TELLING YOUR STORY

Birth, life, death—our life is a story. Who is better equipped to tell your story than you? At the end, that is all we are—stories to influence lives!

Telling stories is a powerful means to share, teach and inspire. It builds connections among people and between people. We find stories of struggle and triumph irresistible.

When a woman excitedly told her neighbors, "Come and see a man who told me everything I ever did! Could he possibly be the Messiah?" the people came streaming from the village to see him. (John 4:29–30)

After a conversation with Jesus at the well, the Samaritan woman—minutes old in the faith—immediately ran and told others. The Bible tells us that "Many Samaritans from the village believed in Jesus because the woman had said, 'He told me everything I ever did!' " (John 4:39)

Telling our story is a powerful bridge for the gospel—a bridge to tell His story. It is not about you or me; it is about Him. About how, in our struggles and triumphs, we were able to see the light, the ray of hope through Jesus. Jesus was there all along. That is the crux of our stories.

"We are the aroma of Christ" Paul writes to the Corinthians. (2 Corinthians 2:14) The story we are given to tell is a story that smells of His life in all its liveness, and our commission is to tell it in a way that makes it come alive in all its vividness. To make those who hear it listen with all gladness. Frederick Buechner observes, "The fragrance of Christ in our lives is like the fragrance of the sea from ten miles inland when the wind is in the right direction, like the fragrance of a rose from the other side of the street with all the world between."

As Buechner tell us in his book *Secrets in the Dark*, while we wait with hope, on this side of paradise, it is our business to speak from our hearts—to bear witness to, live out of, live toward, and live by the truth of His Holy Story as it seeks to manifest itself through the stories of each of us.

FLORA PLUMMER, THE UNSUNG HEROINE



Flora Plummer (1862 -1945)

Flora Plummer (Lorena Florence Fait Plummer) is usually praised as the longest serving Director of the General Conference Sabbath School [SS] Department, from 1913–1936. But that is only part of her story. In 1893 she was issued a ministerial license by the lowa Conference. She also served as Acting President there briefly in 1900 when the president took a job in California. There were 17 ordained pastors at the time, but her gift of leadership made her ideal for the job. During her short leadership, four new churches were started, the number of pastors increased, and conference business meeting improved.

Clearly Talented

Before she was appointed Director of the Sabbath School Department, she had been a successful teacher. When she became an Adventist in 1886, church leaders noted her talents and involvement in the church's mission. Soon she became part of the Iowa Conference SS Department. In 1901 she moved to Takoma Park to serve as Secretary for the SS Department of the General Conference.

In 1913 she became the Director. Under her leadership, the SS department's two main emphases were study of scripture and offerings for missions. She saw the SS as a "soul wining agency to which people could come to study the Bible and then reach out to others." She promoted training of Sabbath School leaders and teachers. In her book *The Soul-Winning Teacher* she stated, "More skill, better judgment,...a deep personal experience are required to teach the Holy Scripture well,...one should be able to teach sacred truth as carefully and as accurately as mathematics."

Writer and Editor

She wrote extensively for church papers, was editor of *The Sabbath School Worker*, authored at least four books, and wrote SS lessons for adults and children. Her vision of the SS as a soul-winning agent influenced the growth of the church in the early 20th century.

Flora and her husband Frank E. Plummer had two children. She died on April 8, 1945.

Charlotte Conway is not just my grandma but also my inspiration. She has worked for the Seventh-day Adventist Church for 50+ years, and throughout this time she has dedicated herself to serving her church, community, and women's ministries.

A talented pianist, my grandma started her career teaching music—first at Campion Academy in Colorado, next at Bass Memorial Academy in Mississippi, and then at Maplewood Academy in Minnesota. Seeking adventure, she and her husband Bob, an English teacher, become missionaries to Tanzania to

teach at Ikizu Secondary School—a courageous decision for a mother with three young children. During the day, she homeschooled my dad, aunt, and uncle while my grandpa taught English. In the evening she assisted grandpa with the school's accounting. They next moved to Middle East College in Beirut, where Bob continued to teach English and she taught music and was then asked to help in the accounting office.

Back to School

Back in the United States, Charlotte earned her MBA from the University of Maryland. As a trailblazer, with the experience she gained overseas she decided on a career in accounting. She served in various positions —formerly held by men—at Home Study Institute, now Griggs International Academy, and eventually retired as Vice President for Financial Administration at Columbia Union College, now Washington Adventist University. She came out of retirement to work at Sligo Seventh-day Adventist Church as treasurer and eventually their COO. After losing her loving husband Bob, she felt a calling to connect with others who had lost spouses. She co-founded HeartLifters, a support ministry for those grieving.

Relevant Grandma

Over the years, Charlotte has beautifully continued to reinvent herself. Ahead of her time in many ways, she always prided herself on remaining relevant and engaged, which is particularly inspiring in our current Information Age. She has never shied away from trying new and progressive things, from choosing conscious natural childbirth in the early 60s to being the first in our family with an iPhone.

We have a very close relationship because we lived on the same street for my first 20 years. My childhood was filled with her many amazing stories from overseas. My example, she has inspired me to pursue my dreams and grow in faith. I am blessed to observe her strength.
