

midst the relentless challenges posed by heavy winds and the torrential rains brought on by Cyclone Freddy, the indomitable spirit of Blantyre 20 stood tall, persevering despite the consequent disruption to activities, damage to infrastructure and a cholera outbreak that plagued the region.

If the battle against cholera wasn't enough, Cyclone Freddy swept through, inflicting severe damage upon the southern region. With unwavering determination, we wasted no time in raising the flag of assistance through our Cyclone Freddy Relief Appeal, orchestrated under the Roundtable Malawi Association's banner, in conjunction with support from our fellow tables, Dwangwa and Lilongwe. Our collective efforts bore fruit, enabling us to provide aid to numerous victims in regions like Chileka, Njuli, Zomba, Chikwawa, Phalombe, Mulanje, and Nsanje. Our involvement reached its pinnacle with a heartwarming contribution to Chikondi Children Care an orphanage in Blantyre-Ndirande that cares for disabled children under the care of Mai Mussa. Through our flood relief initiative, we raised and distributed assorted items

in excess of MK100,000,000.00, a huge thank you to the Roundtable Malawi association and our supporters.

Our commitment to the welfare of our community remained unwavering.

Notably, we orchestrated a Winter Donation drive on Independence Day at the Mpemba Reformatory Center in Blantyre. This endeavor encompassed the provision of various consumables and blankets to comfort the children residing there.

Amidst the adversities we faced, our resolute spirit prevailed. We orchestrated a UEFA Champions League Finals game, an online football predictor, and a golf tournament, collectively generating funds to the tune of approximately MK3,000,000.00. This demonstrated our ability to rise above challenges and generate resources for noble causes.

Presently, our endeavors continue as we concentrate on enhancing sanitary facilities at the Chambo Evacuation Center in Zomba under Roundtable Malawi Association.

Our organization's strength lies in its members, and we are proud to announce the growth of our ranks.

At the outset of the year, we comprised 13 members. Today, our ranks have swelled with the addition of 4 new members, and we anticipate the induction of several more prospective members in the upcoming months.



fter the dust had settled following our local AGM, the newly appointed executives wasted no time and immediately plunged into action. Our initial focus was on crafting a comprehensive year-long calendar that encompassed Tabler birthdays, meeting dates, potential project timelines, and significant international fellowship opportunities. Alongside our annual flagship projects, the Golf Day and Beerfest, Lilongwe 32 undertook the responsibility of hosting both the Round Table Malawi AGM and the 130 International Week, which were scheduled just a week apart. Notably, the 130 Tour held special significance as it marked the return of this event to Lilongwe 32 after a gap of 9 years. This occasion provided us with a remarkable opportunity to uphold the tradition of forging international bonds, extending hospitality to fellow tablers, showcasing our nations beauty, and demonstrating the immense collective impact achievable through mutual support within our global organization. During the initial months of my tenure as Chairman, Malawi was struck by the devastating Cyclone Freddy, the repercussions of which continue to be felt to this day. Remaining true to the Tabler ethos, Lilongwe 32, Blantyre 20, and Dwangwa 69 sprung into action, launching a series of independent and collaborative charity campaigns to raise funds in aid of those affected by this catastrophic event. Lilongwe 32, notably forged a partnership with Helios Tower, resulting in a donation of relief items totaling MWK 10,000,000.00

This endeavor was executed in conjunction with Blantyre 20. Additionally, a local opportunity that surfaced for Lilongwe 32 was brought to the attention of Round Table Malawi, resulting in a joint effort that secured and distributed a \$60,000.00 donation from the Tobacco Processors Association. This exemplified the remarkable potential that materializes when like-minded individuals unite for the greater good. An enduring legacy project inherited from our predecessors is the Streetwise School initiative. The current executive team and I consider it a privilege to carry forward this project and are committed to completing Phase 1. Through unwavering dedication, alongside our fellow tablers, we have propelled Phase 1 of the Streetwise School project to an impressive 93% completion, with finalization expected by September. The culmination of Phase 1 signifies the establishment of a government-mandated educational facility in the area, poised to commence classes on-site from September onward.

In recent times, I've had the honor of inducting six new tablers into our fold, with several guests frequently attending our meetings. We have also held our annual Golf Day and annual Beerfest at The Shack in October.

In my role as Chairman, I find myself in a unique position at the helm of an executive team that blends both fresh perspectives and seasoned experience. I am fortunate to have the counsel of past tablers who consistently extend a helping hand and provide guidance. The Chairmanship has proven to be an invaluable platform for personal growth and development. I have absorbed the wisdom of those who preceded me and, in the true spirit of Round Table, have adopted, adapted, and improved their insights to foster progress.

The park boasts the classic big game animals paired with the broad Shire River that connects to Lake Malawi. The main 130 Tour took place in Lilongwe, the capital city of Malawi. Tabler's were welcomed at RoundTable Lilongwe 32's very own Shack for the 130 Tour registration. Tabler's from other associations had the chance to socialise and enjoy the Malawian night life.

"Streetwise" foundation which is RT Lilongwe 32's legacy project was proudly presented to the travelling Tabler's. This project involved building a new school block that extends the learning capacity of a nearby street children's orphanage in a village situated on the outskirts of the capital city. Tabler's had the opportunity to inspect the new building and the work "Streetwise" and Lilongwe 32 are doing.

A local market tour took place so they could glimpse a real African marketplace, complete from fresh produce to not so fresh fish. The Gala night displayed the full Table spirit. From Buffalo's to coining to even drinking out of shoes. Speeches from all traveling delegates were received and was a night to share experiences about the RoundTable family and tradition.

The AGM united all Tabler's far and wide, great fun was had at the meeting with lots learnt and adopted from how each Table makes an impact within their communities. Gifts and remarks on other Tabling associations were exchanged and will be carried on for years to come.

The post tour for the International Weekend happened on the shores of Lake Malawi. Lake Island visits via boats took place accompanying all Tabler's. The perfect place to relax. A tour of a crocodile farm, local wood crafters market and fish farm took place during the post tour at the lake.

t has been another exciting year of tabling amid a difficult atmosphere of economic and environmental challenges. The major highlights in the first half of the reporting year include the 3 successful blood drives in Dwangwa and Mzuzu, the Dwambadzi mortuary cold room project and Tour de Dwangwa.

DW69 was privileged to jointly implement 3 blood drive events with MBTS and Illovo Matiki Clinic on March 25, 26th and April 29th at Matiki Market, Dwangwa trading centre and Mzuzu University respectively. It was pleasing to see tablers put ideas together towards a very successful blood donation exercise across Dwangwa and Mzuzu. This year's blood drive amassed a total of 219 pints across the 3 sites against a total of 102 pints in the previous year. More opportunities exist in the year ahead and we must aim to increase the numbers towards saving more lives.

The Dwambadzi mortuary project is up for handover in the month end of august. It is a transformative project which has resurrected a mortuary cold room with the intention of saving the community's time and money in handling dead bodies when the unexpected happens to their beloved ones.

Communities around us continue to face numerous challenges including famine, financial hardship and effects of Cyclone Freddy. We must always see this as an important challenge and opportunity for all tablers to rise up and provide solutions to the challenges. We look towards increasing our visibility, strengthening our fundraising and sponsorship drive, enhancing our partnership portfolio and being unforgiving about growing membership. The presence of such challenges will definitely call for resilience building initiative both within table and in the communities, we serve; Of course not forgetting food relief to the communities.

Projects have been far-fetched in the first half of the year for DW69, partly due to sponsors' extra commitment to disaster response in the southern region and geographical positioning of our table.

The establishment of the Mzuzu charter is another critical project that all tablers must confront with aggression.

Potential tablers continue to avail themselves but consistency in their attendance of awareness meetings remains a challenge

We will be taking deliberate steps in addressing this gap. Lastly, the year has seen the departure of Tablers Peter Piringu and Chawezi Nyirenda to BT20, and the graduation of Tabler Samson Zimba into 41er ranks.

The coming in of active guests Edward Nthara, Malumbo Nkhoswe and the persistence of pipeliner John Semu gives us confidence of positive replacements in numbers, age and quality. As a table, we must refuse to be confined to Dwangwa and continue to aspire towards expanding our playing field towards Nkhotakota boma and Nkhata-bay.

Sincere thanks to the local tablers and sister tables for pitching up so well in responding to the numerous challenges faced by the country. I personally see great and successful tabling years ahead of us through collective efforts.






Cyclone Freddy

ound table Malawi had a busy 2023 and had to hit the ground running with our community service projects. We were able to be on the ground within a week of the initial rains dying down from Cyclone Freddy. Initial scoping was done to ensure those unable to reach the main camps were assisted and the vulnerable in the rural areas were not forgot-

In all RTMW received close to 110 million kwacha through various forms and donors. To date we have donated 70 million straight to those affected with initial emergency relief items such as food, sanitary items, cooking utensils and other items for immediate use.


The funds used for the initial emergency donation was comprised of individual / company donations as well as two large donations, one from Tobacco Processors Association with a sum of K60 million and Helios Towers with MWK 11 million. These managed to directly reach 900 households and 1,000 people respectively. We were honored to partner with each company and be trusted to identify and carry out the donations alongside them.

The remaining MWK 40 million is going towards the Chambo evacuation center in Zomba, which we found lacked critical infrastructure to deal with such emergencies, such as ablution facilities, cooking areas and a clean water source. We hope to have the construction complete before the start of this rainy season.



















Blood Drive



In March Round Table Malawi carried out our blood drive in line with Round Table International's blood donation month. Across our three tables we managed to collect 309 units of blood over two days. With 219 units from Dwangwa, 38 Units from Lilongwe, and 52 pints from Blantyre. A great initiative which we are looking to carry out every 6 months.



ound Table is a club designed for young men between 18 and 40 (45 in some countries) years old, irrespective of their religious beliefs or political opinions. Round Table is a closed club, though anybody can join through an invitation from one of the current members who will then become the sponsor of the new member. Round Table is not a business club, it's first of all a place to meet people, to exchange ideas with them and to develop fellowship.

Table is an international organization, active on the 5 continents with 31 000 members (2019). These members meet regularly with the feeling of "meeting an old friend for the first time."

The local clubs are usually called "Tables", where their members promote first friendship, then the support of local charities and charitable causes. Round Table contributes to charity by either organizing various fundraising events, or by offering time and energy to give a hand wherever it's needed.

As with any hobby, you certainly get out of it what you put in.







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History of Round Table

The first Round Table was formed in Norwich (England) in 1927. The founder, Louis Marchesi, was a young member of Norwich Rotary Club. He pointed out the problem of change, which can only be achieved with young people and he felt a need existed for a club where the young business men of the town could gather.

At the meetings of this "Round Table" they could exchange ideas, learn from the experiences of their colleagues and play a collective part in the civic life of Norwich. This idea was successful and the chartering meeting of the very first Round Table took place at Suckling House, on the 14th March 1927.

Within a year of inception the membership of this Round Table had grown and interest was being shown in establishing Round Tables elsewhere. This is how a national association was founded in England on the

25th May 1928. From a very early stage it was agreed that Round Table would be a non-religious, non-political club and this has continued to this day.

The growth was rapid and Round Table proved it had international appeal with the first overseas Table formed in Copenhagen (Denmark) in 1936. During World War II, Round Table experienced challenges with growth, however further expansion continued with Round Table being established in Sweden in 1943.

After 1945 the pattern of growth was rapidly re-established with Tables being 'chartered' overseas, starting with South Africa and thereafter the growth did not stop. Round Table now flourishes in the majority of European countries, throughout Africa, the Middle East, Asia, both North and South America, and even more. In 1947, Round Table counted 133 Tables in Britain and Ireland, 7 Dutch, 5 Swedish and the first Table was chartered in Norway. This is how the international association was established in 1948, with the aim of uniting the various associations, under the name of "Round Table International", known as RTI.

Today RTI has 31 000 members in 54 countries (2019). Some countries only have 1 or 2 Tables, yet some have hundreds. The main purpose of RTI is to ensure coordination between national associations and to retain the values of the Round Table in each association.




