POST AWARDS NIGHT -A GREAT SUCCESS!

We held our annual Awards Ceremony on 11 May with a large crowd on hand ranging from Mayor Krasnoff, Chief of Police Wright, Deputy Fire Chief Fermil, School Board

member Louis Tayon, District 2 Commander "Butch" Schupska, and many others.

We gave out two new awards this year for the first time ever: the presented Auxiliary the Patriotic Art Award to Krystal Harris, who will be attending VCU this fall in order to study art. Her piece combined elements of Vietnam and WWI but she also put a twist on it by using the Ace of Hearts (love) instead of the Ace of Spades (death). We used her



art on the program for the ceremony.

The other new award was our Deputy Sheriff of the Year. We have always recognized the Police Officer of the Year but we thought it only right to add another award for the Deputy Sheriff.

We were also especially honored with the presence of three "veteran" veterans: Mickey Casady, who joined the Navy in 1937 and served in both the Atlantic and Pacific campaigns; Sisneros "Tony" Rivera, a survivor of Corregidor who is transferring his membership to our post; and Jack Garnier, a former post commander from

Lake Placid, New York, and Korean war veteran.

At the end awards, we hung battle streamers on our Post flag from each of the major campaigns in the past 75 vears and asked any veterans of those

campaigns to stand and be honored. We hung streamers from the WWII European, American, and Pacific campaigns; Korean War and Service; Vietnam War and POW/MIA; Armed Forces Expeditionary; Desert Storm/Desert Gulf; Global War on Terrorism Service and Expeditionary; Afghanistan; and Iraq.

We also presented plaques to the Sheriff's Department for all that they do in support of the Post and local veterans, and a plaque to Wendy Childers for her unwavering support of deployed Marines through her "We Care Marines" program which has already sent more than 5,000 care-packages overseas.

The reception afterwards was a great success due to the efforts of Sandy Dunbar, Jim Keiper and the Auxiliary. Thanks to you all!

The following awards were presented:

Patriots' Pen Award

Each year more than 130,000 students in grades 6 through 8 enter the VFW's Patriot's Pen youth essay contest. The contest encourages young people to examine America's history, along with their own experiences in modern society, by drafting a 300 to 400-word essay,



expressing their views on different themes, this year's being, "What Freedom Means To Me." The winner of Post 2894's Patriots' Pen for 2015-16 is Kayleigh Hamel, an 8th grader at St. Gregory the Great Catholic School in Virginia Beach and her parents are Matt and Karen. In her essay, Kayleigh wrote, "I take great pride in knowing that my dad is a veteran of a foreign war, but as he continually reminds me, there are so many other great veterans who gave their lives willingly so that I could continue to enjoy the daily freedoms so often taken for granted. We must never take these freedoms and our democracy for granted...I will do everything in my power to do my part to honor those that have gone before me and to serve as an example to those who shall follow." Kayleigh received a certificate, a \$100 check, a PP medal, and a pin. Congratulations, Kayleigh!

Young American Creative Patriotic Art Award

The Young American Creative Patriotic Art Contest was begun in 1979 to recognize up-and-coming artists and encourage patriotism in youth. Each year more than 3,500 high school students from across the country participate in the contest. This year is the very first time that this award will be presented in Chesapeake. The winner of the Post 2894 Auxiliary's Patriotic Art Contest is Krystal Harris. Her mother is Jeannett. Krystal is a senior at Western Branch High School who will be attending VCU in the fall to study art. Her winning art work was portrayed on the front of the program for the ceremony. What we veterans really enjoyed is that she incorporated buddy poppies - a symbol of the blood shed during World War I - with a symbol from the Vietnam war, a playing card in the headband of a helmet. The National Winner receives \$21,000 so we wish her the best of luck as her art piece moves to the State level for judging. Krystal received a certificate, a \$25 gift card from the Auxiliary, a \$100 check from the Post, and a Patriotic Art pin. Well done, Krystal.

Voice of Democracy Award

The Voice of Democracy Award is VFW's premier scholarship program. Each year, nearly 40,000 high



school students compete for more than 2.2 million dollars in scholarships and incentives. These scholarships range up to a national first place prize of \$30,000. The VFW established the program in 1947 to provide high school students the opportunity to express themselves in regards to democratic ideas and principles. Students compete by writing and recording an audio essay on an annual patriotic theme. This year's theme was: "My Vision for America." The winner of this year's Voice of Democracy contest for Post 2894 is Caitlin Head, a senior homeschooler from Virginia Beach. Caitlin also won the

District 2 award and she placed 2nd runner-up at the State level. Here's what she expressed in her essay, "While necessity might be the mother of invention, innovation is the child of competition, and competition is only possible through free enterprise. If we were to sacrifice the rights of the individual for the supposed sake of the whole, we would sacrifice the Edisons, the Carnegies, and the Fords. We'd never know another Steve Jobs or Walt Disney. On the other hand, if we encouraged the success of individuals, the whole would ultimately benefit from their success...The same concept applies on a global scale. When one nation prospers, the whole world is affected. America's success challenges and enables the rest of society to follow suit. No other nation has had the global influence America enjoys, because no other nation has made the contribution we have." With ideas like these, Caitlin was enthusiastically awarded our Post's Voice of Democracy award. From our Post, Caitlin received a certificate, a \$150 check, a VOD medal, and a pin. From the Department, she received a plaque and a \$400 check!

Scout of the Year

Some of the VFW's earliest ties to the community involve youth groups and perhaps none are stronger or more lasting than the relationship between the VFW and America's scouting organizations. In fact, VFW's partnership with the Scouts of America dates back to 1915 when VFW Post 2100 helped to establish Boy Scout Troop 1 in Everett, Washington. Through the VFW's Scout of the Year program, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Venture Crew Scouts who display standout citizenship, patriotism and love of country have the opportunity to be rewarded with college scholarships of up to 5,000 dollars. The winner of our Post's Scout of the Year is Elizabeth Acors of Girl Scout Troop 658. Elizabeth is a senior at Grassfield High School and is used to being up here as a award Post winner,



last year she won the Voice of Democracy contest. Elizabeth is ranked 10th in a class of 531 and her GPA is a 4.575! She has more achievements and activities than you can shake a stick at but it was still one of the closest contests we've ever had. The difference maker was her service project. She devoted her Gold Award toward improvements at "LZ Grace", a retreat for special operations force troops seeking post combat deployment support. The center provides a confidential and secure place for warriors to decompress before reentering family and civilian life. As a former US Ranger said, "I have very few places to hide. My life is so busy. It's virtually impossible to unplug and unwind. When I go out to LZ-Grace, everything else goes away and I can breathe. When I drive (or ride) away from the property, I feel cleansed and rejuvenated." Elizabeth contributed to this

state of well-being and renewal for the highest trained – and strained – servicemen of our country and for that we enthusiastically selected her as our Scout of the Year. Elizabeth received a certificate, a \$180 check, and a VFW patch.

Teacher of the Year

The Teacher of the Year program recognizes teachers who promote a sense of national pride in their students. Every year, 7500 VFW posts around the country nominate teachers for awards at the elementary, middle and high school levels. Last year, our post winner, Craig Blackman, won National high school teacher of the year and traveled to Pittsburgh with his family where they met the President. Kimberly was also selected as the District 2 as well as the Department of Virginia High School Teacher of the Year! Kimberly set a Guinness Book of World Records when she held the largest in-person civics

class in history with 714 students. She held their rapt attention while teaching them what it means to be a free American citizen with all the rights and responsibilities that that entails. As Alexis de Toqueville pointed out. each new generation is a new people that must acquire the knowledge,

learn the skills, and develop the dispositions or traits of private and public character that undergird a constitutional democracy. Kimberly's past students have described her as, "a great teacher who is also a little bit eccentric. She hates people who talk back, people who argue with her and don't know what they're talking about, and people who talk during the announcements... so don't do it! If you're smart, a good student, don't misbehave and genuinely try in her class, you're fine. Hammerland! WOOH!" Another exclaimed, "Mrs. Hammers was soooo cool...[I'm] taking AP Gov't just cause she's teaching it. Hammerlanian for life!" This past year, her students had a 99% passing rate on the college AP exams. She has chaired numerous committees in school while doing a lot of work out of the classroom. She not only 'talks the talk' about giving back to the community, she sets the example for her students by 'walking the walk.' She has been honored with a Teaching Excellence award by the Future Educators of America, and her personal classroom management plan was published in a book for teachers. For her passion in teaching and interest in our future generations, Kimberly Hammers is awarded the Post 2894 Teacher of the Year award. As part of her reward for finishing in the top 5 at National, Kimberly will be attending the Medal of Honor lecture series at Valley Forge this summer. This has been a dream of hers for several years and now she gets to go

there for free! Kimberly received a certificate and a \$250 check.

Deputy Sheriff of the Year

Deputy Specialist Richard Scott of the Chesapeake Sheriff's Department is our first ever Deputy of the Year. Deputy Scott is a 20 year veteran and has worked in a variety of sections. He is currently assigned to the Sheriff's K-9 Unit with his partner Max. The partners have made numerous arrests and been instrumental in removing many pounds of illegal narcotics and multiple dangerous weapons from our streets, making Chesapeake a safer place to live. This past October, a cash box was snatched from a restaurant manager as he was walking into a bank on South Battlefield Boulevard. Witnesses



were able to describe the car that the suspect got into. When Deputy Scott heard the call on the radio, he realized the suspects would more than likely use the bypass as their getaway route and he was right. He led the chase into Norfolk where the suspects eventually stopped and fled on foot. Two of them were eventually apprehended after a foot pursuit and the money was recovered. Without his attention to detail and assistance, the suspects would have likely escaped. Although engaged in other duties at the time, Deputy Scott had the presence of mind to monitor his police radio and perform his duties far above and beyond what would be expected. For that, he is awarded our Deputy Sheriff of the Year Award. Richard received a certificate and a \$125 check.

Emergency Medical Technician of the Year

Our next award went to the Emergency Medical Technician of the Year, Firefighter Paramedic David Brock. As was written in his citation, Firefighter Brock is a key member in the development of the current Advanced Life Support Orientation and Field Training



Evaluation Program. He spent many hours creating realistic scenarios that challenged new medics. He is a dynamic and powerful communicator who possesses the gift of being able to make complex subjects understandable. But he is also a humble and approachable person who loves to share his extensive knowledge with others. He has been a Field Training Evaluator and played a major role in helping many new firefighters successfully become the experts they are today. He also served in Philadelphia and overseas in Kuwait and Kwajalein Atoll. He is a member of FEMA's urban search and rescue team based in Virginia Beach. Congratulations Firefighter Paramedic Brock! David received a certificate and a \$125 check.

Firefighter of the Year

Firefighter/EMT Charles "Crow" Crowthers has been a member of the Chesapeake Fire Department since 2007. His citation read, "It is challenging to find where



Firefighter Crowthers has displayed superior performance because he makes exceeding the department's expectations the norm!" He is a physical training instructor at the fire academy with a 'motivational' style all his own that includes "making sounds like the Tasmanian Devil"! Another statement in his citation reads, "He has a highly competitive attitude and superior physical abilities that all members of the fire service should strive to attain." He constantly seeks to improve himself. If someone is better at something than he is, by the next week he will be doing it better than they do! One of his superiors summed it up with, "The biggest compliment I can pay him is to say that I seek to bring the 'Crow' out of every firefighter." Crow is a former Marine who served in Desert Shield/Desert Storm. For his intense passion for the fire service and the department, Firefighter Crowthers is recognized as our Post Firefighter of the Year. Crow received a certificate and a \$125 check.

Police Officer of the Year

Officer Michael Hilton is our Police Officer of the Year. He is a native "Great Bridger", having graduated from high school here in 2001. He has been with the Department since the summer of 2004 and is currently assigned to the 3rd Precinct. This is a bitter sweet award for Officer Hilton, because while we honored his professionalism, attention to detail, and mental preparation, there was a fatal consequence. Just like many members of this post have done in overseas environments, he went to work one day hoping for a slow

day but found himself in a life-and-death situation before it ended. A year ago this past January, he responded to a



shots-fired call - a suicide-by-cops attempt. entering the area, Officer Hilton stopped his vehicle and did what many of us have done before going into a firefight - he checked his weapons. When he got back into his car and drove around the corner he came under immediate fire and then used his vehicle to provide cover for himself and another officer. When the suspect didn't comply with orders to drop the weapon, Officer Hilton returned fire and the suspect was hit and later died. But Officer Hilton is defined by much more than this one incident. He is a loving husband and the father of two young girls. He has received numerous awards including the Star Performer Award and Lifesaver Award after performing CPR on a female driver who had a heart attack and crashed her car. While veterans put their lives on the line in foreign lands, officers like Michael put their lives on the line back here at home. And for that, and for everything else that Officer Hilton has done during the entirety of his career, we honor him as our Police Officer of the Year. Michael received a certificate and a \$125

IN MEMORIAM: CDR ROBERT S. IKE, SR, USN (Ret) - February 4, 1929 – April 9, 2016

Robert C. "Bob" Ike, 87, of Chesapeake, passed away peacefully, surrounded by family on Saturday, April 9, 2016, after a courageous battle against multiple myeloma cancer.

Born in Wharton, Texas, he was the son of the late William



M. and Alma C. Ike. At age 17, Bob enlisted in the U.S. Navy, rose to the rank of Chief, attended OCS and was then commissioned as an Ensign. During his Naval career, Bob earned a Masters Degree in Public Administration. After 34 years, he honorably retired as a full Commander. Bob was a Veteran of WWII, Korea and Vietnam, having served aboard the USS Midway and America's first guided missile destroyer, the USS Durant. Additionally, he served as a civilian

in Saudi Arabia, supporting Operation Desert Storm. After returning to Chesapeake, Bob, with his son Robert, founded Sentry Security Systems in 1989, retiring in 2015. During his second retirement, Bob enjoyed researching family genealogy, stamp collecting and tending to his purple martins.

Survivors include his loving wife of 66 years, Georgia E. Ike; children, Marsha J. Chase and husband Russell, Tami L. Ike and wife Patricia, Robert C. Ike, Jr. and wife Brenda; grandchildren, Shannon and husband Jeff, Heather and husband Dan, Tanner and wife Erin, Robert III and wife Heather, Christopher, Jeramy and wife Andrea; great-grandchildren,

Adam, Brandon, Brooke, Aiden, Lilly, Logan, Brinleigh and Abigail, as well as numerous nieces, nephews and extended family.

A graveside service with full military honors was conducted at 2:00 p.m., Thursday, April 14, 2016 in Rosewood Memorial Park, Virginia Beach. Dr. Will Langford officiated.

tribulations of movie about the returning servicemen and women with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), traumatic brain injury (TBI), and more, and their relationships with friends and



family. The movie is "When called War Comes Home." We'll keep you updated on its release.

WWI History, 100 Years Ago Today...

June 1, 1916 – Battle of Jutland ends. Germans at Verdun continue offensive success along Meuse River and attack French on te east bank, targeting Fort Vaux and fortification at Thiaumont. Eight days later, both objectives taken as French suffer heavy casualties. Germans push onward toward ridge that overlooks Verdun and edge toward Meuse bridges. Entire nation of France now rallies behind their troops in defense of Verdun as French generals vow it will not be taken.

June 4, 1916 - Four Russian armies on Eastern Front, under innovative new commander, General Alexei Brusilov, begin general offensive in southwest along 300-mile front. Brusilov avoids predictable narrow frontline attacks used previously, in favor of sweeping offensive over hundreds of miles that is harder to pin down. Thinly stretched Austro-Hungarian troops defending Front are taken by surprise. Realizing their distress, Germans pull four divisions from Verdun and send them east. By end of summer, Germans will send 20

more divisions and merge surviving Austro-Hungarian troops into Germany Army.

June 9, 1916 – Jidda (Arabia) captured by Arab forces.

June 10, 1916 – Turkish garrison of Mecca surrenders to Sherif.

June 22, 1916 - Germans resume offensive near Verdun, targeting Fort Souville which overlooks city and Meuse bridges. Using poisonous phosgene gas at start of the attack, initially take village of Fleury just two miles north of Verdun, but further advance southward is halted by strong French counter-attack. Verdun has become battle of attrition for both sides with death toll already approaching 500,000 men.

Battle of the Somme; July 1-November 18, 1916

June 24, 1916 - Allies begin week-long artillery bombardment of German defensive positions on Somme River in northern France, in preparation for major British-led offensive. Over 1.5 million shells fired along 15-mile front to pulverize intricate German trench system and blow apart rows of barbed wire. British Commander Douglas Haig believes this will allow unhindered infantry advance and rapid breakthrough of German Front on first day of battle.

July 1, 1916 - British Army suffers worst single-day death toll in history as 18,800 soldiers killed on first day of Battle of Somme. Losses come as 13 attacking divisions encounter German defenses still intact despite seven-day bombardment designed to knock them out. British also attack in broad daylight, advancing in lines shoulder-to-shoulder only to be systematically mowed down by German machinegunners. Somme offensive quickly becomes battle of attrition as British and French troops make marginal gains against Germans but repeatedly fail to break through entire Front as planned.

July 10, 1916 - Germans attack again at Verdun, using poison gas, and advance toward Fort Souville. Four days later, French counter-attack and halt Germans.



July 13, 1916 - British launch night attack against German positions along 3.5-mile portion of Somme Front. After advancing nearly 1,000 yards, advance halted as Germans regroup defenses. Two days later, British once again penetrate German line and

advance to High Wood but are then pushed back.

CHAPLAIN'S FOXHOLE

Remembering D Day from a Different Perspective. The article you are about to read was originally published in the "Daily Signal" by Rich Tuker, on June 6, 2012 and is titled: "D Day: Let Us Pray" I find it very fitting for this year's 72nd Anniversary of the D Day landing:

When we look back across history, it's all too easy to assume that because something happened, it had to happen exactly the way it did.

But there was nothing inevitable, for example, about Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo or the Union's victory at Gettysburg. These battles could easily have turned in a different direction, and the tide of human history might have changed with them.

The same is true for D-Day, June 6, 1944, when Allied forces began carrying out the largest amphibious invasion in history. Within a year, the Allies succeeded in freeing Europe from Nazi domination.

But nobody knew what the outcome would be when the mission started. Just in case, commanding General Dwight D. Eisenhower drafted a brief letter stating: "Our landings in the Cherbourg-Harve area have failed to gain a satisfactory foothold and I have withdrawn the troops. My decision to attack at this time and place was based upon the best information available. The troops, the air and the Navy did all that bravery and devotion to duty could do. If any blame or fault attaches to the attempt it is mine alone."

He never had to release that note.

At the White House, President Franklin Roosevelt also knew that the mission might not succeed. That evening he took to the airways to encourage Americans to pray for the success of the invasion.

As Americans remember D-Day 71 years later, it's fitting that we also remember FDR's moving prayer. Here's one way to do so: The World War II Memorial "commemorates the sacrifice and celebrates the victory of 'the greatest generation,'" as the National Park Service notes.

Sixty eight years after D-Day, the House of Representatives passed HR 2070, "To direct the Secretary of the Interior to install in the area of the World War II Memorial in the District of Columbia a suitable plaque or an inscription with the words that President Franklin D. Roosevelt prayed with the nation on June 6, 1944."

FDR's prayer, calling upon God to bless America's mission in Europe, deserves a prominent place at the World War II Memorial. The entire prayer, with its powerful appeal to God and its emphasis on the goodness of America's fight, follows:

My Fellow Americans:

Last night, when I spoke with you about the fall of Rome, I knew at that moment that troops of the United States and our Allies were crossing the Channel in another and greater operation. It has come to pass with success thus far.

And so, in this poignant hour, I ask you to join with me in prayer:

Almighty God: Our sons, pride of our nation, this day have set upon a mighty endeavor, a struggle to preserve our Republic, our religion, and our civilization, and to set free a suffering humanity.

Lead them straight and true; give strength to their arms, stoutness to their hearts, steadfastness in their faith.

They will need Thy blessings. Their road will be long and hard. For the enemy is strong. He may hurl back our forces. Success may not come with rushing speed, but we shall return again and again; and we know that by Thy grace, and by the righteousness of our cause, our sons will triumph.

They will be sore tried, by night and by day, without rest—until the victory is won. The darkness will be rent by noise and flame. Men's souls will be shaken with the violence of war.

For these men are lately drawn from the ways of peace. They fight not for the lust of conquest. They fight to end conquest. They fight to liberate. They fight to let justice arise, and tolerance and goodwill among all Thy people. They yearn but for the end of battle, for their return to the haven of home.

Some will never return. Embrace these, Father, and receive them, Thy heroic servants, into Thy kingdom.



And for us at home—fathers, mothers, children, wives, sisters, and brothers of brave men overseas, whose thoughts and prayers are ever with them—help us, Almighty God, to rededicate ourselves in renewed faith in Thee in this hour of great sacrifice.

Many people have urged that I call the nation into a single day of special prayer. But because the road is long and the desire is great, I ask that our people devote themselves in a continuance of prayer. As we rise to each new day, and again when each day is spent, let words of prayer be on our lips, invoking Thy help to our efforts.

Give us strength, too—strength in our daily tasks, to redouble the contributions we make in the physical and the material support of our armed forces.

And let our hearts be stout, to wait out the long travail, to bear sorrows that may come, to impart our courage unto our sons wheresoever they may be.

And, O Lord, give us faith. Give us faith in Thee; faith in our sons; faith in each other; faith in our united crusade. Let not the keeness of our spirit ever be dulled. Let not the impacts of temporary events, of temporal matters of but fleeting moment—let not these deter us in our unconquerable purpose.

With Thy blessing, we shall prevail over the unholy forces of our enemy. Help us to conquer the apostles of greed and racial arrogances. Lead us to the saving of our country, and with our sister nations into a world unity that will spell a sure peace—a peace invulnerable to the schemings of unworthy men. And a peace that will let all of men live in freedom, reaping the just rewards of their honest toil.

Thy will be done, Almighty God. Amen.

Severe Weather Can Threaten Summer Fun, Safety and Health

Summer means vacation, outdoor activities, and fun in the sun! It's a time when families hit the road to visit national parks or distant relatives. The warm months and long days mean that there is plenty of time for baseball games and barbecues. The sultry temperatures practically invite you to take a dip in the pool or ocean.

But don't let the sunny days and warm nights fool you. Summer also holds significant weather hazards. Heat waves can be lengthy and deadly. Lightning deaths are at their peak during the summer. June 1st is the start of hurricane season.

This summer, the VFW wants you to be prepared for weather hazards. You're not powerless in the face of these hazards. With just a few simple steps, you can become VFW-Ready. Stay safe this summer:

Know Your Risk

Being prepared means learning about summer weather hazards such as hurricanes, heat, lightning, rip currents, air quality and wildfires. Here's what you need to know:

- Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 through November 30. Hurricane hazards come in many forms, including storm surge, heavy rainfall, inland flooding, high winds, tornadoes, and rip currents.
- Since 2003, 43 states within the continental United States have come under a tornado watch; 49 states have come under severe thunderstorm watches; and lightning strikes occur in every state.
- Heat waves are common across the country during the summer. They are dangerous because the human body cannot cool itself properly when exposed to an extreme combination of heat and humidity.
- Between 1959 and 2003, lightning has killed 62 people in Virginia and injured at least 252 people.
- Wildfires kill 30 people, destroy 2,800 homes and burn more than 7 million acres, on average, per year.
- Flash flooding is the number one killer associated with severe weather.
- Air pollution can make it harder for people with asthma and other respiratory diseases to breathe. Children and teens may be more sensitive than adults to the health effects caused by air pollution. According to the EPA, poor air quality is responsible in the U.S. for an estimated 60,000 premature deaths each year.

Take Action

While the weather may be wild, you are not powerless. Prepare for summer hazards with these simple steps:

- Do you live in a hurricane evacuation zone? If so, you need to plan on where you and your family would ride out the storm if you are told to evacuate.
- You may have only minutes to find shelter before a tornado strikes. Practice a family tornado drill at least once a year.
- Protect yourself from extreme heat by rescheduling outdoor activities to earlier in the day.
- There is no safe place outside when lightning is in the area. If you hear thunder, you are likely within striking distance of the storm. Just remember, When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors.
- If you live near wildland areas, make sure your home is Firewise and fire-safe. Also determine evacuation routes from your home. Visit weather.gov to determine if your area is at risk for dangerous fire weather conditions.
- Whether on foot or in a car, if you encounter flood waters, "Turn Around - Don't Drown!"
- Make sure to check the Air Quality Index for your area at http://airquality.weather.gov or http://airquality.wea

Be a VFW Ready

Your action can inspire others. Be VFW Ready and share how you're working to stay safe from weather hazards this summer at your post.

- Create a Family Communication Plan so that your loved ones know how to get in touch during an emergency. And let your friends know that they should create a plan also.
- Look for ways to help your town prepare, such as volunteering with the American Red Cross or joining a Community Emergency Response Team.
- Register for America's PrepareAthon! to learn how to stay safe during disasters.

With these steps, you'll be doing more than just protecting yourself - you'll help us build a VFW Ready Organization, and helping VFW to do it's part to meet organizational goals as spelt out in the National Response Framework

Experts offer advice for a safe day at the beach

From death-defying rip currents and red-hot sun to jellyfish stings and shark attacks, the beach can be a pretty scary place. But it doesn't have to be. Experts tell WebMD that a day at the beach can be ... well ... a day at the beach -- when you know what to look out for.

"Swimming and water activities are very healthy so long as you use appropriate caution for yourself and your family when you visit the beach," says B. Chris Brewster, president of the United States Lifesaving Association (USLA), a national organization based in Huntington Beach, Calif. The first step is knowing where danger lurks and how to avoid it.

Conquering Rip Currents

The best way to protect yourself from rip currents is to avoid them.

"Select a beach where lifeguards are present because the chances of drowning are 1 in 18 million if a lifeguard is present," he says. Sounds simple enough, but there are many beaches around the U.S. where no lifeguards are provided by the local community, he says. "Make sure beaches are staffed at the time you are swimming," he adds. "At some beaches, lifeguards are only staffed until 6 p.m., for example, so the mere fact that you go to a beach where a lifeguard is present doesn't mean a lifeguard will be present when you are swimming," he says. "Check with them before you swim and ask where the safe places are," he says. "It is their role

to help you find the safest place [and] if there are no lifeguards present, you may find a kiosk or signs at beach access points listing such information."

If you do happen to get caught in a rip current, "swim to the side one way or the other until you no longer have difficulties or feel yourself being pulled," Brewster advises.

Whatever you do, "don't fight the current because

these currents can move up to 8 knots, which is faster than an Olympic swimmer can swim," he says. "In many cases, you will be simply unable to outpower the rip current, so you'll want to outsmart it," he says.

Another option is to tread water until someone can assist you, Brewster suggests.

"Learn to swim in the environment where you are going to be swimming," Brewster says. "You may be a confident pool swimmer, but that doesn't prepare you for conditions on the North shore of Oahu in Hawaii," he says. "Always swim near a lifeguard and never swim alone," he says. "Even a very confident swimmer can experience difficulties and if there is an emergency and you are alone, you may not be noticed."

Alcohol and Swimming Don't Mix

According to the USLA, alcohol can reduce your <u>body</u> <u>temperature</u> and impair your swimming ability as well as impair judgment, causing you to take unnecessary risks.

Float Where You Can Swim

"If you have a raft, don't take it any further from shore than you have the capability to swim," Brewster says. "If you are using a floating device such as a body board or raft, use a leash so that if you fall off, you don't lose the device," he recommends.

Steer Clear of Sharks

Each summer, we tend to hear about at least one horrific shark attack. In fact, in mid-June, a surfer died after a shark bit him in the left thigh in waters off northeastern Brazil that are known for large concentrations of sharks, according to media reports. But shark attacks are actually rather rare. In fact, worldwide there is an average of 50 to 70 shark attacks every year, according to statistics compiled by the International Shark Attack File.

"You are far more likely to be injured in a car accident driving to the beach than to ever even see a shark," says Brewster. To avoid becoming a statistic, "don't wear shiny jewelry or swim at dusk," Brewster suggests. "Shark bites are believed to be a

result of prey identification mistakes where the shark thinks you are a fish or a seal."

Fireworks: The possession, manufacture, storage, sale, handling and use of fireworks are prohibited in the City of Chesapeake. Leave the fireworks to the professionals this 4th of July and be SAFE!

Propane Grilling Do's

- Always use the grill outdoors in a well-ventilated area. Always follow all the manufacturer's instructions and keep written materials and manuals in a safe, accessible place.
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve fully closed when not in use.
- Make sure the gas grill is shut off and completely cooled before covering it after use.
- Always use or store cylinders in an upright, vertical position.
 Be sure to store them outdoors away from sources of ignition (i.e. heat, matches, or lighters).
- When a cylinder is refilled, have your Propane Supplier check for dents, damage, rust, or leaks.
- After filling, take the cylinder home immediately. While transporting, keep the vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped.
- When a grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from the propane gas retailer to keep out dirt, insects, and moisture.
- Before lighting a propane gas grill burner, test the gas fittings for leaks. The NFPA provides this leak detection solution: Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional

before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

Charcoal grills

• There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.

- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

Safe Boating Tips

No matter how much experience you have, it's always a good idea for everyone to review boating safety rules before departures. Below you will find 10 basic boating safety tips to help you stay safe:

1. <u>Be Weather-Wise</u> Always check local weather conditions before departure; TV and radio forecasts can be a good source of information. If you notice darkening clouds, volatile and rough changing winds or sudden drops in temperature, play it safe by getting off the water.

2.<u>Follow a Pre-Departure Checklist</u> Proper boating safety includes being prepared for any possibility on the water. Following a pre-departure checklist is the best way to make sure no boating safety rules or precautions have been overlooked or forgotten.

3.<u>Use Common Sense</u> One of the most important parts of boating safety is to use your common sense. This means operating at a safe speed at all times (especially in crowded areas), staying alert at all times and steering clear of large vessels and watercraft that can be restricted in their ability to stop or turn. Also, be respectful of buoys and other navigational aids, all of which have been placed there to ensure your own safety.

4.<u>Designate an Assistant Skipper</u> Make sure more than one person on board is familiar with all aspects of your boat's handling, operations, and general boating safety. If the primary navigator is injured or incapacitated in any way, it's important to make sure someone else can follow the proper boating safety rules to get everyone else back to shore.

5.<u>Develop a Float Plan</u>. Whether you choose to inform a family member or staff at your local marina, always be sure to let someone else know your float plan. This should include where you're going and how long you're going to be gone. A float plan can include the following information:

- name, address, and phone number of trip leader
- name and phone number of all passengers
- boat type and registration information
- trip itinerary

· types of communication and signal equipment onboard, such



as an Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon (EPIRB) or Personal Locator Beacon (PLB)

6.Make Proper Use of Lifejackets. Did you know that majority of drowning the victims are the result of boaters not wearing their lifeiackets? Make sure that your family and friends aren't part of this statistic by

assigning and fitting each member of your onboard team with a life jacket prior to departure. Wear it!

7.<u>Avoid Alcohol</u>. Practice boating safety at all times by saving the alcohol for later. The probability of being involved in a boating accident doubles when alcohol is involved and studies have shown that the effects of alcohol are exacerbated by sun and wind.

8..<u>Learn to Swim.</u> If you're going to be in and around the water, proper boating safety includes knowing how to swim. Local organizations, such as the American Red Cross and others, offer training for all ages and abilities. Check to see what classes are offered in your area.

9.<u>Take a Boating Course.</u> Beginning boaters and experienced experts alike need to be familiar with the boating safety rules of operation. Boater education requirements vary by state; however, some require validated completion of at least one boating safety course. Regardless of your individual state's requirements, it's always important to be educated and prepared for every circumstance that might arise. You can learn boating safety rules by taking a local community course or online course to help educate yourself.

10. Consider a Free Vessel Safety Check. Take advantage of a free vessel safety check from the US Coast Guard. They offer complimentary boat examinations to verify the presence and condition of certain safety equipment required by state and federal regulations. Free of charge, they'll provide a specialist to

check out your boat and make helpful boating safety tips and recommendations. They also offer virtual online safety checks as well.

SOCIAL SECURITY AND MILITARY SERVICE

If you served in the military after 1956, you paid Social Security taxes on those earnings. Since 1988, inactive duty service in the armed forces reserves (such as weekend drills) has also been covered by Social Security. Under certain circumstances, special extra earnings for periods of active duty from 1957 through 2001 can also be credited to your Social Security earnings record. YOU MUST BRING YOUR DD-214 TO THE SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE AND ASK FOR THE BENEFIT TO RECEIVE IT!

- From 1957 through 1967, the extra credits will be added to your record when you apply for Social Security benefits (by showing your DD-214).
- From 1968 through 2001, the credits were automatically added to your record (no need to apply).
- After 2001, there are no special earning credits for military service.

If you served from 1940 through 1956, including attendance at a military academy, you didn't pay Social Security taxes. However, your Social Security record may be credited with \$160 /month for service from 16 Sept 1940 through 31 Dec 1956 under following circumstances:

- You were honorably discharged after 90+ days of service, or were released because of disability or injury in line of duty, or
- You are still on active duty, or
- You're applying for survivor benefits and the veteran died while on active duty.

If you were on active duty after 1956, you can still get the special earnings for 1951-'56, even if you're receiving a military retirement based on service during that period. These extra earnings credits are added to your earnings

record when you apply for Social Security benefits.
