

FEBRUARY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Tuskegee Airmen Take on the Luftwaffe in WWII*



As the first Black aviators to serve in the U.S. Army Air Corps, the Tuskegee Airmen broke through a massive segregation barrier in the American military. Their success and heroism during World War II, fighting Germans in the skies over Europe, shattered pervasive stereotypes that African Americans had neither the character nor the aptitude for combat. And their achievements laid crucial groundwork for civil rights progress in the decades to come.

COMMANDER'S CORNER



Hope this newsletter finds everyone in good health and cheer! As we enter our 27th Birthday, I would like to share some of our Post History.

VFW Post 2894 is the <u>FOURTH</u> VFW Post in Chesapeake! "Tidewater Post 2163" was formed by a group of WWI and WWII veterans in February 1945 and met

in South Norfolk until 1963 when they merged with Post 4809 in Norfolk. In 1987, Post 3829 "Great Bridge" was established by a group of Vietnam veterans but was merged with Post 4809 in April 1991. Sometime thereafter, the "E.A. Martin, Jr. Memorial Post 8291" was established but it too merged with 4809 in July 1995. Eight months later, on 26 March 1996, Post 2894 was chartered in Chesapeake. In 2009 the Post was named the "Staff Sergeant Jonathan Kilian Dozier Memorial Post" in honor of one of Chesapeake's own who made the ultimate sacrifice on 9 January 2008 while serving our country in Sinsil, Diyala Province, Iraq. The Post flag was dedicated on 10 April 2013. The many streamers on the flag represent the honors received by the Post and the many campaigns which our members have participated in, from WWII to today. On 8 April 2015, the Ladies Auxiliary of Post 2894 was established with 18 charter members.

The Post has been named an All-American Post (top 2% of posts worldwide) for seven years in a row and is on track to win it again this year! We have also been recognized for five of the last six years as a National Outstanding Community Service Post – only 50 Posts worldwide receive this each year and we have done it five times! In 2016, our Post newsletter won the National Grand Award and in 2019 the National Bronze Award. (Thanks to our Post Adjutant and Newsletter editor, Dan Eaker, we have submitted our newsletter for consideration once again.) In 2015, our Teacher of the Year, Craig Blackman, won the National VFW award, and, in 2016, Kimberly Hammers was National 3rd runner-up! This year our Post Teacher of the Year, Christine Kapko from Hickory HS, has won the District and State Title and now advances to the National competition! We have also had seven National VFW Public Servant awards: police officers Selena Beaver (2015), Heather Bishop ('17) and Norwood King ('19); two EMTs, David Brock ('16) and Richard Gray ('20); a State Trooper, Shawn Ford ('20); and a firefighter, Justin Beazley ('21). In 2020 the Post was presented with the Fred C. Hall National Community Service Project Award for completing the rebuilding of the home of an active duty single mom in need. In 2021, the Post received our third National Award for Excellence for an Outstanding Service Project - in 2018, we were one of only 3 posts world-wide to receive it – ours was for the 2017 Bataan Death March.

The main goals of Post 2894 are to: give aid to needy comrades; provide a helping hand to veterans' widows and orphans; and defend the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of

happiness. Our motto is, "Honoring the Fallen by Helping the Living."

In the summer of 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Civilian Pilot Training Program Act to train civilian aviators at colleges and vocational schools in preparation for a national emergency. The law contained a provision that "none of the benefits of training or programs shall be denied on account of race, creed, or color." At the time, there were only 124 licensed Black pilots in the United States—and none in the Army Air Corps.

Of six historically Black colleges and universities included in the program, the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama became the most renowned. In January 1941, the War Department, under pressure from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to include Black aviators, established at Tuskegee the nation's first Black flying unit: the 99th Pursuit Squadron, which was later renamed the 99th Fighter Squadron.

Between 1941 and 1945, more than 1,000 pilots trained in the Tuskegee program; of those, 450 saw combat during World II in the 99th and 332nd Fighter groups. In aerial battles over North Africa and Europe, these pilots flew more than 1,500 missions, largely as escort planes for the bombers, but sometimes in direct combat. By the time the 332nd flew its last combat mission on April 26, 1945, two weeks before the German surrender, the Tuskegee Airmen had flown more than 15,000 individual sorties over two years in combat. They had destroyed or damaged 36 German planes in the air and 237 on the ground, as well as nearly 1,000 rail cars and transport vehicles and a German destroyer. In all, 66 Tuskegee-trained aviators were killed in action during World War II, while another 32 were captured as POWs after being shot down.

• <u>Post Receives Donation for Chesapeake Memorial Monument.</u> At the January Post membership meeting, Ms. Jennifer Sharer-Knight presented a check from the Hampton Roads Chamber of Commerce, Chesapeake Womens Division,

for \$400. The donation will go towards the Tidewater Gold Star Memorial Monument -Woody Williams Foundation. Through the various area contacts provided by Post members, the Foundation gathered donations of over \$20,000, the largest being \$15,000 from the Foundation. Beazlev Donations totaled over \$60,000 in twenty months! Thanks to all who contributed to this fundraising event.



• <u>Post Donates to Charities.</u> For the Christmas season, the Post donated \$100 to both the Marine Corps' Toys for Tots and the United Service Organizations (USO) of Hampton Roads/Central Virginia.

The Marine Toys for Tots Program collects new unwrapped toys and distributes them to less fortunate children at Christmas.

The objectives of the Foundation are to help less fortunate children throughout the United States experience the joy of Christmas; to play an active role in the development of one of our



nation's most valuable resources – our children; to unite all members of local communities in a common cause for three months each year during the annual toy collection and distribution campaign; and to contribute to improving communities in the future.

Founded during WWII, the USO sought to be the GI's "home



away from home" and began a tradition of entertaining the troops that continues today. Although congressionally-chartered, it is not a government agency. The USO has over 200 locations around the world in 14 countries (including the U.S.) and 27 states. During a gala marking the USO's 75th anniversary in

2016, retired Army Gen. George Casey, Jr., the current chairman of the USO Board of Governors, estimated that the USO has served more than 35 million Americans over its history.

Additionally, the Post provided a \$105 donation to the Navy SEAL Foundation in honor of Commander Robert Ramirez who died at his home in San Diego, CA. CDR Ramirez had just recently taken command of SEAL Team 1 in November.

 Post Volunteers Assist with Veteran Homeowner Service Project. On 16 January 2023, Martin Luther King, Jr. National Day of Service, VFW Post 2894 reaches closure to a ten-month campaign to help a Navy active duty couple repair their home. Navy Petty Officer Chris Edmonds and his wife, Victoria, purchased a house in Chesapeake, Virginia, in March 2020. The seller left town and did not make the contractual repairs required. The wife (Victoria) had to take on the responsibility of moving into their new home while her husband was still deployed overseas. To add to the pressure, Victoria was also under medical care at the time. Upon moving in to the house, she discovered the repairs had not been made and tried to contact the seller to coordinate a remedy. The seller left town and refused to fulfill their obligations specified in the contract. Without funds to make the necessary repairs themselves or hire a lawyer, Victoria did not know what to do so she called "WAVY TV 10 0N YOUR SIDE" for help.

Chesapeake VFW Post 2894 Commander, Jose Vazquez, saw the WAVY TV 10 ON YOUR SIDE feature on the issue and decided to step in to help the couple. He brought in his Service Officer, Jim Ireland, and asked him to look at the situation and see what the Post could do to help. Jim immediately reached out

to three proven professional organizations that he knew would help as they had always done in the past. The first was either LOWES or HOME DEPOT. HOME DEPOT was better positioned at the time to help, so they were selected. They volunteered to submit a grant for materials. The second contacted was "757 The Real-Estate Group" headed by Ms. Alexandra Serrano, a true professional that has always had a spot in her heart for people in need, especially military veterans. Thankfully, she said yes! The 757 The Real-Estate Group provided the labor and some materials not provided by HOME DEPOT. The third organization was Habitat for Humanity, South Hampton Roads (HFHSHR) who provided partial funding. In short, with help from these three organizations, VFW POST 2894 was ready to move forward. And on 16 January 2023, this group of professionals were able to restore Chris and Victoria's house to a safe livable home at little to no cost to them. With the money they saved from the renovation of their house, it gives them the financial ability to pursue legal action against those responsible for the breach of contract. This was a great team effort!

• <u>Post Remembers the Sinsil 8.</u> On January 9th, 2008, our Post namesake, SSG (posthumously promoted to SFC) Jonathan K. Dozier, led a group of soldiers in the search of a house in

Sinsil, Diyala Province, about sixty miles north of Baghdad, Iraq. The structure had been checked out and cleared of hazards about two weeks earlier, but insurgents apparently had snuck back into it afterwards and rigged it with explosives. After Jon and his men entered the building, Sunni insurgents detonated a massive improvised explosive device (IED) that collapsed the house on them, killing all six soldiers and one translator. In October 2011, an eighth soldier, Jordan Riddle, who had been critically



wounded in the blast, died as a result of his sorrow and a broken

heart. Now they are all collectively known as the "Sinsil 8."

Every year Jon's father, Comrade Carl Dozier, hosts a ceremony that commemorates the sacrifice made by these individual heroes. Candles are lit for each of the brave men killed on that fateful day and prayers are recited for all. Then the participating Post and Auxiliary members adjourn for some camaraderie and remembrance. This year the "Angelversary was held at Big Woody's Bar and Grill and we all raised a glass in memory of our fallen comrades – they will never be forgotten!

• POST COMRADE RELIVES THE BATTLE OF GREAT BRIDGE

The Battle of Great Bridge was fought during the American Revolution on December 9th, 1775, and is commemorated annually in Chesapeake, Virginia, the first week in December. Kimball Thompson, a member of VFW Post 2894, is an avid

Revolutionary War reenactor who regularly participates in the yearly reenactment, as well as other simulated engagements throughout the area.

This year's event happened on the 3rd and 4th of December, 2022, where the Battle of Great Bridge was reenacted on Army Corps of Engineers property adjacent to the Intracoastal Waterway. This location is very close to the site of the original battle. The Patriot fortification was just to the east, bisecting what is now Battlefield Boulevard. In 1775 Battlefield Boulevard was known as the Great Road and was the land route for transporting agricultural and manufactured goods into and out of the Norfolk area. The original Great Bridge spanned the Southern Branch of the Elizabeth River, which was used as a water route for the same sort of goods and materials transportation.

The juxtaposition of water and land routes resulted in the strategic importance of Great Bridge and as a consequence Lord Dunmore, the Colonial Governor appointed by King George III, had a fort constructed just to the north and east of the Great Bridge. Colonel William Woodford's mandate, as the commander of the 2nd Virginia Regiment, was to try and push British troops out of Great Bridge and Norfolk as well. As it happened, the British forces attacked the fortified Patriot position and suffered devastating losses. The Patriots suffered only one slightly wounded man. Ultimately, Lord Dunmore was pushed out of Norfolk and, soon after, the British left Virginia.

This battle, although somewhat small and short, allowed for the transportation of supplies to General Washington's troops via Norfolk and the Chesapeake Bay and was the first land battle in Virginia.

Kimball is also a docent at the Great Bridge Battlefield and Waterways Museum, providing detailed accounts of both the battle itself as well as other information about living in the American colonies during the late 18th century.



WOMEN AT WAR

Integration of the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES)*

Quite suddenly, and contrary to expectations, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt agreed to reopen the Navy to African-American women in October 1944. Not since World War I had African-American women been permitted to serve. Roosevelt's order also produced a breakthrough: the commissioning of the Navy's first two African-American female officers. In great haste, the leaders of the WAVES — Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service, or, essentially, the women's reserve branch of the Navy—selected the two most capable African-American recruits: Harriet Ida Pickens and Frances Eliza Wills, two highly accomplished women of New York City.

The first African-American WAVES reported for training on 28 December 1944 at Hunter College in New York City. Coming from the North and the South—Minnesota, Massachusetts, Illinois, New York, Georgia, and Alabama—the first recruits entered on a fully integrated basis. In early 1945, they reported to integrated duty stations across the country. By all accounts, the Navy refused to tolerate any backlash from white WAVES, the more vocal of whom were forced out of the service entirely with "neuropsychic discharges." Still, instances of hostility and everyday indignities came and went with some frequency.

By 1944, when she joined the WAVES, Harriet Pickens already had an impressive record, especially considering the opposition and hostility African-American women faced in making careers for themselves in the 1930s and 40s. Pickens had been born in Talladega, Alabama, to distinguished parents: Her father had been one of the founders of the NAACP. She completed her undergraduate degree at Smith College, in Massachusetts, before pursuing further study at Columbia University and Bennett College for Women in Greensboro, North Carolina. In 1934, she became the supervisor of a large-scale recreation program maintained by the Works Progress Administration for the Juvenile Aid Bureau of the New York City Police Department. After four successful years in that capacity, Pickens accepted the position of executive secretary in the Harlem Tuberculosis and Health Committee, a public health organization that attended to some of her city's most formidable challenges. As a Naval Reserve Officer, Pickens would use her expertise and experience to organize and administer physical training to enlisted WAVES.

Frances Wills had a similarly impressive career, as social worker. She decided to join the WAVES upon seeing in the paper that the service was now open to African-American women. Already an accomplished professional, with degrees from Hunter College and the University of Pittsburgh, as well as several years' experience in the employment department of the YMCA and elsewhere, Wills would be an ideal officer candidate. As a Naval Reserve officer, she would be responsible for job training and selection for enlisted WAVES.

Both women were sworn into the Navy on 13 November 1944 and sent immediately to join other (white) officer candidates at the training station on the campus of Smith College, where Pickens and Wills managed to catch up with their classmates, who were already a week into their studies.

Their training completed some five weeks later, Pickens and Wills earned their commission as the Navy's first female African-American officers on 26 December 1944. Although their options for advancement remained limited by the expectations and prejudices of the Navy leadership and the American public more generally, Lieutenant (j.g.) Pickens and Ensign Wills became the first in a long line of female officers and enlistees who, gradually, came to enjoy greater and greater purviews. Edna Young, for example, one of the wartime WAVES enlistees, became one of the first women to enter the regular Navy, in 1948, and the first African-American woman to do so.

The demands of World War II drew African-American women to the services, including the Navy, and animated African-American rights organizations to campaign on their behalf. This process and others like it generated the momentum that eventually produced the Civil Rights movement of the 1950s and 1960s, which in turn precipitated further integration of the Navy and other institutions.

The integration of the WAVES and the commissioning of the first female African-American officers—Lieutenant (j.g.) Harriet Pickens and Ensign Ida Wills—were the result of efforts toward racial and gender equality that persist to the present and continue to inspire reform throughout the Navy, the Department of Defense, and American society at large.

Now's the time to start thinking about Scout of the Year! Nomination packages for the Scout of the Year Award are due to the Post by 1 March 2023.

To be eligible, nominees must:

- Be a registered Scout who is an active member of a Boy or Girl Scout Troup, Venturing Crew, or a Sea Scout Ship;
- Be a recipient of the Eagle Scout Award, Girl Scout Gold Award, Venture Summit Award, or Sea Scout Quartermaster Award:
- Have demonstrated exemplary citizenship in school, Scouting, and community; and
- There is no minimum age requirement for applicants as long as all other eligibility criteria has been met. The maximum age requirement for applicants is 18 years old and if an applicant reaches their 18th birthday during the nomination year, they remain eligible as long as they are still in high school at the time of the submission deadline.

FEBRUARY IS NATIONAL



MONTH



February is the month we try to avoid slips, trips, and falls. No matter what our age, a fall can result in a severe injury and really put a damper on your New Year.

• Make sure your home is free of trip hazards. Loose throw rugs, items left on the floor, even a sleeping pet, can result in a

painful tumble.

- Dim lighting in your hallways and on your porches can make walking hazardous.
- Unnoticed spills in the kitchen can bring down the cook quickly! Clean up the spills right away.

Outside, be aware that the leaves of autumn may hide the tree branches



fallen in the latest storm. Be careful when working or just walking outside. Holes in the yard, loose rocks, and storm debris can all make our fun with the family a trip to the Emergency Department.

The Post may soon be working on our new Post home. As we volunteer to "make it our own," be aware of the trip hazards as we clean up the clutter. Loose cables and wires are especially dangerous. Ladders and stools can be precarious. Do not forget to look out for each other! A warning to "watch out" may save your fellow veteran from injury.

★ SAFETY CORNER ★MARCH IS NATIONAL KIDNEY MONTH

"March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb" is a familiar axiom for us. Known for severe weather, March requires us to be aware and plan for storms, tornados, and high winds. Oh, yeah ... we also often get snow in March.

- Stay informed about current weather conditions through your TV, radio, or weather apps.
- Have an emergency plan in case you need to seek shelter. An interior room is safest in cases of high winds or tornados.
- Ensure you have a battery operated or crank-operated radio in case of a power loss. Add blankets and water supplies as the heat and local water may be lost during power outages.



• If you see lightning or hear thunder, stay indoors.

If outside, seek shelter. Count the number of seconds between lightning and subsequent thunder and divide by 5; the answer is the number of miles from the storm. Anything less than ten means that you are susceptible to lightning injury or death.

Health Safety

These midwinter months can be tedious and drab. Catching the flu or COVID would only make the time worse. Take preventive measures to stay infection free!

- The more experienced among us (over 65) are at higher risk of serious flu complications. Our immune systems decrease in effectiveness. Between 70 and 85% of flu-related deaths occur in people 65 and older. Getting a flu shot will decrease your risk of serious illness or hospitalization.
- Even if you decline a flu shot, be aware of group gatherings. If family members or friends are ill, avoid close contact. Where a mask if you like.
- · If you have a fever, cough, sore throat, muscle aches



and/or fatigue, you may have the flu. Rest and fluids may help but seek medical care if you have breathing problems.

• Similar symptoms are noted with COVID infection. If you are

- not vaccinated against COVID (including a booster dose), get a COVID test quickly. COVID treatments are effective if given early.
- Anytime you or a loved one has flu/COVID symptoms and have new onsets of confusion, inability to stay awake, or gray or blue tints to skin, lips, or fingernails, call 911.

In the rare case of snow, take extra precautions if you decide to shovel off the driveway! Most of us are no longer as physically fit as we were in our twenties or thirties. Dress in layers, work slowly with frequent rest periods, and STOP at the first sign of breathing difficulties or chest pains.


