



SEPTEMBER 11TH, 2001: UNARMED FIGHTER JETS SCRAMBLED TO TAKE OUT UNITED FLIGHT 93

It was a bright Tuesday morning, September 11th, 2001, shortly before 9 a.m. The first of two commercial airliners had flown into the North Tower of the World Trade Center in New York City, with the South Tower soon to follow. Then another plane struck the west wing of the Pentagon. And now a fourth was flying east towards Washington, D.C., currently over the Pennsylvania landscape, target unknown. Flight 93 would eventually crash into a Pennsylvania field, killing all on board.

Shortly before Flight 93 crashed, two fighter pilots scrambled to stop it before it could crash in Washington DC., willing to sacrifice their own lives to (continued on page 3)

...save countless others.

Lieutenant Heather Penney was one of those tasked with stopping the hijacked plane "by any means possible" following the earlier attacks on the Twin Towers and the Pentagon. However, as Lt. Penney and LtCol. Marc Sasseville (Sas) had no missiles on board their F-16s, they knew the only way to stop the United Airlines jet would be to "weaponize" their own planes.

"We would be ramming the aircraft. We didn't have (missiles) on board to shoot the airplane down," Lt. Penney said.

"As we were putting on our flight gear in the life support shop, Sass looked at me and said, 'I'll ram the cockpit.' I made the decision I would take the tail off the aircraft."

It had already been agreed by their bosses that this kind of attack would be a last resort if they could not otherwise divert the aircraft.

At the time, Sasseville said, he "was going into this moral or ethical justification of the needs of the many versus the needs of the few."

It was a clearly a Kamikaze mission, but both pilots were ready to die if that's what it took.

"I am just your average ordinary American, I'm a Mom, I was a military service member. I'm a member of my community. I'm just an American," Penney said. At least that's how Heather "Lucky" Penney sees herself.

When Lucky, a nickname Penney goes by, started her day on that crisp and cool Tuesday morning, she could never have imagined that she would be asked to willingly take down a passenger plane, in the process, possibly taking her own life.

"That Tuesday morning was an absolutely ordinary morning, just like every other day," Penney said. "I mean I got up I put on my Flight suit I ate my cheerios and I drove into work."

Penney, along with LtCol Sasseville, was one of the two F-16 fighter pilots with the Air Force that scrambled to find and take down Flight 93 before it hit its likely destination, the United States Capitol in Washington DC. They were in a meeting when they heard of the second tower being hit.

"So immediately we just all got up from our meeting and went into our squadron bar where our television was and that's where we saw the same images that everyone else saw that morning," Penney said. "That's when we realized our nation was under attack. We knew immediately that we needed to get airborne to protect and defend our nation's capital. We are a fighter unit based out of Andrews Air Force Base where Air Force One flies out of and we are here in the District of Columbia. So we've got Congress we've got the White House we know that we need to protect not just our civilians our citizens but our nation's leadership." Penney said.

The two towers in New York City and the Pentagon had already been hit by the time Flight 93 was already in the air. And through radar, the Air Force identified United 93 to likely be hijacked.

"Anyone who saw those images knew what needed to be done. Anyone who had been in my position would've been willing to do the exact same thing and would not have thought twice," Penney said.

Flight 93 took off from Newark International enroute to San Francisco. At 9:28 a.m. it's likely the hijackers took control and turned the plane near Cleveland, heading in a flight pattern to DC. Penney and Sasseville, the flight commander, suited up upon his command. There was just one problem aside from the obvious.

"We were sent on a suicide mission," Penney said. In 2001 there were few F-16's that sat fully armed with missiles. So Penney's jet was completely unarmed. Once they found Flight 93, Sas would ram the front of the plane and Penney would take out the tail.

"Because aerodynamically without the tail, airplanes cannot stay airborne. They actually tip over and dive straight into the ground," Penney said. After scouring the air above Pennsylvania, the two fighter pilots charged with taking down Flight 93 before hitting Washington D.C. were unsuccessful. They heard about its crash near Shanksville hours later.

"I was looking out visually to see if I could pick up a low flying airliner using my radar, scrolling down low seeing if I could find a radar contact down low but Sas and I never found anything. We

were too late, the passengers had already taken down Flight 93," Penney said.

In the end, this American hero by all definitions Heather "Lucky" Penney doesn't consider herself a hero. She said she was just a normal person on a far from normal day. "I simply observed what was going on. Passengers on Flight 93 changed the course of history because if they had not chosen to fight back, chosen to crash that airliner, they would have made it to DC."

• VFW Post 2894 Receives Monetary Grant from Home Depot. On Wednesday, 31 July, Jim Ireland, Post Service Officer, was notified that VFW Post 2894 was awarded a Home Depot Grant of \$3,150.00. This will be used for the carpeting and painting of various areas throughout the Post Headquarters.

AUGUST 2, 1990 IRAQ INVADES KUWAIT – OPERATION DESERT SHIELD

On 2 August 1990, Iraq, governed by President Saddam Hussein, invaded its neighbor Kuwait with four elite Republican Guard heavy divisions and the equivalent of a fifth composed of special operations commandos, fully occupying the country in



two days. The invasion was primarily over disputes regarding Kuwait's alleged slant drilling in Iraq's Rumaila oil field, as well as to cancel Iraq's large debt to Kuwait from the recently ended Iran-Iraq War. The invasion of Kuwait was immediately met with international condemnation, including UN Security Council Resolution 660, which demanded Iraq's immediate withdrawal from Kuwait, and the imposition of comprehensive international sanctions against Iraq with the adoption of UN Security Council Resolution 661.

President George H. W. Bush quickly announced that the United States considered Iraq's aggression unacceptable. On 7 August, the president backed up his words with a military response named Operation Desert Shield, and organized a coalition of 35

nations to defend Saudi Arabia and ultimately liberate Kuwait. Elements of the U.S. Army's XVIII Airborne Corps and Marine Corps 1st Marine Division were immediately deployed to Saudi Arabia to provide security against a potential Iraqi invasion, beginning a buildup of combat power in the region reaching at its peak about 600,000 U.S. personnel. An array of countries joined the American-led coalition, forming the largest military alliance since World War II. The bulk of the coalition's military power was from the United States, with Saudi Arabia, the United Kingdom, and Egypt as the largest lead-up contributors, in that order. Additionally, Saudi Arabia and the Kuwaiti government-in-exile paid out around US\$32 billion of the US\$60 billion cost to mobilize the coalition against Iraq.

UN Security Council Resolution 678, adopted on 29 November 1990, offered Iraq one final chance until 15 January 1991 to implement Resolution 660 and withdraw from Kuwait; it further empowered states after the deadline to use "all necessary means" to force Iraq out of Kuwait. Initial efforts to dislodge the Iraqis from Kuwait began with aerial and naval bombardment of Iraq on 17 January, 1991, with Operation Desert Shield officially transitioning to Operation Desert Storm with the start of the air war.

IN MEMORIUM Comrade Gary E. Dunbar 1948 – 2024



Gary Dunbar, a proud veteran of the United States Navy, passed away Sunday evening (June 2, 2024) of natural causes. The son of Paul Dunbar, and Leo and Marcella Zacanti, he grew up in Chariton, Iowa and Palo Alto, California, attending Gunn High School. Graduating a semester early with his

mother's permission, Gary enlisted in the United States Navy at the age of seventeen.

While attending "A" School in Albuquerque, New Mexico, Gary collided into Sandy on a snow tube on Sandia Mountain, with her landing in his lap. Four months later, they were married and have been so for 54 years.

He deployed to Vietnam in1970 as a Gunners Mate Technician on the USS Piedmont. Gary was a machine gunner on the SWIFT boats for two deployments, completing missions in Vietnam and Laos. His shore duty included Naval Station Adak, Alaska and Oakland Naval Supply Center, California. He served on the USS Midway and USS Eisenhower, and as a nuclear weapons inspector/trainer with Naval Weapons Training Group, Atlantic, Norfolk, Virginia. From 1974-1978 he was part of the Navy's competitive Rifle/Shotgun/Pistol team, and at the time was the only sailor to beat the USMC rifle champion.

Retiring as a Chief Petty Officer from the US Navy in 1989, he took pride in leading, training, and teaching his troops. Upon retirement, Gary and his best friend Rick started PDQ Tool Services, a small business serving military and commercial clients.

Gary has always had a big heart, especially when it came to kids. While on the USS Midway, his division adopted a Korean Orphanage. His troops completed service projects in Kenya and other ports of call. When it was time for the annual Navy Relief drive, he was first to take on fundraising. He was a life member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) SSG Jonathan Kilian Dozier Memorial Post 2894 in Chesapeake, Virginia. He served as the Service Officer for both the Post and District 2. He loved helping veterans and their families cope and overcome challenges around disabilities which often included home modifications, acquiring proper medical equipment and maximizing the benefits that were earned. You would often see him approach any vet to strike up a conversation about the VFW. He enjoyed working on his hotrod and attending car shows. Gary is survived by his wife, Sandy; son Greg and grandchildren Bella and Caterina; daughter Amanda and her husband Todd; his siblings Wes, Paul, Annie, and Jimmy; and Sandy's siblings Pat, Bob and his wife Linda, and Cheryl. Gary spent the twenty years of his career serving his country and the last twenty-five years doing everything he could to assist others who served and needed help. He is remembered as a leader, teacher, storyteller, comedian, and prankster. He was interred at Albert G. Horton, Jr. Memorial Veterans Cemetery with full U.S. Navy Funeral Honors on June 14, 2024.

AUGUST IS IMMUNIZATION AWARENESS MONTH



This month is Immunization Awareness Month. I will bet that if you remember your childhood, or remember getting your children vaccinated, you learned about immunizations. When you began your military service, you REALLY learned about immunizations. Of the gazillion shots you received throughout

your military career, you were probably protected against diseases and illnesses most people never thought about!



Vaccines are important for people of all ages. They help protect against serious diseases, deadly diseases, and critical illnesses. As we left the military behind, many of us moved immunization awareness to the backs of our minds. Well, COVID quickly

changed that. There was a strong national push to get the masses vaccinated against COVID. And thousands of lives were saved. But, as we go about our post-career lives, we must not lose sight of the need for vaccinations. Although there are some post-career jobs that require even more vaccinations, just going on with our lives requires us to keep up our immunities.

Recommended for all adults, and especially those of us older (or more experienced) age, are a few important vaccines. This list is not totally inclusive but hits important areas.

Tetanus Booster shot every 10 years

MMR Measles, mumps, and rubella; needed for all

those born 1980 or later.

COVID Updated booster yearly

Influenza "Flu shot"; updated booster yearly

RSV Respiratory Syncytial Virus; everyone over 65

Varicella "Chicken Pox"; needed for all those born 1980

or later

Pneumococcal "Pneumonia shot"; everyone over 65

Make sure you check with your personal physician and get your immunizations up to date. Some of those recommended for older adults are also recommended for anyone immunosuppressed. Do not let fear of needles or you "being too busy" keep you from getting your shots. Do it now.

SEPTEMBER IS SUICIDE PREVENTION MONTH



This month is Suicide Awareness and Prevention Month. Every day, 40-44 veterans die from suicide or overdoses. Many people talk about the high risk of Post Traumatic Symptoms for the veterans of the War on Terrorism from Iraq and Afghanistan. Over the last 20 years, over 30,000 vets have died

from suicides and overdoses. Yet currently the majority of suicides are among the Viet Nam era vets.

We must change the thoughts that those who need help are somehow "broken". We must "break" the stigma around mental health treatment and remind everyone that "it is OK" to seek help. Although post-traumatic stress can bear heavily on veterans, so can traumatic brain injury, everyday stresses on paying bills, getting needed medical care, and substance abuse. We must help our comrades. Learn the signs and symptoms of someone suffering from stress. Examples might be changes in behavior, such as withdrawing from friends and family, giving away personal possessions, or suddenly making a will. Other indicators might include complaining of being a burden to others, or expressing feelings of being empty or hopeless ("Why should I go on?"). Monitor people that you are worried about. Maintain your social contacts and support others. Visit your buddies or just meet for coffee. Send postcards and letters to old friends. Reach out over the telephone or internet. Be involved socially.



We are only a few of many military veterans. But in the VFW, we maintain a special bond, that only those who have experienced what we have can understand. If you are having thoughts of suicide or are in crisis and wondering "will it ever end", reach out for help. Dial 988 to contact the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. Or text *talk* to 741741. Or just talk to a trusted family member or close friend. You can get better.
