safety and well-being of the citizens of Chesapeake, Field Medical Officer/Firefighter King is our Post EMT of the Year!

Deputy Robert Perdue began his career at the Chesapeake Sheriff's Office in 2013 and received two



prestigious awards last year. One year ago he responded to a call regarding a fight in a housing complex. Upon arriving at the scene he noticed a blood trail leading to a nearby residence. Inside he found two badly injured people, one of whom had been shot. With the assistance of another deputy, Deputy Perdue administered first aid until the arrival of EMS. Thanks in part to his actions, both victims survived. For this he was awarded the Award of Excellence on October 14, 2021. The previous summer, Deputy Perdue was driving home after work when he heard over his radio about an overturned vehicle. Upon arriving on the scene, he found a car on its roof with flames coming from the engine. The driver was partially

ejected but trapped under the vehicle. Deputy Perdue and a CPD sergeant put out the flames with fire extinguishers. Then they and several onlookers worked together to lift the vehicle and pull the driver to safety. For his heroic actions he received the Chesapeake Sheriff's Office Life-Saving Award. Deputy Perdue is a credit to law enforcement through his hard work and



dedication, and reflects great pride on the Chesapeake Sheriff's Office. Congratulations for being our Post Deputy of the Year!

Officer Marc Lawrence is our Police Officer of the Year. Officer Lawrence is a Jack of all trades within the Chesapeake Police Department. His official primary assignment is with the Traffic Enforcement Unit or TEU but he also serves as: the Program Coordinator for Automated Enforcement; as the lead instructor for Accident Investigations; and he continues to offer support to the Field Training Officer Program by training recruit officers. In addition to all that, he serves on the Crash Reconstruction Team and the Department's Underwater Search and Recovery Team. With the TEU he continually pursues ways to increase highway safety, decrease crashes, and overall promote safer streets. As a member of the Crash Reconstruction Team, Officer Lawrence responded to nearly 75% of the activations of the team. In these responses, he took a leadership role either as the Primary Investigator or was responsible for mapping the accident scene. Officer Lawrence has written, executed, and compiled the evidence from numerous search warrants which has led to charges and pending prosecution where applicable. The complexity of these case requires attention to detail and patience. Beyond the cases Officer Lawrence has been involved in, he assisted other officers with their search warrants for vehicle inspections, cell phones, and medical records and blood from hospitals. Officer Lawrence's dedication to the Citizens of Chesapeake, the Department, his co-workers and teammates, and overall work ethic is exemplary which is why he was selected as our Police Officer of the Year. Congratulations and thank you!

We then moved on to our Special Awards.

Access Partnership is a small organization with a big impact in Hampton Roads because they provide a valuable service to the community. They collect donated medical equipment and supplies and over the years they have helped hundreds – maybe thousands – of people looking for used or slightly used medical equipment at no cost. Access Partnership operates primarily on donations and fund raisers. A few months ago the widow of the oldest veteran in Chesapeake was having problems getting in and out of bed. A couple of elderly women were taking care of her but were having problems operating the manual lift. This is where our extraordinary service officers, Jim Ireland and Gary

Dunbar, flew in for the rescue. Jim contacted Access Partnership to see if they had any electric lifts. They didn't but put out a message on their website asking if anyone had one to donate. Within a week another veteran's widow called. Her husband had received one from the VA but passed away before he could use it. She said she wanted to give it to another veteran family who could use it. On January 28th, Gary and Sandy Dunbar and Jim Ireland picked up the electric lift with batteries and a charger from the donor and delivered it to the widow here in Chesapeake who was absolutely thrilled to receive it. We would like present this plaque which is inscribed "Presented to Partnership in Gratitude for Your Outstanding Support to Veterans and Their Families from VFW Post 2894 Chesapeake." Additionally, Commander Vazquez presented a

onation from the Post to help with Access Partnership's mission.

Every year, we look for fine young Americans who exhibit patriotism, service, and civic duty. We are fortunate that the young citizens of Chesapeake never fail to come through. Tonight, we recognize and honor 15-year old Jacob Zinn, Last



summer, Jacob tackled a challenge by a national organization called Raising Men Lawn Care Service. 



+ SURGEON'S OFFICE + JUNE IS POST TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER (PTSD) AWARENESS MONTH

The National Center for PTSD promotes awareness and effective treatments throughout the year. In 2014, the Senate designated the full month of June for National PTSD Awareness.

After a traumatic event, most people have painful memories. For many people, the effects of the event fade over time. But for others, the memories, thoughts and feelings don't go away – even months or years after the event is over. Mental health experts are not sure why some people develop PTSD and others do not. If stress reactions do not improve over time and they disrupt everyday life, it is important to seek help to determine if PTSD is present.

The purpose of PTSD Awareness Month is to encourage everyone to raise public awareness of PTSD and effective treatments. We can all help those affected by PTSD.

What can cause PTSD?

Any experience that threatens your life or someone else's can cause PTSD. These types of events are sometimes called **trauma**. Types of traumatic events that can cause PTSD include:

- Combat and other military experiences
- · Sexual or physical assault
- Learning about the violent or accidental death or injury of a loved one
- Child sexual or physical abuse



- Serious accidents, like a car wreck
- Natural disasters, like a fire, tornado, hurricane, flood, or earthquake
- Terrorist attacks

During this kind of event, you may not have any control over what's happening, and you may feel very afraid. Anyone who has gone through something like this can develop PTSD.

YOU ARE NOT ALONE!

Going through a traumatic event is not rare. At least half of Americans have had a traumatic event in their lives. Of people who have had trauma, about 1 in 10 men and 2 in 10 women will develop PTSD.

There are some things that make it more likely you'll develop PTSD — for example, having very intense or long-lasting trauma, getting hurt, or having a strong reaction to the event (like shaking, throwing up, or feeling distant from your surroundings).

It's also more common to develop PTSD after certain types of trauma, like combat and sexual assault. But there's no way to know for sure who will develop PTSD.

How do I know if I have PTSD?

The only way to know for sure is to talk to a mental health care provider. He will ask you about your trauma, your symptoms, and any other problems you have.

PTSD Screen

Sometimes things happen to people that are unusually or especially frightening, horrible, or traumatic. For example, a serious accident or

fire, a physical or sexual assault or abuse, an earthquake or flood, a war, seeing someone be killed or seriously injured, or having a loved one die through homicide or suicide.

Have you ever experienced this kind of event?

If yes, please answer the questions below. In the past month, have vou:

- Had nightmares about the event(s) or thought about the event(s) when you didn't want to?
- Tried hard not to think about the event(s) or went out of your way to avoid situations that reminded you of the event(s)?
- Been constantly on guard, watchful, or easily startled?
- Felt numb or detached from people, activities, or your surroundings?
- Felt guilty or unable to stop blaming yourself or others for the event(s) or any problems the event(s) may have caused?

If you answered "yes" to 3 or more of these questions, talk to a mental health care provider to learn more about PTSD and PTSD treatment. Answering "yes" to 3 or more questions does not mean you have PTSD. Only a mental health care provider can tell you for sure.

What if the screening tool says I don't have PTSD?

You may still want to talk to a mental health care provider. If thoughts and feelings from the trauma are bothering you, treatment can help — whether or not you have PTSD.

Is it ever too late to get treatment for PTSD?

It's never too late. Treatment can help even if your trauma happened years ago. And treatment for PTSD has gotten much better over the years. If you tried treatment before and you're still having symptoms, it's a good idea to try again.

What if I don't feel ready for treatment?

It's normal to feel like you're not ready for treatment, or to come up with reasons why now isn't the right time — like you can't afford it or you're too busy. But not wanting to talk or think about the trauma can actually be a symptom of PTSD.

You may never feel truly ready to get help for PTSD — but if you're having symptoms, it's better to get treatment now than to wait. The sooner you get treatment, the sooner you can start to feel better.

Where can I go to get help?

If you're a Veteran, check with the VA about whether you can get treatment there. Visit

www.va.gov/directory/guide/PTSD.asp to find a VA PTSD program near you. If you're looking for care outside the VA, ask your doctor for a referral to a mental health care provider who specializes in PTSD treatment, or visit https://findtreatment.samhsa.gov to search for providers in your area. When choosing a mental health care provider, here are some important things to consider:

- Find a provider who uses PTSD treatments proven to work
- Find out what your insurance will cover
- Find someone who is a good fit for you

+ SAFETY CORNER + JULY IS NATIONAL WATER SAFETY MONTH

As the weather warms up, pools are preparing to open and crowds are gearing up to head to the beach. National Water Safety Month is the perfect time to ensure you and your family are prepared to spend a fun, safe day by the water. And the American Red Cross can help!

Swimming is the most popular summer activity. While the best thing you can do to help your family stay safe is to enroll in age-appropriate swim lessons, it is also important to

Make Water Safety Your Priority



- Swim in designated areas supervised by lifeguards.
- Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone. Even at a public pool or a lifeguarded beach, use the buddy system!
- Ensure that everyone in the family learns to swim well. Enroll in age-appropriate Red Cross water orientation and Learn-to-Swim courses.
- Never leave a young child unattended near water and do not trust a child's life to another child; teach children to always ask permission to go near water.
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets around water, but do not rely on life jackets alone.
- Establish rules for your family and enforce them without fail. For example, set limits based on each person's ability, do not let anyone play around drains and suction fittings, and do not allow swimmers to hyperventilate before swimming under water or have breathholding contests.
- Even if you do not plan on swimming, be cautious around natural bodies of water including ocean shoreline, rivers and lakes. Cold temperatures, currents and underwater hazards can make a fall into these bodies of water dangerous.
- If you go boating, wear a life jacket! Most boating fatalities occur from drowning.
- Avoid alcohol use. Alcohol impairs judgment, balance and coordination; affects swimming and diving skills; and reduces the body's ability to stay warm.

Prevent Unsupervised Access to the Water

- Install and use barriers around your home pool or hot tub. Safety covers and pool alarms should be added as additional layers of
- Ensure that pool barriers enclose the entire pool area, are at least 4feet high with gates that are self-closing, self-latching and open outward, and away from the pool. The latch should be high enough to be out of a small child's reach.
- If you have an above-ground or inflatable pool, remove access ladders and secure the safety cover whenever the pool is not in use.
- Remove any structures that provide access to the pool, such as outdoor furniture, climbable trees, decorative walls and playground equipment.
- Keep toys that are not in use away from the pool and out of sight. Toys can attract young children to the pool.

Maintain Constant Supervision

- Actively supervise kids whenever around the water—even if lifeguards are present. Do not just drop your kids off at the public pool or leave them at the beach—designate a responsible adult to
- Always stay within arm's reach of young children and avoid distractions when supervising children around water.

Know What to Do in an Emergency. If a child is missing, check the water first. Seconds count in preventing death or disability.

- Know how and when to call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number.
- If you own a home pool or hot tub, have appropriate equipment, such as reaching or throwing equipment, a cell phone, life jackets and a first aid kit.
- Enroll in Red Cross home pool safety, water safety, first aid and CPR/AED courses to learn how to prevent and respond to emergencies.


